Notice of Proposed By-Laws Amendments

Pursuant to Article X, Amendments, Section 1: Proposals and Notice, of the Constitution and Bylaws of the Maryland Association of Administrative Law Judiciary, Inc., the Board of Governors hereby provides Notice of Proposed Amendments to eliminate the standing Legislation Committee and to eliminate the requirement that

the Treasurer be bonded. The complete text of the proposed amendments is set forth on page 2 of the newsletter.

Text of Proposed By-Laws Amendments

FIRST Proposed Amendment – to eliminate the requirement that the Treasurer be bonded.
 Rationale: The requirement is unnecessary.

The current provision provides as follows:

ARTICLE III, SECTION 7: Duties of the Treasurer

The Treasurer shall be responsible for issuing invoices for membership dues; collecting dues for the Association; establishing a bank account or accounts in the name of the Association; and paying all bills and expenses of the Association. The Treasurer shall be bonded.

As amended, Article III, Officers, Section 7 (Duties of the Treasurer) will provide:

The Treasurer shall be responsible for issuing invoices for membership dues; collecting dues for the Association; establishing a bank account or accounts in the name of the Association; and paying all bills and expenses of the Association.

SECOND Proposed Amendment – to eliminate the standing Legislation Committee.

Rationale: This standing committee is unnecessary.

The current provision provides as follows:

ARTICLE IX, SECTION 2B: Standing Committees.

Legislation Committee, to investigate, initiate, and develop legislative measures: inquire into the causes and effects of legislation or policy inconsistent with the aims and policies of the Association, in order to further the development and maintenance of high professional standards and efficiency in the conduct of administrative hearings and in the field of administrative law.

In the Amended By-Laws, Article IX, Section 2B (Standing Committees) will be deleted; paragraphs 2C (Nominating Committee) and 2D (Membership Committee) will be re-lettered as paragraphs 2B and 2C, respectively.

How to Become a Federal Administrative Law Judge

A federal Administrative Law Judge position is both highly coveted and highly competitive...which helps to explain its highly complex and arduous application process. Applicants must have 7 years as a licensed attorney who has prepared for, participated in, and/or reviewed formal hearings or trials involving litigation and/or administrative law at the federal, state, or local level. Applicants must also have an active license to practice law from a U.S. state, D.C., or U.S. territorial court.

Applicants must also successfully

complete the U.S. Office of Personnel Management (OPM) competitive examination. The OPM exam includes online, proctored, and in-person components. The

online component includes a 75 minute multiple choice situational judgment test, a 35 minute writing sample exercise, and an untimed multiple choice and open-ended experience assessment. The proctored component includes a four hour written demonstration and a two hour logic-based measurement test. The in-person component involves a one hour structured interview designed to evaluate an applicant's responses to competency-based questions related to being an ALJ. The proctored and in-person components are conducted in Washington, DC.

Following the successful completion of the ALJ examination process, applicants are given a numerical score and placed on the ALJ Register. OPM refers applicants from the ALJ Register to federal agencies that have entry level ALJ vacancies to fill.

Those interested in pursuing federal ALJ positions should periodically check www.usajobs.gov for

the OPM ALJ exam posting.



OPM will only accept ALJ exam applications during the specific times listed on its ALJ exam posting. There is no schedule for when OPM posts announcements for the ALJ exam, however, the last two postings were made in 2009 and 2013. The long and complicated process may be worth the trouble as the starting salary for the Baltimore/Washington area, as of 2016, is \$133,000.00 per year.
