# The Pres Says... Shirlene Ostrov, President

Dear Members,

The other day I got a list of all the observed Federal Holidays for planning purposes as an owner of a Defense contract. I was actually surprised at the number of holidays (for some reason, as an active duty military officer, I don't remember so many). But what struck me is that one was blatantly missing from the list: US Constitution and Citizenship Day, celebrated on September 17 of every year.

Our Constitution, by its own self-definition, is the "supreme law of the land." It forms the highest manifestation of America's commitment to the rule of law. Through that rule, we protect our natural rights to life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness. By it, we exercise republican self-government.

We fight a lot about the Constitution, and we always have, but even more so in recent years. But it's not a coincidence that the document begins with the word "we" and puts union at the front of its list of ambitions. Properly understood, and properly put into practice, it

has the capacity to bring us together. The Constitution was meant to create common ground in our society, not just to occupy it, and some of its most frustrating and peculiar features are the ones best suited to serving that purpose — a fact that a lot of our system's loudest critics blithely ignore.

Did you know that each educational institution that receives Federal funds for a fiscal year is required to hold an educational program about the U.S. Constitution for its students on September 17? I did a query of lesson plans and examples of resources for them to consider using in developing their program. If you have children or grandchildren in school, ask them what they learned about the Consitution. Their answers might surprise you. The future of our nation rests with our keiki.

We need to constantly remind them that we must commit ourselves to the idea that we can continue to chart our country's course through deliberation, elections, and lawmaking.

Happy Constitution Day!

### MAKING CENTS BofA tests no-down-payment mortgages

Bank of America is offering mortgages for first-time homeowners that do not require down payments, minimum credit scores or closing costs in a program that aims to boost homeownership rates among first-time Black and Latino buyers.

Under the trial program, which was announced Tuesday, Bank of America will offer loans to people in certain predominantly Black and Hispanic neighborhoods in Charlotte, N.C., Dallas, Detroit, Los Angeles and Miami. Eligibility for the program, which is called the Community Affordable Loan Solution, is based on income and location, and requires no mortgage insurance.

AJ Barkley, the head of neighborhood and community lending for Bank of America, said the goal of the program was to help individuals and families, particularly Black and Hispanic people, build wealth over time.

According to U.S. Census Bureau data for the second quarter of this year, the national Black homeownership rate was at 45%, while the rate of white homeownership reached 75%.


### Aloha!

Martha's Vineyard Takes Revenge On DeSantis By Shipping Him 50 Karens

TALLAHASSEE, FL — Outraged at having been sent 50 illegal immigrants from Florida by Ron DeSantis, Martha's Vineyard has taken ultimate revenge on the governor by shipping 50 Karens to Florida.

### No one prepared for shutdown of coal plant

The closing of the AES coal-fired electric power plant on Sept. 1 will set a dangerous precedent for Oahu ("7% surge in Oahu electric bills projected next month," Star-Advertiser, Aug. 7).

Shutting down the 180-megawatt plant that provides 10% of Oahu electrical power was planned years ago, yet Hawaiian Electric has yet to come up with replacement renewable energy. Oahu likely will have brownouts and even some blackouts. And all of this is without considering the all-electric train that is supposed to begin operations within the next five years.

Hawaiian Electric claims that the \$15 increase in monthly cost will be for the "typical" user at 500 kilowatthours a month. They don't use the term "average." I don't believe any family living in a single-family home uses any less than 1,000 kilowatts a month.

I don't think it's worth the danger of losing power throughout the island to make environmentalists feel good.




