MISSION STATEMENT

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2010 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

LATE NIGHT SALES TRAINING. Robbery prevention and behavioral training sessions were conducted by the police department for employees of twelve businesses regulated by the *Late Night Sales* ordinance. The training is required for employees of late night retail establishments and late night gas stations which conduct business between the hours of 10:00pm and 6:00am.

APARTMENT MANAGER MEETINGS. Meetings were conducted with apartment managers to discuss problems being experienced at their complexes, and to provide ideas how to resolve those problems. Fifty-four (54) apartment complexes are represented. Police Administration has weekly contact with managers from many of the larger complexes in the city

NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH MEETINGS. Several *Neighborhood Watch* meetings were conducted throughout the City. These meetings, often initiated by residents, identified issues of concern and safety. The police department provided insight and guidance to residents on how to improve the safety and security in their neighborhoods.

NORTHERN OHIO VIOLENT FUGITIVE TASK FORCE (NOVFTF). Under the direction of the U. S. Marshal's Office, this multi-jurisdictional agency, represented by federal, state and local law enforcement agencies, search for and apprehend dangerous felons and fugitives who are located in the jurisdictions of the participating agencies. Two officers are assigned part-time to this organization which has been instrumental in the apprehension of Kent area fugitives.

U.S. DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE ANTI-TERRORISM TASK FORCE (ATTF). Under the direction of U.S. Attorney of the Northern District of Ohio, this multi-jurisdictional agency coordinates the dissemination of information and development of investigative and prosecutorial strategy in dealing with terrorism. The Task Force acts as a conduit for intelligence information about suspected terrorist activity, which is shared by participating federal, state and local agencies. One officer is assigned part-time to this organization.

PORTAGE COUNTY DRUG TASK FORCE. Under the direction of the Portage County Sheriff, this multi-jurisdictional agency investigates and apprehends offenders involved in the trafficking, distribution, and possession of illegal drugs within the communities of participating agencies. Membership includes the Portage County Sheriff's Office, the Portage County Prosecutor's Office, and the Kent, Aurora, Streetsboro, and Garrettsville police departments. Each agency has at least one full time officer assigned to the Task Force.

METRO SWAT. This highly trained, professional multi-jurisdictional special weapons team responds to incidents within the jurisdictions of participating members that require special weapons and tactics to deal with riotous activity, large crowd control, barricaded suspects, execution of drug warrants, arrest of dangerous felons, and the rescue of

hostages or endangered persons. The organization is comprised of twenty (20) Summit/Portage County law enforcement agencies. The Kent community has needed the assistance of Metro SWAT fifteen (15) times in the past five years. There are three Kent officers assigned part-time to the team.

JUVENILE UNIT'S DIVERSION PROGRAM. Under the direction of Juvenile Counselor Jeff Langstaff, the Diversion Program in 2010 processed seventy (55) juveniles through the program. The program provides first time offenders with an alternative process from entering the county's juvenile justice system for a non-serious criminal offense.

The Juvenile Unit Diversion Program included the following activities in 2009:

- 145 Mediation/ Problem-Solving Contacts
- 54 Drug/ Alcohol Interventions
- 160 Parental/ Family Consultations
- 20 Juveniles providing community service through the Diversion program. Community service averages 24 hours per juvenile.
- 105 Child/ Adolescent Mental Health Interventions
- 115 Adult Mental Health Interventions
- 28 Public Speaking Engagements
- 65 Internet & Safety Concern Issues


There was a continued effort to coordinate the implementation of the School Crisis Plan in the Kent Public Schools to comply with state law. This effort included presentations to school staff, lock downs and evacuation walk throughs. The Juvenile unit also participated with the School Safety Committee, working with staff, parents and community members to help foster a safer, healthier school environment. There was a continuing effort of staff from Kent Schools, Kent State University and Kent Police Department in working with the Behavioral Review Initiatives Committee (alcohol, drugs, and mental health). In addition, we are involved with Parents that Host Lose the Most as well as None for Under 21 programs. These are prevention programs that address the issues of adolescent alcohol use.

Involvement continued with the crisis intervention stress management process both with city employees and staff in the Kent School District. This involvement included training as well as actually utilizing the debriefing/diffusing model. We continued to participate and develop Crisis Intervention Team Training, a collaborative effort of the Mental Health and Recovery Board, its agencies and local law enforcement departments to enhance approaches and intervening with mental health clients utilizing a variety of alternative to incarceration when possible. We provided a training component for school personnel as well as dispatchers. There has been continued participation with the Portage County Suicide Prevention Coalition. We also participated with the Portage Council for the Prevention of Violence and assisted in activities throughout the community. The Police Department is taking an active role in the Portage County Bridges Out of Poverty Initiative. We had additional training and contact with Adult Protective Service situations involving multiple agencies.

TRAINING SUMMARY

Training is an integral part of establishing high professional standards within all organizations. The Kent Police Department is committed to providing the highest level of training, within financial constraints, for all components of the organization. This commitment is accomplished by using internal (in-service) and external training resources to provide advanced training, career development opportunities, and specialized training related to new law enforcement technology.

In-Service Training:

In-Service training was provided to all members of the department throughout the year. Much of this training was conducted through daily Roll Call training. Areas of Roll Call training include: review of department rules, policies, procedures; changes in state law and local ordinances; court rulings and decisions; community policing techniques; homeland security; officer survival; investigation techniques; firearm related issues; crime prevention concepts; and many other job-related subjects.

The police department also provided formalized and structured in-service training to police personnel. These training sessions were presented by state certified staff and department members in subject matters related to their fields of expertise. The 2010 in-service training included:

- Firearm training and certification for sidearms, shotguns and patrol rifles.
- Less-than-lethal weapon training, use of force decision-making and documentation
- Breath alcohol testing certification; electronic speed measuring devices

External Training:

External or outside training needs are met by sending personnel to specialized training academies, seminars, and workshops. These resources include both the private and public sector. Training needs are reviewed and determined for all components of the organization. The primary components are: administration, supervision/ management, investigations, records & dispatch, and patrol. The following courses represent specialized training members attended outside of the Department.

ADMINISTRATION: Police Executive Leadership College (PELC), Criminal and Personnel Law, National Incident Management System, Ohio Attorney General's Law Enforcement Conference, Ohio Association of Chiefs of Police (OACP) In-Service Training, Police Facilities: New and Renovation, Advanced Media Relations Training.

SUPERVISION & MANAGEMENT: Patrol Supervisors Tactical Command Class, National Incident Management System, S.T.E.P., OPOTA Instructor Skills Certification, Ohio Tactical Officers Training Conference, Communication Skills-Dealing with Difficult People, Victim Information and Notification System, State and Local Law Enforcement Training Symposium.

INVESTIGATIONS: Crime Analysis Strategies, Death Investigation, Video Intelligence Gathering Techniques, Bulletproof Mind, Child Sexual Abuse Prevention, DNA ID Collection and Preservation, Regional Gang Investigation Training, Identity Theft Investigation, Child Fatality Investigations, Clandestine Meth Lab Investigation, Domestic Violence Investigation.
