CARMEN SALOMÉ WRITES HER FIRST EDITORIAL

As you know, if you read last month's newsletter, Carmen Salomé was appointed to the News Press editorial board. We thought you might be interested in seeing her very first editorial. The text below is from her original copy. Please read below.

"Self-reliance is the only road to true freedom, and being one's own person is its ultimate reward"....Patricia Sampson

When my parents came to the United States from Puerto Rico, all they knew was hard work and to rely on the community for support. Our faith, family and community were central in our lives. I have always believed that our purpose was to help others. For me, helping others is evident in the projects I have become involved with. Seven years ago, I helped start a GED tutoring ministry at my church, because I knew first hand an education can open doors to better job opportunities. As a single mother of two children, with only a high school diploma, I struggled working minimum wage jobs to pay the rent and feed the boys. For a short time I also utilized public assistance. I could have stayed on that track like so many others in my neighborhood. But I wanted to provide a life better than peanut butter and government cheese

for my sons. Inspired by Christian values and a strong work ethic, I set out to change my situation. I searched for agencies that would help me with work training. It wasn't until I completed a medical secretary course that I secured a better paying job in a large healthcare facility. This opportunity exposed me to working alongside people with professional degrees that saw great potential in me. One such professional encouraged me to seek a college education. I discovered with each college degree I completed, another door to a position with more responsibility and better pay opened. The road ahead was not easy and certainly not cheap. I had to obtain student loans for the training and then again for college. I admit the financial burden was heavy, but looking back, the reward of accomplishment and self confidence far outweighed that burden.

I can remember working as a bilingual secretary for a school district up north and was saddened to see the number of Latino families on government assistance as a way of life. Families that moved into the area from various Hispanic countries, would come to enroll their children in school and ask for the necessary paperwork verification needed to take to the welfare office. Some arrived to our offices before we opened at 8 am; some arriving by bus or taxi; but all wanting the same verification documentation. It was sad to see that much energy put into staying dependent. I asked one mom, why she moved to our area with no family around to help her. She responded she moved to our area because the welfare benefits there were higher. So in essence, she got a raise. In another interview of a pregnant 13 year old girl, I asked her what she was going to do to support herself and her baby. She answered in Spanish, "Well...welfare of course." There were no agencies to help people, new to the area, see their human potential; that there IS a future! Many of these people believed that they could not overcome language barriers or lack of education. I often would tell our clients, "I am no different than you. If I could change my situation, so can you."

I am blessed that I have achieved much in my life, and I want to help others find the same success. That's why I am passionate about the Freedom and Virtue Institute's Self Reliance Clubs. The Self Reliance Clubs emphasize to students the connection between reward and accomplishment and relying on their individual gifts to create their destiny. Currently, 507 students participate in Self Reliance Clubs in Lee and Collier county schools. 85% of the children participating are Hispanic. This initiative is impacting a large segment of our community! What better way to impact the cycle of poverty in the lives of these children than to encourage and nurture the inherent gifts we all have that allow us to move forward and succeed.

I challenge the Hispanic leaders of our community to get involved in this initiative. Consider joining the board, become a sponsor of the annual golf tournament fundraiser, write about it in your Spanish newspapers and report on it in the Spanish local TV news. If you are a Hispanic business owner, support the children of the Self Reliance club by mentoring – share with them how you achieved your goals and succeeded in business - or fund a work project. The students need to know you care about them enough to help them be the best they can be. Frederick Douglass, former slave turned statesman, once said "if there is no struggle, there is no progress." Isn't it preferable to teach a child that they can earn the things they need through work, saving and patience rather than expect "free stuff?" They don't need a hand out, they need a hand up!

The annual Self Reliance Club Charity Golf Classic is March 19th at Old Corkscrew Golf Course. Don't miss this opportunity to positively impact the lives of the children in SWF!

LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

Update on the 2015 Legislative Session

The 2015 Legislative Session has passed the half way point and this week, the budget should be passed out of the House and the Senate so negotiations can begin! Remember – Passing the Budget is the only action the legislature must take by May 1, 2015. If they run out of time, the session may be extended or a special session scheduled. When a special session is scheduled the specific subject (for example Health care funding) of the session is also listed in the notice.

Currently, the big money issues are Education (funding per pupil), Health Care (Hospital uninsured patient grants, health insurance for 100%- 138% federal poverty level), Implementation of Amendment 1 (doc stamp dollars for land maintenance, restoration and purchase). The House and the Senate have allocated these dollars very differently so there could be lengthy negotiations as they work through the approximately \$77 Billion budget. Next month we will review some of the Bills the Legislature is passing. For specific bills you may go to these websites for current status, sponsors, and staff analysis.

LEE MEMORIAL HEALTH SYSTEMS UPDATE

What the hospital board has done this year to meet capacity demands:

- Opened 42 additional beds at Cape Coral Hospital
- Created new surge overflow holding areas
- Added Tele-Stroke capabilities
- Hired 12 Primary Care Physicians and 13 Primary care extenders in 2014 (25 total)
- Opened a new Lee Convenient Care near HealthPark
- Fast Track processes implemented in all four Emergency Depts along with creative ideas to decompress Emergency Departments and improve patient flow
- Emergency Dept Physicians working in Lee Convenient Cares to extend hours
- Working with Hospitalists on Average Length of Stay and early discharges
- Several Lean Value Stream Mapping events completed across the System working on throughput and patient flow
- Cape Coral Hospital became a Primary Stroke Center to help keep patients in the Cape
- Continued close Partnership/Collaboration/Communication with Lee County EMS
- Leveraged the LMHS Transfer Center to level out volumes throughout the health system
- Graduate Medical Program up and running
- Many Lee Physician Group offices freeing up same day appointments to help decompress emergency departments
- New Federally Qualified Health Clinic approved earlier this month will increase outpatient access
- New Capacity Committee formed to brainstorm and execute solutions in tandem with key physicians and staff
- New System Surge Disaster Plan and structure created; lead by Dr. Krivenko and activated if the System is significantly over capacity

During 2015 for the 2016 winter season, with Board approval, plans are to:

- Build additional inpatient holding areas at Lee Memorial Hospital, Gulf Coast Medical Center and HealthPark (45 total beds)
- Institute a new Community Care Coordination program to help navigate patients to the right healthcare setting and decompress the emergency departments
- Recruit and hire a goal of 27 primary care providers
- Open a new Lee Convenient Care Center in Fort Myers, an Outpatient Center in Cape Coral and possibly a Lee Physician Group rotating specialty clinic
- Explore potential telehealth primary care visits.

In Spring 2017, the board anticipates the completion of construction at Golisano Children's Hospital (adds 45 adult beds at HealthPark) and in late 2017 we anticipate completion of South Lee medical campus, giving us additional outpatient and emergency department capacity.
