Hello Dear Ones,

How, in the world, are you? I hope this finds you taking a moment. This world of ours is becoming more and more divided and dangerous and we need to take a moment. Charlie Kirk, a conservative activist and Founder of Turning Point USA was assassinated on Sept 10 while speaking at Utah Valley University in Orem, Utah. He was only 31 years old. He leaves behind a wife and two children. It was a terrible tragedy and is indicative of the violence that is increasing in our nation. As a matter of fact, Mr. Kirk was killed on the same day as yet another school shooting, in Evergreen, Colorado.

People can agree of disagree with his political ideology and question his public statements, but violence is NEVER OK. It NEVER gives another the right to take a life or attempt to do so. I believe we have become so frustrated, helpless and hopeless as a society that there are those who think that violence is the only answer left. Unfortunately, I have seen social media posts that bear this out. So, right now, we need to take a moment:


- Take a moment and think about his family. They have lost a husband a father a relative we can relate to that, I know we can. We know that kind of hurt and loss. That should matter to us.
- Take a moment and think of our faith. We confess Jesus Christ as Savior and Lord. Charlie did too. We may agree or disagree on the specific components of that faith, but Charlie professed Christ. In that way, he was a brother in Christ to us ALL.
- Take a moment and pray. They say that "thoughts and prayers" are not enough. Others say they are tired of prayers in the midst of continued and escalating violence, especially in school shootings, but I say... Prayer is critical! Prayer is required! Yes, prayer needs to be accompanied by faithful, God-honoring action, but if we don't include God FIRST and ALWAYS when things like this happen, we are no longer "one nation, under God".

Dear Ones, The Church of Jesus Christ is built on love, reconciliation, and peace. Because of that, She mourns with us in Charlie's loss. She mourns with us in the aftermath of school shootings. She mourns with the perpetrators and their families as well. So, take a moment... and do not let personal opinion, political allegiance, anger or frustration sway us from the path.



Beloved in Christ,

I do not speak after every violent act, for sadly, in a world steeped in violence, hostility and division, my words would come so frequently that they risk becoming background noise. But today, I must raise my voice. The shooting of Charlie Kirk, a man of conviction, a citizen, someone striving to engage with students and to be heard, demands that I speak. No matter who we are, no matter our politics or perspectives, the taking of a human life is ungodly.

It is ungodly that another human being has lost their life over fear, over hate, over the willingness of someone to act on aggression. While we do not yet understand the motives of the assailant, there is not justification for murder. As United Methodists, we are guided by our Social Principles, which call us to uphold the dignity and worth of all people, to affirm basic rights and freedoms, and to work for restorative justice.

As I learned of the murder of Charlie Kirk and the shooting at Evergreen High School in Colorado, I had one visceral reaction:

ENOUGH!

- · Enough bloodshed.
- Enough violence.
- Enough hatred.
- Enough othering.
- Enough partisanship that persuades us to believe that anyone has license to dismiss, diminish, or
 destroy another person because they are different, outspoken, conservative or liberal, marginalized
 or mainstream.

We are all created in God's image. Every life bears value. Every voice deserves to be heard. Our faith teaches us not only to pray for peace, but to build peace. To seek justice rooted in mercy. To practice kindness. To open our hands to reconciliation. To oppose systems, political, social, or cultural, that encourage dehumanizing our neighbors. These are not optional ideals; they are central to who we are as United Methodists.

We must understand and hold sacrosanct that we belong to one another. Our obligations transcend ideology. Let us continue to commit ourselves to a path of peace, where disagreement does not lead to death, and where the beloved community, which demands mutual respect and the protection of basic human rights, is not a dream, but a reality we live into each day. As Christ followers, may we be at the forefront of engaging in generative theological discussions and civic pluralism. We must reclaim the ability to engage one another beyond our differences.

This tragedy pierces my heart. May the God of mercy receive Charlie Kirk into eternal rest. To Charlie Kirk's family, to those who loved him, to all who are shaken by this loss: I hold you in prayer. May your grief be held in communal care. And may this painful moment stir within us the courage to say, with conviction, "Enough!"


The Things We Take for Granted

The sanctuary of our church is one of the most beautiful in Southern Maryland. The cornerstone of the building was laid on May 26, 1957. I remember sitting in a folding metal chair outside on the grass at the northwest corner of the church as Pastor Smith blessed the structure.

As we sit in our church, we have a tendency to take for granted all the things surrounding us that make our sanctuary such an inspiring place to be. Did you know that once the building was completed church members donated the necessary funds to fill the sanctuary with everything you see today?

On Sunday, May 7, 1961 there was a special service to dedicate the memorials and gifts from the church members. John Wesley Lord, resident bishop, Orris Robinson, district superintendent, and Walter Smith, our minister, conducted the service. I was present for this event and sang in the Junior Choir conducted by Dorothy Gee.

As each item was dedicated the bishop read a quote from the Bible and the congregation gave an oral response. As an example, for the dedication of the altar and reredos (the beautiful red screen and ivory frame that is above the altar), the bishop said: "Arise, go up to Bethel and dwell there; and make thee an altar unto God." The congregation replied, "I will go unto the altar of God; even unto the God of my joy and gladness."

Another example was the dedication of the organ. The bishop said: "Praise God in His sanctuary. Praise Him with the sound of trumpet. Praise Him with psaltery and harp. Praise him with stringed instruments and organs. Praise ve the Lord." The people said: "O sing unto the Lord a new song. Let everything that hath breath praise the Lord. Praise ye the Lord." The organ was given by Frances Bowling Gill, my great-great aunt. The newspaper stated it was the finest musical instrument in this part of Maryland. It took the Moller Organ Company of Hagerstown, Maryland, 14 months to build at a cost of \$15,000 (the modern equivalent of \$172,000).

The items that were dedicated included: altar and reredos, alter cross, pulpit, lectern and Bible stand, baptismal font, communion rails and cushions, clergy seats, choir pews, pews, offering plates, organ, tower (steeple), sanctuary doors, chancel screens, choir screens, hymn boards, and the Narthex desk. Nearly all of these items are still in use almost seven decades later. Even the 2002 tornado did not destroy them with the exception of the steeple.

The church bulletin for this special service listed the names of all who provided memorial gifts and the items they funded. For example, the communion rails and cushions were donated in memory of Mr. and Mrs. George A. Wade given by Mr. and Mrs. Calvin Compton and Family and Mr. and Mrs. Frank Wade and Family.

So the next time you sit in our sanctuary, take a moment to think about the impressive surroundings. Each item was gifted by church members who valued and understood the importance of this church and the impact it would have on future generations. This house of God is now in our hands to protect and cherish.

THE DEDICATION OF THE ALTAR AND REREDOS

Bishop: Arise, go up to Bethel and dwell there; and make thee an altar unto God.

People: I will go unto the altar of God; even unto the God of my joy and gladness.

THE DEDICATION OF THE ALTAR CROSS

Bishop: Jesus said, Whosoever does not bear his own cross and come after me, cannot be my disciple.

People: Master, we will follow Thee wheresoever Thou goest,

THE DEDICATION OF THE PULPIT

Bishop: Ezra, the scribe, stood upon a pulpit of wood which they had made for the purpose.

People: The Spirit of the Lord is upon me; to preach good tidings

THE DEDICATION OF THE LECTERN AND BIBLE STAND

Bishop: Jesus as His custom was, went into the synagogue on the Sabbath Day, and stood by for the reading.

People: They read in the book of the law of God distinctly, and caused them to understand the reading.

THE DEDICATION OF THE BAPTISMAL FONT

Bishop: Arise, and be baptized, and wash away thy sins, calling on the name of the Lord.

People: Thou shall purge me with hyssop and I shall be clean; Thou shalt wash me and I shall be whiter than snow.

THE DEDICATION OF THE COMMUNION RAILS AND CUSHIONS

Bishop: We would remember Christ — remember that He has eaten with us the Bread and drunk the cup of our life; that he has communion with us in our joy and sorrow; and has tasted what it is for a man to die.

People: Let us eat of this Bread in remembrance of Christ, may the life which was in Him be in us also. Let us drink of this cup in remembrance of Christ; and may the Spirit in which He died be our spirit.

THE DEDICATION OF CLERGY SEATS

Bishop: Behold a throne was set in Heaven, and one sat on the throne; and round about the throne were four and twenty seats, and upon the seats I saw four and twenty elders sitting.

People: The Lord hath prepared his seat in Heaven; and His Kingdom ruleth over all.

THE DEDICATION OF CHOIR PEWS

Bishop: Be filled with the spirit; speaking to yourselves in psalms and bymns and spiritual songs, singing and making melody in your heart to the Lord.

People: It is a good thing to give thanks unto the Lord and to sing praises unto Thy name, O most high.

THE DEDICATION OF THE PEWS

Bishop: My house shall be called of all nations a house of prayer, saith the Lord; in it everyone that asketh receiveth; and be that seeketh findeth, and to him that knocketh, it shall be

People: Let the words of my mouth and the meditations of my heart be acceptable in Thy sight O Lord my strength and my Redeemer.

THE DEDICATION OF THE OFFERING PLATES

Bishop: Honor the Lord with Thy substance and with the first fruits of all Thine increase.

People: Bless the Lord, O my soul; and all that is within me, bless His Holy Name. Bless the Lord, O my soul, and forget not all of His benefits.

THE DEDICATION OF THE ORGAN

Bishop: Praise God in His sanctuary: Praise Him with the sound of trumpet: Praise Him with psaltery and harp. Praise Him with stringed instruments and organs Praise ye the Lord.

People: O sing unto the Lord a new song. Let everything that hath breath praise the Lord. Praise ye the Lord.

THE DEDICATION OF THE TOWER

Bishop: Hear my cry, O God; attend unto my prayer. For Thou has been a shelter for me, and a strong tower from the enemy.

People: I will abide in thy tabernacle for ever: I will trust in the covert of Thy wings.

Do you watch "America's Got Talent"? If so, you've seen the faces of the crowds at both the auditions and the live shows. Just look at those faces, happy, excited, enthusiastic, anxious for more, and having a wonderful time.

Fast forward to Sunday at church. Notice any difference? Now, imagine yourself standing in front of this group of people. You might be the liturgist, or perhaps a soloist, or the church choir. You might even be the Pastor preparing to deliver the message.

Do you think the attitude and disposition of the people you are addressing might have an impact on your ability to be effective? As someone who has been on stage, in front of a congregation, and also been a spectator, I've experienced both ends of the spectrum. I often think of it as a chicken-and-egg kind of situation. As an



audience, you expect the performance or presentation to be energetic, enthusiastic, and the best the individual can offer. But the person speaking, performing, or instructing is looking to the audience for feedback. If the event is not successful, was it because the individual just wasn't good, or was it because the audience was too laid back and did not provide visual or audible responses? Of course, you need both the chicken and the egg working together for a successful outcome.

Let me share two examples. One of my most challenging performances as a comedian was at a dinner at a Presbyterian church. It was a large crowd, and I was performing as they were eating dinner. People were talking, eating, and leaving me to feel much like a TV that was left on during dinner. Was I the chicken, or the egg? The second example was a performance I was asked to give at a Methodist church that I didn't realize was an AME (African Methodist Episcopal) church. I was terrified because I wasn't sure my humor would resonate with this particular audience. However, this congregation proved to be one of the most receptive I had ever encountered. I was welcomed and greeted with an audience that was excited and responsive. It was enormously enjoyable. I think that's what happens when the chicken and the egg partner.



Now I know what you're thinking. We're in church, and we should maintain an attitude of reverence and dignity. But consider something we hear almost every Sunday in our services: "It's a good day to be in the house of the Lord." That could easily be followed by the words of Psalm 118:24: *This is the day that the Lord has made; let us rejoice and be glad in it.*

Sure, we often applaud when a soloist or the choir blesses us with music or when someone gives a presentation on a project or effort underway in the church. But imagine how those singers or speakers would feel if they saw smiles and attentive faces in the congregation. I know, we're Methodists, and that means we're less comfortable with outward expression in our services, but remember, we're also not at the dentist's office. We can and should share our joy with those who are leading us in worship.

I'll leave you this week with the immortal words of my mother, who always sat in the front row for my shows, and always loudly opined, "I hope he's not going to tell those same old jokes again." She was neither the chicken nor the egg; she was the scrambler.
