RING OPERATORS & REFEREES: SPECIAL SITUATIONS AT SANCTIONED MATCHES

Over the course of the season, a few situations in the ring come up regularly for the trappers and referees. While most of these situations are addressed within the current Rule Book, others are not.

At a recent USHA Board meeting, we discussed some of these unique situations and agreed that the following is how we will request ring operators and referees deal with these events at Sanctioned Matches for consistency...

1. It is the shooter's responsibility to check and initial their scorecard before leaving the ring. If they wish to protest/question their score, it must be done before leaving the ring. The trapper and referee do their best to get it right, but ultimately, the shooter must be responsible for their scorecard.
2. If the shooter experiences a 2nd barrel malfunction (cartridge or gun mechanical malfunction) they will be allowed a new target. In this situation, the current Rule (Article 11) directs that shooters will discharge their first barrel into the ground/air (safely) prior to attempting to break the target with the second barrel. A less well-known aspect of this rule is that a total of 3 such malfunctions (either first or second barrel) are allowed in any match. After the 3rd malfunction, all subsequent

malfunctions will be scored as lost. Ring operators please advise your trappers that malfunctions should be noted on the scorecard so we can keep track for scoring purposes. (Additionally, see Article 11 of the Rules: "upon occurrence of a misfire, the shooter is required to immediately point the barrel upward and request inspection by the referee")

3. In the ring, the trapper is responsible for making the initial "call" on all issues (hit/miss, malfunction, no bird, etc). The referee is there to back up the trapper and may over-rule him if the referee thinks it appropriate. Any disagreement is to be elevated to the shoot director/chief referee. No other spectators, participants or "off duty" referees should intervene with what is going on in an active ring.
4. It is the responsibility of the shooter to try and break any target thrown. Don't "hope" for a "no bird" call from the trapper or referee. If a bird immediately terminates into the ground and the shooter is quick enough to hit it prior to impact, the referee may call the bird dead. In this instance, the "tie" goes to the shooter. If the shooter did not have a reasonable opportunity to shoot the target, it will be a no bird with nothing established. If a thrown target makes contact with the ground (ground strike) but its course and speed is not altered, it will be considered a live bird and fair game. Conversely, if the trapper/referee detects a noticeable change in the bird's course after contact

with the ground (regardless of its continuing speed), the correct call should be a "no bird" or "one bird — one shot" depending on circumstance. Again, don't assume the trapper or referee is going to call a no bird. Treat every bird as fair game until advised otherwise.



NEW UNIVERSAL TRENCH (BUNKER) ORGANIZATION

A new Universal Trench (Bunker) organization for the U.S. has been organized under the auspices of the USHA.

Dr. Gino Bortone of Dallas Gun Club has received authority from FITASC to initiate sanctioned Universal Trench tournaments in the United States.

The USHA will be the umbrella organization under which the Universal Trench matches will be conducted. More information will be forthcoming and on the USHA web site.
