The mission of the Quilts of Valor Foundation (QOVF) is to cover service members and veterans touched by war with comforting and healing Quilts of Valor.

Quilts of Valor was the idea of the mother of a returning soldier (from deployment in Iraq). It was a way to show love and gratitude for his service. Now around 200K quilts have been made and presented.

In February 2016, Debbie Black spoke to the Unity Study Club about QOVF. Dee Delaney was touched by the program and her interest started a wonderful way for the veterans in Armstrong

Co. to be honored. The first quilt was made by Peggy Methenia and presented to Leon James at the 2016 Caprock Roundup. Mr. James served in the Phillipians during WWII. Five more quilts were presented at the Veteran's Program at the Claude school on Nov. 11, 2016. Quilters included Dee Delaney, Peggy Methenia, Billie Peden and Brenda Whitney.

In 2017, QOV has grown and blessed the lives of more ladies who want to share love and comfort to our neighbors who have given so much in service for America. More quilts will be presented at the Caprock Roundup on July 8, 2017 and also at the Veteran's

The quilters already named have been joined by Carol Crutchmer, Casey McGee, Kathy Adams, Lynda Corbin, and Cindy Whitaker. The cost in time, fabric, and supplies is very high. So far, the ladies involved have covered these costs themselves. The cost of fabric for a quilt is from \$175 - \$200 and the cost to have the quilting done

is at least \$100. A few generous citizens have made cash donations to help with the cost of the quilts. Fabric (100% cotton) or cash donations would help assure more worthy veterans can be honored with Quilts of Valor in the coming years. Sheriff's Corner:

A Note from Sheriff Barnett

With summer upon us, we are going to have our more activity on our city streets. We have already been receiving calls on children out running around the neighborhoods. We have also been told they are peeking over fences, throwing things over the fence at pets, and setting off car alarms. There has been an incident of kids getting into a pickup on the west side of Claude and stealing an ashtray full of coins. Parents, please be aware of where and what your children are doing. There can be serious consequences for this type of behavior.

I know this is a small community with hardly anything going on, but we do have a lot of traffic from other areas coming thru and stopping at different locations. We do have a truck stop now. Not everyone is kind and nice. Children do not need to be roaming all over town at 2, 3, or 4 in the morning. It only takes a second for a child to go missing and end up in a trafficking ring. I know this is not a pleasant thought, but it does and can happen. Even in Claude. Sex traffickers start children, boys and girls, at very young ages. They ship them all over the world to be used. Let's keep our young people safe by keeping tabs on them. It is up to the parent first, then the rest of us.

We have also been informed of a home in Claude that allows Minors to consume alcoholic beverages. They not only go out and purchase it for the minors to consume, but allow them the

property to party on. We have been in contact with the TABC on ways to stop this activity, but we have been watching this home already. If anyone has a concern about MIP parties and knows where a party will take place, contact this office with the details. We have already had a young man lose his life at an MIP party I do not want another student losing theirs. Penalties are as follows:

The punishment for making alcoholic beverages available to a minor is a class A misdemeanor, punishable by a fine up to \$4,000, confinement in jail for up to a year, or both. Additionally, the violator will have his or her driver's license automatically suspended for 180 days upon conviction.

Persons 21 or older (other than the parent or guardian) can be held liable for damages caused by intoxication of a minor under 18 if the adult knowingly provided alcoholic beverages to a minor or knowingly allowed the minor to be served or provided alcoholic beverages on the premises owned or leased by the adult.

Sale to a minor is a class A misdemeanor, punishable by a fine up to \$4,000, confinement up to a year in jail, or both.


We will be out patrolling the streets like normal, but we will be watching for other activity as well. Parents, let's keep a tab on your children and be aware of the risks of letting them wander around unsupervised. Like always, let's watch out for our neighbors.

Men of Clay

Jeremiah was the weeping prophet, a man whose heart was broken over his nation. The people of God had drifted away from their allegiance to Him. But while visiting the potter's house, Jeremiah received inside from the Lord into how He works with His people.

In the potter's hand, Jeremiah saw a lump of clay. The clay had no meaning, no worth, no value... apart from the design in the mind of the potter. The potter takes a lump of clay and slaps it on the board, works out

the bubbles – any obstacles or lumps of clay that might be resistant – then begins to put his hand to the process. The wheel starts spinning. The potter works the clay inside out until the vessel he has in mind begins to emerge. He takes something worthless and makes it into a usable vessel, "as it seems right for him to do."

Clearly the clay is seen as man, the wheel seen as the events and circumstances of life, and the potter is the Lord. The wheel is incidental; the key to the illustration is the potter and the clay. It is the height of arrogance to think we are the masters of our fate or the captains of our ships and that we can chart any course we want as believers while God sits back and does nothing. He is committed to forming us into the image of Christ. We must learn to let the Potter do His work without resistance.

If we complain about

the times when God is molding us, we are in fact questioning the love and motives of the potter. Isaiah says, "woe to the one who argues with his Maker" – Isaiah 45:9. We don't need a change in circumstances; we need to change our attitude about our circumstances. Believers have no room in their vocabulary for words like luck, fate, or misfortune.

There is, in reality, a greater gulf between the potter in the clay than there is between God and man. The clay is not crafted in the image of the potter, but man is crafted in the image of God. With Clay, all that is required is the potter's plan. With man, the heavenly Father expects positive cooperation. We are to be responsive to His slightest touch.

But if the potter's work is to be permanent, the vessel must go through the fire. In the fire the vessel is strengthened and made it useful. Some of the greatest moments in our lives turn out to be the times when we are broken, molded, and reshaping by the Lord. Painful times cause us to cry out to God, and then we find Him, sitting, working, molding, and making us into His likeness.

Claude High School Students Send Care Packages

When a citizen of the United States armed forces goes over seas to serve it can be a lonely time. One thing that makes everything better is to receive a package from the States. Recently Coach Vickers and his teen leadership class spent time this Spring making packages and sending them to troops.

"My Teen Leadership class was looking for ideas for Service Projects. This idea was thrown around, it got legs and the kids really go in to it!" Vickers told The Claude News beaming with pride.

"Kids raised money to buy the goods to stock the 25 packages." Vickers continues. "Packages included deodorant, toothpaste, gum, sunflower seeds, letters, snacks, and other goods."

After the packages were all set and ready to be shipped they first go to an intake center in Miami, Florida. From there they are shipped overseas and distributed to troops. This was all done without thought on whether the students would hear anything in response to their work.

"Leslie Whitaker, school Librarian, received a call from a soldier in Afghanistan trying to get my email address. She gave it to them. I received an email from Major Grady Lowe in Afghanistan, who sent me a lengthy letter expressing gratitude and appreciation for what the Teen Leadership Class sent, as well as explaining what exactly they were doing overseas."

Teenagers sometimes get labeled as self centered and unfocused but through this class and the efforts of Coach Vickers

these kids were able to think past themselves and work hard to serve the soldiers of our country. Coach Vickers may be seen all the time as a coach on the sideline or the athletic director rooting on our teams but the one that is overlooked is his efforts in the classroom. The Claude News applauds him and the students of the Teen Leadership class.

The students who sent the care packages received the following thank you letter:

"Dear Mr. Vickers, My name is Major Grady Lowe, and I am a Soldier currently deployed to a small Forward Operating Base (FOB) located east of Kabul, Afghanistan. Each week on Friday I attempt to write a letter or email to thank those individuals and/or organizations that make an impact on me or my organization. I am writing your organization (Operation MAGA) because I found a letter from your organization in a care package we received. I wanted to write a letter to personally thank you and your entire class for that wonderful care package we received about ten days ago. I am hoping you can relay our sincere gratitude to everyone who contributed and let them know that we have received the package and honestly can't express our appreciation enough."

I would be remised if I didn't take a moment to tell you a little bit about what my team and I do over here. Our role is to Train, Advise, and Assist (TAA) the Afghan Special Operations Forces (Commandos and Spe-

cial Forces) that support the Islamic Republic of Afghanistan.

Currently, my team and I are creating a new National Mission Brigade for the Afghan Special Operations Forces. Daily we work shoulder to shoulder with Afghans teaching, training, advising, and when necessary assisting them to improve their capabilities so that one day coalition forces can come home, and the security forces here will be able to independently defend themselves and the people of Afghanistan from oppression and terror. In short, it is an awesome and rewarding job that you won't see if you watch the nightly news. Often our days are busy and the weeks pass slowly as we train, advise and assist Afghan Special Operations forces. This work can be both frustrating and rewarding, however without question the highlight on our small outpost is when mail arrives. Especially welcome, is unexpected mail, like care packages full of little things that are so ordinary back home, but hard to get here on a small forward operating base.

The package combined with the support from young men and women attending high school in America (especially in the Great State of Texas) expressing how thankful they are for the work the military is doing abroad was very uplifting. The letter was posted in our



work area to remind us of the support back home, and why we do what we do.

In closing, I know that it takes a big heart to send packages or write letters to people you have never met, and I want to assure you we enjoy it very much. These items continue to demonstrate after 16 years that people back home care about those still deployed abroad. We are thankful for the package from your organization, along with the caring thoughts of yourself, your staff and from the students of Claude ISD in Claude, Texas. Although the work we do will probably never be mentioned in the 24 hour news cycle back in America, I can assure you that the Afghan Special Operations Forces are fighting and being very successful in defeating violent extremist groups within their country. I can also assure you that because of people like yourselves the troops here are in high spirits, and if there is anything my team or I can do for you guys, my contact

info is on the top of this letter. Thank you again very much.

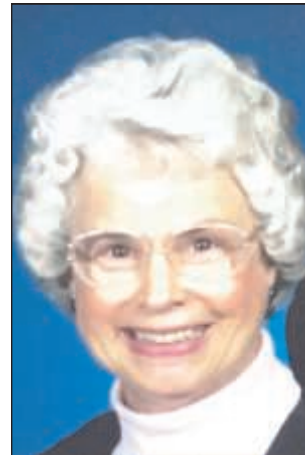

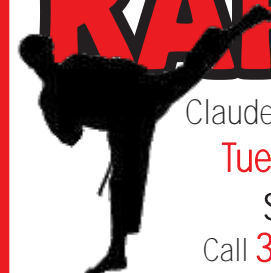

High School gets new Sprinkler System

Have you driven by the secondary school campus in the past two weeks you may have noticed some work being done on the practice field. The Claude Independent School District recently approved the installation of a new sprinkler system. The system is being installed by Milburn Landscaping out of Amarillo.

Speaking with Coach Vickers The Claude News was able to find out that a new sprinkler system was way overdue. Getting a new one will be improve not only the safety of our students but it will more cost effective than the one system was.

"The old watering

system was 30 years old." Vickers explained. "Now are able to water at the more effective times of the day. With the old system we were hand-cuffed to watering in the middle of the day, while somebody was on campus. Most of the time this was in the hottest part of the day. Now we can water at a more effective time."

The time of watering is not the only that will improve with the new system Vickers explained. "It would take roughly 2 hours a day for coaches or maintenance staff to physically move the pipes and fix constant leaks and deficiencies in the pipes. We will actually be using less water with the new



sprinkler system, which makes it cost effective."

"Because of the design and coverage of the new system, it is going to make the ground softer, which will ultimately be safer for our kids." Vickers continued. "This is not a football thing. The goal was to have safer field for the community to use.

That could be school or pee-wee football, kickball for PE, sprint work for Cross Country and Track. Logistically, it is going to be a cost effective edition to the district that will help create something that community can be proud of."

Make the Most of Medicare's Drug Coverage

Medicare offers prescription drug coverage to everyone with Medicare.

It's a good deal. Medicare subsidizes the outpatient drug benefit, generally paying about 75 percent of the program's costs. Unless you already have comparable drug coverage through another source, you should consider getting it when you sign up for Medicare's health care coverage at 65.

There are two ways to get drug coverage. If you're in Medicare's traditional fee-for-service program, you can purchase a "stand-alone"

drug plan from an insurance company. Or, if you decide to buy a private Medicare Advantage health plan, you can choose one that includes drug coverage.

To find the "stand-alone" drug plans and the Medicare Advantage health plans with drug coverage available in your area, visit Medicare's "plan finder" at www.medicare.gov/find-a-plan. You can also call Texas' Health Information Counseling and Advocacy Program for help at 1-800-252-9240.

You'll see there are significant differences in premiums and deductibles, in the co-payments the plans charge, in the particular drugs they cover and in the pharmacies

they use. That's why it's important to look at your prescriptions and individual circumstances when comparing plans.

Ask yourself: Which plans cover the drugs I take? Which plan gives me the best overall price on all my drugs? Which plans allow me to use the pharmacy I want? Which plans let me get drugs through the mail? What are the plans' quality ratings, such as for customer service?

You'll discover that many plans place drugs into different "tiers." The higher the tier, the greater your share of the cost will usually be. If you find that a prescription of yours is in a higher tier, you may want to ask your doctor whether there's a drug in a lower tier that would work as well.

You may also encounter plans that follow "step therapy." That means you must first try a



less-expensive drug that's been proven effective for most people with your condition before you can move up to a costlier drug. However, your doctor can request an exception if the costlier drug is medically necessary.

Medicare drug coverage is just like other kinds of insurance – you buy it

to protect yourself if and when you need it. Even if you're not on any prescriptions now, enrolling in a drug plan with a low premium guarantees you'll have coverage should your health decline and you require medication.

After you pick a plan that meets your needs, call the company offering it and ask how to join. You may be able to join online, by phone or by paper application. Don't be alarmed when you're asked to provide the number on your Medicare card during the enrollment process. In this case, it's OK.

The plan that's best for you this year may not be the best next year. If

so, you can switch to another plan between Oct. 15 and Dec. 7 each year. Indeed, it's smart to check all your options every fall to make sure you have the plan that best fits your needs and pocketbook. Your new coverage then begins on Jan. 1.

If you're having difficulty affording medications, you may qualify for the government's "extra help" program. Your annual income can't be more than \$18,090 if you're single or \$24,360 if you're married. Also, your resources can't exceed \$13,820 if you're single or \$27,600 if you're married.

Generally, you'll pay no more than \$3.30 for each generic drug and \$8.25 for each brand-name prescription in 2017. Thirty-five percent of Texans with a Medicare drug plan get extra help. To apply, visit the Social Security website, at www.socialsecurity.gov/i1020, or call Social Security at 1-800-772-1213.

People with Medicare have saved hundreds or even thousands of dollars each year thanks to their drug coverage. Be sure to make the most of yours.

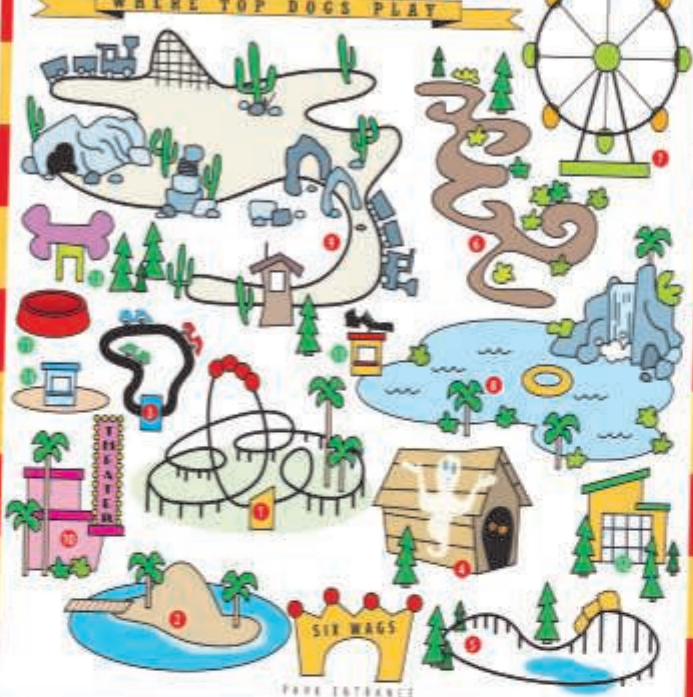
