They were to provide us with a results summary of the Juniper Flats Restoration Grant that we had helped them work on over the past few years. However, due to the federal government shutdown, BLM had to cancel the meeting. It is to be rescheduled, but we haven't been given a new date yet.

2018 Kickoff Hike to Arrastre Falls



The Mojave Group of the Sierra Club and the Friends of Juniper Flats kicked off the new year with this wonderful group hike.

Old and new friends met at the VV Museum and 27 hikers car pooled to a parking area in the northern area of Juniper Flats. Jenny Wilder led an interpretive hike to Arrastre Falls where she explained the importance of the riparian forest surrounding the Arrastre waterfall.

Arrastre Falls provides permanent water for plants and animals and supports a riparian forest along the base of the ravine. Most of the riparian forests in Southern California are now gone, and are considered to be rare by botanists.

The riparian forest provides shade, shelter and food for animals that live in the surrounding area. When the forest is damaged by human activity, the animals lose the habitat that they need to survive. Animals that were commonly encountered in town when many of the hikers were young are now rarely seen: quail, tortoise, road runner and coyote.

Simple Geology of Juniper Flats

More than 100 million years ago a plutonic intrusion of molten liquid granite oozed up under the Earth's surface and cooled slowly. Then about 5 million years ago these now rocks, began to be shoved up by fault action to create the San Bernardino Mountains.

During this time, the granitic rock started to develop fractures-cracks which allowed ground water to chemically start rotting the rocks creating decomposed granite, which eroded



faster than the undecomposed granite.

Since that time water has been working to erode the mountains down, so that what you see today in Juniper Flats is the undecomposed granitic outcrops that are being uncovered by the erosion of the softer decomposed granite.
