Sheriff's Corner:

A Note from Sheriff Barnett

Our office is very excited. Our patrol vehicles are now updated with functioning camera systems. Last week 3 of our vehicles have been outfitted with the new camera system, the 4th vehicle will be outfitted when it arrives the first week of August. These new camera systems have a camera facing the roadway out in front of the vehicles and one that is facing the prisoner or inmate inside the vehicle. This records everything that they say to us and also what we say. This protects everyone.

We will be trading in the 2012 Tahoe that Deputy Murray has been babying for the last 3 years. It has over 200 thousand miles on it and has been having numerous mechanical issues. Just in the last 6 months we have used over half of our allotted budget for this year for mechanical repairs to this vehicle. With 6 months of the year to go we still have 3 other vehicles with over 100 thousand miles on them. We still have to provide the units with new sets of tires, so we can continue to patrol the county properly and with the normal maintenance of oil changes. This is at a cost of approximately 1200.00 per vehicle just for the new tires.

With the new budget year coming up, I was hoping for another new

vehicle to get rid of one of the problem patrol vehicles. We have started having several repair issues with one of the 2014 Tahoe's. We have already replaced the wheel hubs and are now having problems with the CV joints. We cannot just continue to put a band aid on this vehicle. It will continue to cost the county more money than it will be worth. I have requested a larger repair budget for these three vehicles, just so we can keep them running.

The one great asset we have here is the willingness of our deputies to take care of the equipment they were assigned. With them, we can fix a problem before it snowballs into major issues. They are also willing to keep up with the proper maintenance and hopefully prevent major repairs. Of course, there is always a chance we could end up with the blown motor, a rear end going out, or other costly items happening. We will at least have the one new vehicle that will be repair free for several months.

Jorean Smith

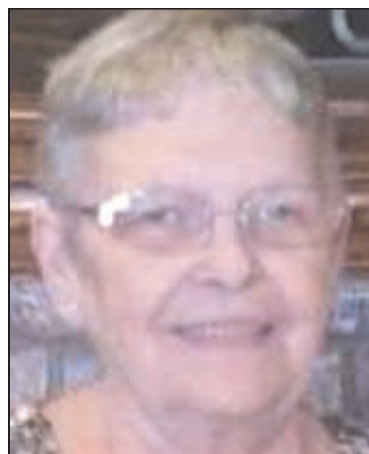
Jorean Hood Smith died peacefully at the age of 78.

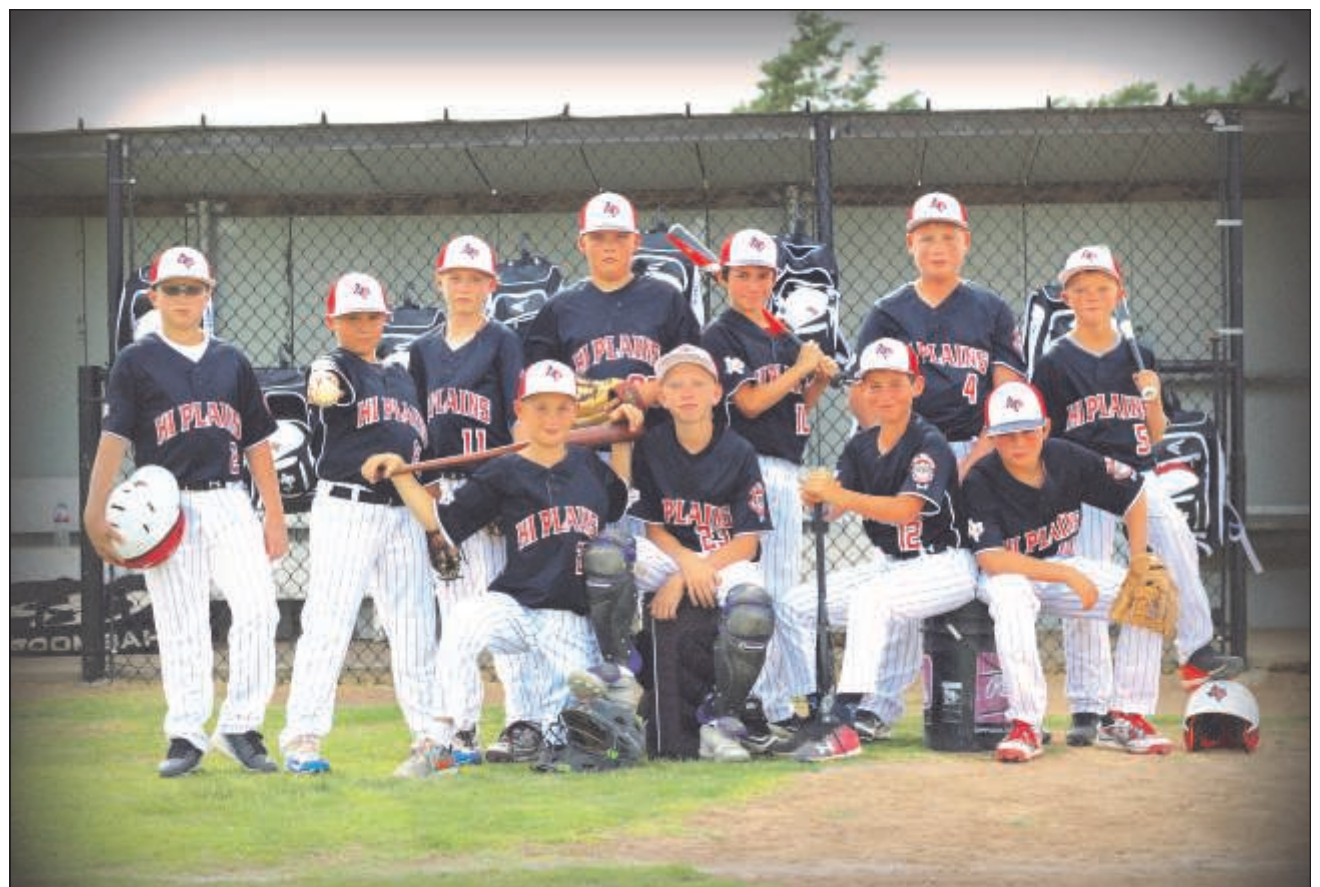
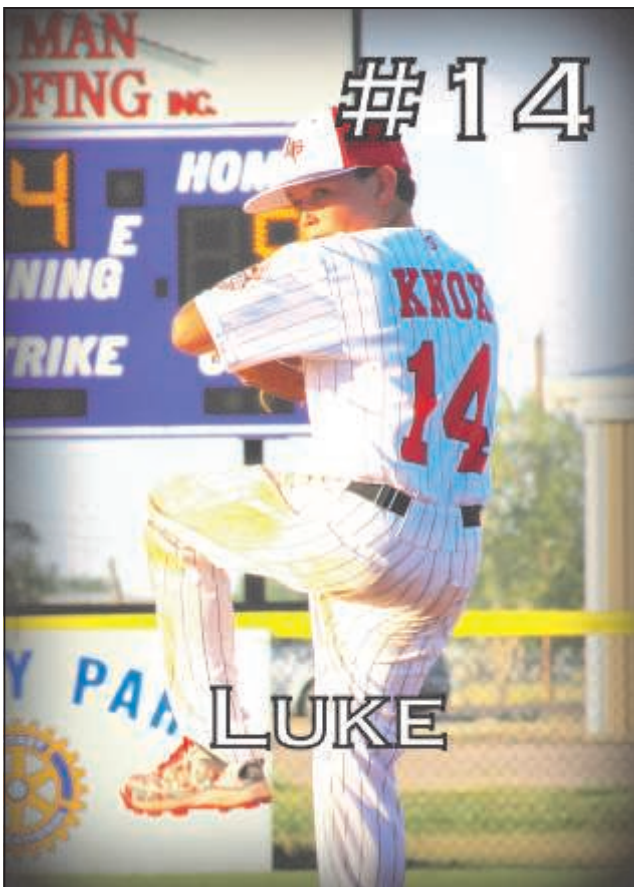
Claude Boys Play for High Plains All-Star Team

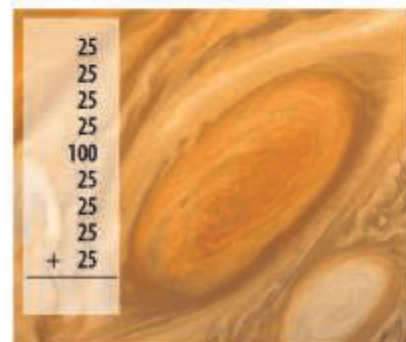
