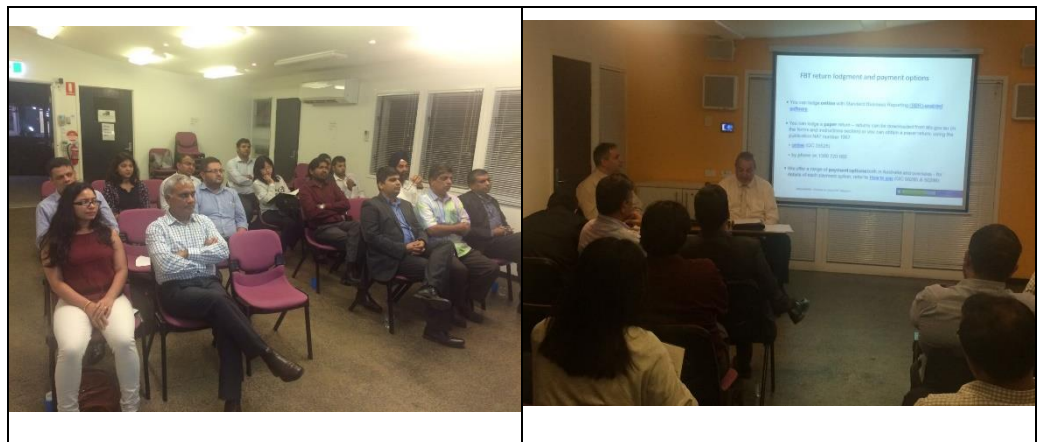

Demystifying the Federal Budget- Grant Thornton

End of the financial year and pronouncement of a new budget are festive occasions for accountants. Therefore, Brisbane Chapter of ICAI organized Technical session titled “Demystifying Australian Budget” on 25th May 2017 with an objective to discuss the Australian Federal budget for the fiscal year 2017-18 announced on 9th May, 2017. The meeting was held at the offices of our Chairman, CA Surender Sharma. The discussions focused on the changes in various provisions under the proposed budget and its impact on businesses and individuals. The discussions were led by four experienced speakers on tax and advisory services from Grant Thornton, a renowned and well established accounting and auditing firm in Australia. 14 members attended this session.

The session officially started at 6 PM, with the introduction of speakers by the chairman of Brisbane Chapter of ICAI, CA Surender Sharma. First speaker, Simon Hancox, one of the partners and National Head for Not for Profit in Grant Thornton covered recent changes on Australian Accounting Standards 15, 1058, and 16. This presentation on accounting standards was followed by a presentation on changes on GST by Amisha Upadhyaya. Ms. Upadhyaya is a Senior Indirect Tax Manager.

The third presentation by Mark Foster comprehensively discussed the fuel tax credit. Finally, the fourth presenter, Chris Dunne, a senior tax manager, covered the corporate tax changes and discussed the introduction of two new taxes; major bank levy and ghost tax. The session was formally ended by the Vice Chairman CA Benno Parackal, thanking the speakers on behalf of all members.

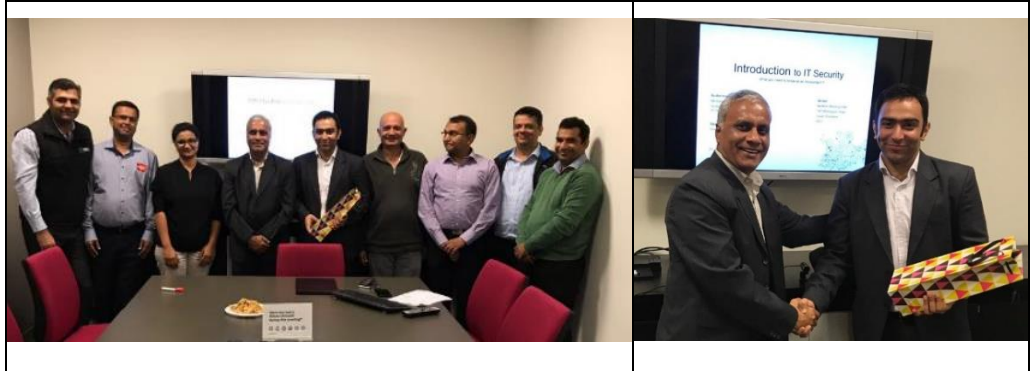

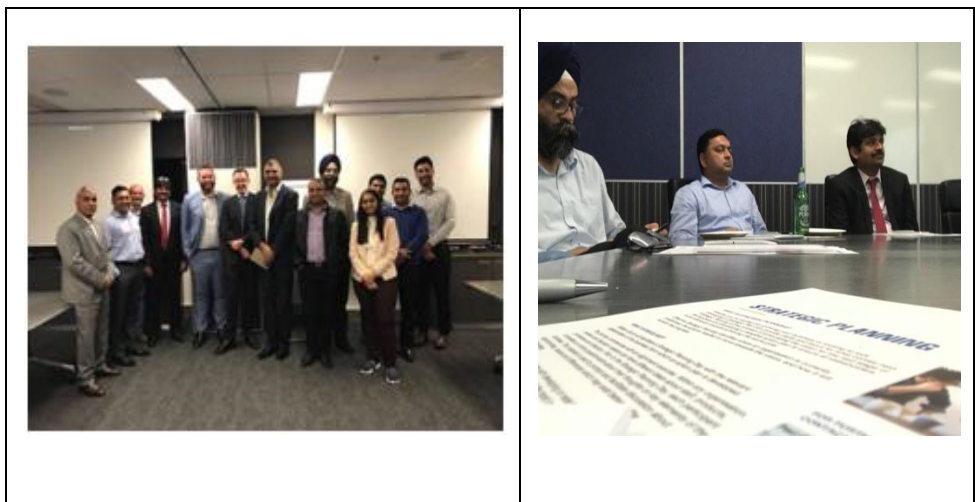


Strategic Planning – William Buck

The Company Directorship Journey

I joined NASFUND as CFO (private sector, preferred superannuation Company in PNG) in Oct 2014 after having worked as CFO with News Corporation's PNG operations. Shift from News to Super was very interesting and challenging – perspective of looking things changed - story angle to investment angle - story build up to investment build up. Major shift from accounting perspective was that year end change in fair value of assets was no longer part of revaluation reserve rather it became part of income for the year. Second quick learning was that subsidiaries of multinational companies are often guided by head office or shareholders expectations whereas world of superannuation brings along legislator to overview roles of executives as governance champions and as custodians of members' funds.

Role of Board in companies and expectations from the board from shareholder perspective became very relevant in discussions and reviews of investee companies. Board meetings and board matters were no longer quarterly events – it became part and parcel of job of CFO of Superannuation Company. As part of continued professional development, board nominated me in 2015 to attend the 2016 Company Director's course of Australian Institute of Company Directors (AICD).

I attended five days' Company Directors course in October 2016 at Brisbane. Course was subdivided in 10 modules of half a day each covering role of board, duties and responsibilities, legal environment, decision making, risk, strategy, financial literacy and achieving board effectiveness.

It was fun to be back in school along with senior executives and public servants to learn about what we thought we knew well – each of the sessions were interactive, very well presented by experienced professionals and most of them were members of AICD with experience on various boards.

Course completion requires successful completion of assessments tasks within 90 days of course completion (online multiples choices questions, online long answer questions and submission of case study answers which requires detailed analysis and fine reading) – award for the successful completion of course is admission as Graduate member (GAICD) and entitlement to write GAICD after your name. About sixty percent of course attendees attempt assessments and about fifty percent pass in first attempt.

Key challenge during assessment was to find time to read most of the study material (which was supplied before the course) again in order to complete assessment tasks. There was option to re-do online assessments one more time if one intended, which I was not prepared as passing the assessment was not the only goal.

Biggest fear about attempting assessment was to fail and face grown up kids who would then use this as an example to counter all future discussions about their performance in studies. At one stage I was looking for a good excuse of year end rituals of audit etc. at work place to defer assessment but then thought

process of leading by example pushed me to use travel time between Port Moresby and Brisbane to read and prepare. I am glad I did it and worked out well for me. Key message along with result from AICD was “ You have achieved a pass grade, reflecting that in the examination and assignment you displayed a sound awareness of the complexities and implications relevant to effective governance by a board “

While attending the course, I felt that at NASFUND, we pretty much do what was expected by AICD standards, which was a good start. After attending the course, I also became aware of the “why” of certain things we do. Biggest learning for me was more clarity on conflict of interest of directors and management thereof, order of board agenda based on expected outcome (decision, discussion and noting) as opposed to agenda driven by functions / divisions, relevance of board composition, importance of skill matrix and minimum expectation of understanding of ethics / industry experience etc.

After attending the course I started understanding board’s expectations more clearly which helped me adding one more dimension in board submissions. I am able to contribute meaningfully on discussions on board performance and effectiveness.

Journey of GAICD has certainly made me equipped and shown pathway to take on role of Company Director in near future.
