

Balancing Love and Money: Tips for Financial Success in Your Relationship

Financial philosophies. One of you may have dined with a silver spoon, while the other always scrimped and saved. Talk through your attitudes toward money, and establish mutual ground rules for areas that could present problems.

Combining finances. Decide together if it’s best to combine your finances or keep your money separate. There is no one right way – it completely depends on individual preferences and life circumstances.

Roles and responsibilities. From doctor’s bills and mortgage payments to cell phones and car insurance, there are lots of financial responsibilities to juggle. Determine who will be responsible for what, at which times. Post a schedule if necessary.

Monthly budgets. The heart of any financial plan, creating a budget

and sticking to it will strengthen your finances and your relationship.

Spending limits. Agree to consult one another before making a purchase that exceeds predetermined limits.

Debt repayment. A 2015 study by Pew Charitable Trusts found eight out of 10 Americans carry some form of debt. Work with your partner to create a debt repayment strategy, and celebrate milestones together.

Financial goals. Saving money isn’t exciting without a goal in mind. Set goals that inspire you both, like having children, buying a house, saving up for a dream vacation or getting out of debt. Lean on one

another for accountability.

Your world is falling apart, very little seems to be working out as you planned, you are busier than ever and not gaining any traction. God feels further away than ever before. He is quite and hard to hear from.

So what are you going to do? Are you going to keep thinking, "I got this", or "I don't need any ones help". Sure that might be what the world tells us. That as Americans, we just need to pull ourselves up by our boot straps. I want to challenge your thinking on that. So, let me ask you again, "What are you going to do?"

The key to getting hold of God is to get alone with Him. God seldom meets us in a crowd. He calls us out of the crowd and deals with us personally. Whether you are talking about Jacob wrestling with God, Moses at the burning bush, Elijah sitting under the tree, or even our Lord sitting in Gethsemane, the key to power for the moment is getting alone with the Father.

In II Kings 4, Elisha encounters a widow that is desperate to feed her

family. The prophet tells her to go and borrow empty containers to be filled with oil. She did as instructed, gathered these empty vessels and took them to her home.

As you read the passage (Yes, you need to read this passage to completely see what God is doing here), you will note that three times a reference to a door being "shut". We can't be something in public that we aren't in private. Jesus told us to come away and rest awhile. We are so busy running here and there, we have little time to shut the door and get alone with God. Therefore, our lives are not authentic and we lack power, all because we are not spending time with the LORD.

Notice that Elisha did not send the widow out to get full vessels but empty ones to fill. God can only fill you to the measure of your obedience. He will not do any more for you until you obey what He already said for you to do.

Desperate people obey willingly.

They have exhausted all other avenues and options. Never second-guess or underestimate the heart of God when it comes to meeting people at the point of their need. Let God fill you and use you to the fullest.




On Tuesday, January 31st, the Claude Lady 'Stangs headed into Panhandle with an undefeated record and a first-time in a long-time victory over the Pantherettes earlier in the season. Hopes were high that the Lady 'Stangs would be able to maintain their record and claim a second season victory over Panhandle that night.

The game started off strong with the junior Jenna Cooper claiming the tip-off for the Lady 'Stangs. Both teams played a fast, aggressive game which allowed very little time to catch your breath as the ball flew up and down the court. The Pantherettes and the Lady 'Stangs also traded the lead through all four quarters of game play. There was not a clearly dominate team in the fierce match-up.

The Lady 'Stangs worked the ball and set-

up both their offensive and defensive plays with practiced skill. Jenna Cooper led the Lady 'Stangs in scoring with nine points. Shiloh Heck and Hannah Bennett were close on Cooper's tail with eight points each. These three scorers also contributed a combined total of seven steals and fourteen rebounds.

With mere seconds left on the clock, the Pantherettes pulled ahead and ultimately claimed the 44-41 victory over the Claude Lady 'Stangs. Junior Jaden Hughes had this to say about the heartbreaking loss to Panhandle. "The game was rough for us overall. Our defense was really solid; we just had trouble blocking out," Hughes explained. "As a

defense, we had over twenty steals. The loss will help us move forward and motivate us to continue to get better."

The Lady 'Stangs returned home on Friday, February 3rd, to play the Wheeler Mustangs. The girls were ready to reclaim their winning streak and hungry for a solid victory. The Lady 'Stangs used their renewed spirit to step up their game against Wheeler, and they dominated the game from start to finish. The final score had Claude defeating Wheeler 54-35.

Once again, the Lady 'Stangs were led by Jenna Cooper with twenty-two points, ten rebounds, three assists, four steals, and three blocks. These

numbers propelled Cooper to a career high mark, and after the game, she was recognized for achieving two thousand career points and one thousand career rebounds. Cooper's numbers only served to solidify the efforts by the rest of the Lady 'Stangs' team. The other leading scorers for the Lady 'Stangs were as follows: Shiloh Heck had eight points, three rebounds, three steals, and one block. Allison Giles and Jaden Hughes each contributed six points and multiple assists. Seniors Cate Bowles and Hannah Bennett each put up four points in addition to their rebounds and steals.

The week started off with an intense game against Panhandle on the Panthers home court. The Mustangs improved their score margins against the Panthers since their last match-up in January. They held the Panthers to a thirty-six point margin, but ultimately ended the game in a 31-67 loss.


Overall, shooting and defensive percentages were up for the Mustang team. Ty Ivy and Brady Gabel led the team's offense with eight points each as well as two and five steals respectively. Another top scorer for the Mustangs was sophomore Mason Smith. Smith contributed seven points and one steal to the team's totals.

On Friday, February 3rd, the Mustangs played the Wheeler Mustangs in Claude. In addition to recognizing the senior winter athletes, the Mustangs hoped to gain the victory over the Wheeler Mustangs. The Claude Mustangs came out strong in the first quarter. They played an aggressive defense with a total of sixteen offensive rebounds, twenty-five defensive rebounds, and thirteen steals.
