


Vandals Cut Christmas Lights around Courthouse Square

All the trees were sponsored this year and decorated beautifully. It was not uncommon to see traffic passersby pull off, circle the square and head on their way. Some took time for quick picture by a pretty tree or the firetruck. Locals, too many to count, commented on the lights and talked of making fond memories.

Armstrong County Beautification and Holiday Decorum or better known as the lighting committee are continuing to work on plans to add more lights and decorations next year. The idea is to expand the

ture events. The Scrooge or The Grinch would not agree with such actions of destruction. The Committee asks for future years that the community watch and report any suspicious activities around the courthouse displays.

The monthly meeting of Claude Chamber of Commerce was held on Tuesday, January 8th at the Armstrong County Museum Art Gallery. At 6:00 p.m., the meeting was called to order by the Chamber President, Tessa Waddell. Many chamber members were present in addition to some visitors from the community.

Before preceding to the financial report, everyone was reminded that the minutes from the last meeting were posted in the Chamber's member only Facebook group. The financial report was then given by the Chamber Treasurer, Jami Nite. The account balance in the Chamber's general fund was \$3,803.76 through December. Cash donations were collected for Dash for Claude Cash promotion, and bills were paid for the Chamber's P.O. Box and Dash for Claude Cash Advertising. Dues for 2019 are currently being collected with \$100 collected prior to the time of the meeting.

After the financial report, other open issues were discussed. First was a presentation about the Dash for Claude Cash promotion given by Howard Heath. 2,000 tickets were printed and distributed to participating Dash for Cash vendors. 763 tickets were turned in the night of the drawing. 87% of everyone who turned in tickets completed all the biographical data on the back. Johnny's gave out the most tickets. All businesses which participated had tickets turned in from their business. 96% of the tickets turned in belonged to Claude residents.

Next, Tessa Waddell read Billie Peden's report on the Shop in Claude event held on December 1, 2018. Peden reported that 360 attendees were counted and there were over 40 vendor booths. There is a bank balance of \$475.00 in the account for use for next year's advertising and event. Peden asks the Chamber to consider taking over the event.

A report was also given by Lendon Ray about the Christmas on the Square event held the same day. Ray says, "The Event was a success! Since the event, we have had many people and families stop to take pictures with the lights and the vintage fire truck too." There were event attendees from Claude as well as visitors from outside the area too. Unfortunately, 5 of the trees were vandalized sometime after the event. There was approximately \$1,000 worth of damage done. A report has been filed with the Sheriff's Office. Tessa Waddell, Howard Heath, and Susan Overcast plan to speak to Claude ISD Superintendent, Brock Cartwright, about the scheduling of game times for the tournament next year and further community cooperation in scheduling school and community events.

Waddell also presented the numbers for the Coffee Memorial Blood Drive held on December 1st. "The blood drive had a goal of 12 donors," said Waddell. "They met their goal 100%." According to the blood drive coordinators, other potential donors planned to participate but were unable to pass the pre-screening at this time. Coffee Memorial would

like to come back and do another blood drive in the future.

After the presentations, the meeting moved on to new business. Chamber member, Susan Overcast, talked about 2019 Chamber membership. Membership benefits sheets were handed out as well as forms for updating member information. New membership rates are \$25 for individuals and non-profits and \$50 for businesses. Dues are due annually as of January 1st. We have several businesses in the community that still haven't joined the Chamber yet so there is quite a bit of potential for growth. Last year, our high was 47 members. We continue to welcome new businesses to the community and encourage them to join the Chamber. Please continue to encourage others to join.

The non-profit status of the Chamber was discussed with Mark Schrader. Some individuals have asked, "When will Claude become a real chamber?" We are! We don't have to be a non-profit to be considered a valid Chamber but there are certain benefits to becoming a 501 (c)4 or 6—especially when it comes to pursuing grants and other funding opportunities. Right now, Schrader suggests that the Chamber needs to find things which will bring in a reliable income stream. Amy Lovell added that, in her experience, 85-90% of all money received by organizations like the Chamber come from donations made by individuals. Schrader added that we simply need to figure out what we want to do and start at the State level of becoming a cor-

poration or non-profit and move up from there. Cecil Miskin offered to pay the fees involved in becoming a corporation and made a motion that the Claude Chamber of Commerce incorporate as a Texas Not for Profit Organization. Motion was seconded by Lendon Ray. Motion carried by unanimous vote.

Looking forward to 2019, Tessa Waddell asked Chamber members in attendance to share what they would like to see from the Chamber in 2019. Suggestions included member education classes, continuing to work on community communication, continuing to build on the momentum established in 2018, encouraging lodging and daycare options, businesses cross promoting one another, and sparking our community to do bigger and better things.

Armstrong County Judge Presents at New Judge's School in Austin, Texas

On January 14, 2019 Judge Dianne Samaniego presented to approximately 80 newly elected Justice of the Peace Judges in Austin Texas. The TJCTC is responsible for providing all mandatory education for New Judges and returning Judges.

The presentation topics were Criminal Law - Driver Safety and Deferral and Criminal Law - Other Issues. The new JP's were divided into classes by size of court. Judge Samaniego's group was Small Courts - precincts of less than approx. 60,000. During 2018, Armstrong County Justice Court had 1,881 criminal cases filed.

Judge Dianne Samaniego was appointed

as Justice of the Peace in Armstrong County in October 2013. She is currently entered into her 2 full term in January of 2019. Judge Samaniego has been a mentor judge for new judges since 2016. She is an active member of the Justice of the Peace and Constable Association, where she serves on the JP Clerk Education Committee as a facilitator and a faculty member. She has previously served on the JPCA Legislative Committee and has testified as an expert witness during a Senate Hearing.

Judge Samaniego is married to her husband Reggie and they have two children, JesLee and Kyra. She is the daughter of Michael and Shirley Stavenhagen and has been a lifetime resident of Armstrong County.




