HOMEOWNERSHIP OPPORTUNITY PROGRAM



With assistance from the County of Fillmore the FCDC has received funds from the Nebraska Affordable Housing Program to provide down payment subsidies to Homebuyers for the purchase of existing homes in Fillmore County. The funds are available to assist individuals and families with down payment assistance and assistance with minor rehabilitation of the home they purchase.

Eligible applicants will need to meet income qualifications which are 80 percent or lower of the median household incomes of Fillmore County, adjusted for family size. The home must be the principal residence of the buyer. The maximum home loan subsidy cannot exceed \$17,000. Grant funds up to \$7,500 to complete minor repair and/or rehabilitation work in the form of a "conditional grant" may also be available. 
Revolving Loan Funds for Economic Development

Businesses across Fillmore County have access to Revolving Loan funds developed from CDBG grants received through the Nebraska Department of Economic Development. The objectives of the reuse fund are to provide financing for start-up and existing businesses that cannot obtain conventional financing, to attract new businesses to the area and to create and retain jobs. Eligible activities include acquisition of real estate, land and buildings, fixed assets, machinery and equipment, renovations, remodeling, site preparation, working capital and/or job training costs. The Revolving Loan funds can be approved for up to 40% of the total project costs. An application review committee reviews each application. As businesses repay the loan with interest (1/2 of the primary lender rate) the fund replenishes and can be used by other businesses. To date over \$1.7 million dollars has been loaned out to 28 different businesses. Presently there is over \$155,000 available for viable projects. “Passion for Community Related to Economic Growth”—Soul of the Community Study

A three-year Gallup study of 26 U.S. cities found that peoples' love and passion for their community may be a leading indicator for local economic growth. Surprisingly, social offerings, openness and beauty are far more important than people's perceptions of the economy, jobs, or basic services in creating a lasting emotional bond between people and their community. The study showed cities with the highest level of resident community attachment also had the highest rates of GDP over time.

The theory of the study was that when a community's residents are highly attached, they will spend more time there, spend more money, they're more productive and more entrepreneurial. The study found a clear correlation between community attachment and economic growth.

Is this true in rural Nebraska too? I would guess that it is. Let's make sure that there is a sense that our community is a good place to make connections, we expound on the natural beauty as well as the man-made environment, and are welcoming to diverse ages, races, ethnicities, cultural groups, and family types.
