#### Dear Friends in Christ,

Have you ever tried living with two calendars? Living with one calendar is hard enough! Perhaps you tried having one calendar at home and one at work. It doesn't work very well does it? At some point the calendars will conflict and something is overlooked.

It is hard to believe, but we begin the season of Advent. Time truly does fly! The word Advent means arrival or coming. It anticipates the celebration of the birth of our Lord Jesus Christ. We remember God in Christ coming to us to redeem us from our sin. It also reminds us that He comes to us in the Word and Sacrament to give us His gifts of life and salvation. It further looks to the great day when Christ will come in glory on Judgment Day which will also be the Day of Resurrection. This will be the focus of our hearts during this season of the church year.

Advent as well reminds us of the tension we as God's children live in all the time. We live with two calendars. Advent begins a new year in the church. We serve Him who created us and redeemed us for all time. We further give thanks and praise to our God in whom rests our times and lives in His precious hands. May God bless each of us during this and every time of the year that we may live it for Him and to His glory. For each and every day of our lives is truly a precious gift from above. This is true no matter what calendar you are looking at or what time of the year it is. It is my prayer that God may richly bless you and your families this time and for all time through Jesus Christ our Savior and King.

# ST. PETER'S LUTHERAN SCHOOL NEWS by Mr. Tessendorf



**7th Grade Teacher Next Year:** St. Peter's has extended a Call to Rebecca Erdman to serve as the 7th grade teacher next school year. Miss. Erdman is currently in Taiwan completing her student teaching experience. It will be February before we know if she has accepted the Call to serve at St. Peter's. She plans to visit in late January or early February before making a decision. I will let you know as soon as we receive an answer from Miss. Erdman. Please keep her in your prayers.

**Kindergarten Teacher Next Year:** Natalie Schwartz has agreed to serve as the kindergarten teacher starting with the 2020-2021 school year. She has also accepted the position of the Long Term Substitute during Mrs. Gunther's maternity leave.

**Capstone Ministries:** The Chapel offerings for the 2nd guarter will be given to Capstone Ministries. This ministry works with street children in Kisumu. Kisumu is the largest city in western Kenya. Capestone believes that family is the divine structure God designed for the rearing of children. Family provides the necessary protective environment in which children can grow and develop. More than 1,000 children live on the streets of Kisumu. They survive by begging and stealing. They suffer from skin diseases, abuse, poor nutrition and lack of sanitation. But mostly they lack love and attention of a nurturing family. Daily, the staff of Capstone is on the street showing these children the love of God in Jeus Christ. Through counseling and an ongoing outreach program, the boys are reunited with their families.

Pastor Schmelzer, the director of Capstone Ministries, will be at St. Peters on December 4 to present information about the ministry to the student. He will also be giving the sermon at the Advent Service on December 4. .

Accreditation Update: The self-study part of the accreditation process is nearing an end. Our goal is to have the Self Study completed by the Christmas Break. The Validation Team, who makes an on-site visit, is being formed. The visit is scheduled for February 9 -11, 2020. The Validation Team will have recommendations on how St. Peter's Lutheran School can get even better. Those recommendations become the bases for the School Action Plan - also known as the School Improvement Plan.

The results of the Accreditation Process will be shared once they are available. Please keep this ongoing process in your prayers.

**Christmas Gifts:** Christmas is a glorious time of year. We remember the best gift, our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. We remember the Gold, Frankincense and Myrrh the Magi gave to a young Jesus. Jesus, in His Sermon on the Mount, is teaching those who follow Him that worrying about the necessities of life is idolatry: worshipping a false god. This is because worry and anxiety show what we care about. Our anxiety reveals what we love and to what we're devoted. It reveals what we trust in.

This is why our Lord begins this section with an overarching principle: "No one can serve two masters, for either he will hate the one and love the other, or he will be devoted to one and despise the other. You cannot serve both God and money."

But you say: "I must eat and drink. I must have clothing to wear and have a home in which to dwell." Yes, all these things you need. And Jesus says that your Father in heaven will ensure that you have them. He demonstrates this with a simple argument.

Your Father in heaven feeds the birds of the air, who neither sow, nor reap, nor gather into barns. He clothes the lilies of the field, who neither toil nor spin but are arrayed more luxuriously than Solomon in all his glory. If, then, your Father in heaven feeds the birds and clothes the lilies, how will He not also feed and clothe you when you are worth more than they are?

For you know that you are worth more than them. You are worth infinitely more. You are worth the price of the eternal Son of God. Did the Son of God come down from heaven and become a lily? Did he descend and take on the form of a bird? No!

He came down from heaven and became a man: flesh of our flesh and bone of our bone. He is one of us, our brother. And what did He do when He became flesh to dwell among us? He gave His holy, precious blood and His innocent suffering and death, that you might be His own and live under Him in His kingdom forever.

God became man in Christ Jesus. He lived the life we failed to live, and He died the death we deserve because of it. He was raised again on the third day to overcome sin and death ... for us. He was crucified for our transgressions and raised for our justification. So, if your Father in heaven has given His Son to die for us in order that we might live with Him eternally, how will He not also give us all things to support this body and life?

To be anxious about the necessities of life, to devote yourself to food and clothing, to care about this and find security in it, is to serve another god. It is to deny that you will live forever because Jesus, the Son of God is risen from the dead, lives and reigns for all eternity. It is to believe that God – who created you, redeemed you by the death and resurrection of His Son, and sanctifies you by His Spirit – will not keep His promises of sustaining you in this life.

Jesus says this: Seek first God's kingdom and His righteousness. God's kingdom is His rule among us. His rule among us comes when our Father in heaven gives us His Holy Spirit, so that by His grace we believe His holy Word and lead godly lives here in time and there in eternity. This is what we ask God to do for us in the prayer Jesus taught us.

Your Father in heaven knows what you need – food and clothing, house and home, etc. – and He promises to give it to you. Chief of the things you need is His grace and mercy in His Son, Jesus Christ. So, seek after that. Those who seek will find. And all the necessities of life, our Lord says, will be added to you.


