#### St. Peter's Lutheran Church - Quarterly Voters' Meeting - April 25, 2019

Meeting was opened by Church Elder Seth Troxel. Devotion and prayer led by Roger Tessendorf.

There was a call for everyone to sign the attendance sheet. Minutes for the January Voter's meeting and the Special Voter's Meeting (3-31-19) were presented for approval. Motion was made by Phil Rogers to accept the minutes, 2nd by Mark Meyer, passed by voice vote.

Seth reminded the attendees about the change in church service times.

Pastor's Report - The numbers were shared for membership, Sunday worship, private communions, funerals and marriages. Motion was made by Don McCauley to accept member changes with the addition of a "release at own request" for Claire Fedderly. 2nd by Phil Rogers, carried by voice vote

Principal's report was given by Mr. Tessendorf. A Power Point was shared that included the following: enrollment numbers & High School Advanced English Classes numbers congratulations to St. Peter's alum Makenna Halvensleben for attaining a perfect ACT score Mr. Dehn's acceptance into the SLED program (School Leadership Development Project) Mrs. Fry's nomination for the NBC Crystal Apple Award Lutheran Schools Week & Grandparent's Day, various school activities and groups a reminder to fill out the school survey by April 30 Mrs. VanMeeteren's announcement that she will not return to St. Peters for the 2019/20 school year

Brian Albrecht, Chairman of the Board of Education, asked approval from the congregation to call a 7th grade teacher to fill the vacancy left by Mrs. VanMeeteren. Motion was made by Mark Meyer to ask for nominations from the congregation for the 7th grade vacancy. 2nd by John Gerike. Discussion: Mrs. VanMeeteren was only 75% but the new position would be 100%. The proposed budget is based on this being a full-time

position and includes insurance. Roger Tessendorf commented that graduating teachers are in short supply, but he is aware of one individual who would consider a call to St. Peters. Motion to call a new teacher passed by voice vote.

2019-2020 Budget was presented by Cindy Nellessen, Treasurer. She explained the upcoming change in the staff insurance coverage policy and the change from a HRA to a HSA which will reduce expenses and will be an overall benefit to those taking the insurance. DCE intern funding – The budget included \$10,000 of the approximately \$23,000 with the balance to come from the Emily Gerike Endowment Fund. The Board of Education proposed a 4% increase for staff, which is not included in the budget. Motion was made by Bob Corey, 2nd by Cal Maurer to approve the budget as presented. 2019-2020 Budget was passed with no pay increase included. Passed by voice vote.

There was discussion about why we keep non-active members on the roster when we have to pay into the synod for them. It was stated that non-active members do sometimes come back. There was also a comment about going back to holding Confirmation on Palm Sunday.

John Thompson gave a report on the Church Restoration project. He stated that the Roof project is progressing quickly. They will start on the north side next week during which time the playground can't be used. The color for the flashing has been picked. Additional work that will be need to be done in the not-too-distant future includes brick & mortar on the towers, interior work on the towers and interior work on the church. Other project updates: The motor for the bell has been received and installed, but not yet wired. The school's janitor is leaving at the end of next week, John is requesting a replacement.


#### **D.A.R.E. GRADUATION**

St. Peter's 5<sup>th</sup> grade along with other 5<sup>th</sup> graders from the Reedsburg School District recently graduated from the D.A.R.E. Program at a ceremony on May 8<sup>th</sup>, at the CAL Center. Baron Koch was an essay winner, along with honorary mention winners, Amalie Johnson and Sawyer Roloff.

#### D.A.R.E. Essay by Baron Koch

I'm going to tell you what to do in bad situations. I'm very glad I had D.A.R.E. Otherwise I would not know what to do in bad situations. I'm going to show you what to do. Wait, and did you know alcohol weakens the heart muscle, and reduces the amount of blood pumped to and from the heart.

I learned what to do if someone is trying to get you to smoke, sneak out and do something bad, and way more. So that's why we learned the DDMM. Dare stands for drug, abuse, resistance, education. If someone is trying to get you to do something bad that's your age, that's peer pressure. Some possible ways your body feels stress is, frustration, headache, and sweating. And I have also learned that alcohol, drugs, and abuse and more is not good.



I plan to use what I learned because I want to stay healthy and not do drugs. Tobacco kills about 400,000 Americans each year. If someone says they want to smoke you should say no. Use the DDMM, and leave. If you want to be responsible you should, not drink a lot of alcohol. If you do that's not responsible. So be responsible and do not do drugs or anything else that could harm you or someone else.

Some facts about drugs and alcohol. Alcohol is illegal for anyone under 21. There are 75,000 alcohol related deaths each year so in general you should not drink lots of alcohol. Drugs, there are more than 200 harmful chemicals in cigarette smoke. Smoking can, give you lung cancer, you can get mouth cancer, and other health issues.

Lots of kids get bullied around the world. That's not good. Bullying is when someone is being mean to you and picking on you for a very long time. If you see bullying don't walk away. You should tell a trusted adult. If you're getting picked on by kids or other adults tell someone right away. If it's abusing call 911. You should feel empathy for people that are getting picked on too. And this is why we learn D.A.R.E.

Some disciples of John the Baptist were questioning him about the baptism and preaching of Jesus. Many disciples

were going to Jesus instead of John the Baptist.

John the Baptist answers: "A person cannot receive even one thing unless it is given him from heaven" (John 3:27).

John the Baptist says this to show that Jesus, His teaching, and His baptism are from heaven. God provides everything we have in body and soul.

We are taught this in the meaning of the Apostles' Creed in the *Small Catechism*.

In the First Article of the Creed, we learn that God has made us and everything in the universe.

"He has given me my body and soul, eyes, ears, and all my members, my reason and all my senses, and still takes care of them. He also gives me clothing and shoes, food and drink, house and home, wife and children, land, animals, and all I have. He richly and daily provides me with all that I need to support this body and life. He defends me against all danger and guards and protects me from all evil. All this He does only out of fatherly, divine goodness and mercy, without any merit or worthiness in me. For all this it is my duty to thank and praise, serve and obey Him."

In the Second Article of the Creed, we learn that God sent His Son, Jesus, to humble Himself by taking the form of a servant. In so doing, He "has redeemed me, a lost and condemned person, purchased and won me from all sins, from death, and from the power of the devil; not with gold or silver, but with His holy, precious blood and with His innocent suffering and death, that I may be His own and live under Him in His kingdom and serve Him in everlasting righteousness, innocence, and blessedness, just as He is risen from the dead, lives and reigns to all eternity."

In the Third Article of the Creed, we learn that the fruits of what Jesus Christ, the Son of God, did are given to us through the work of the Holy Spirit in the Church.

"That I cannot by my own reason or strength believe in Jesus Christ, my Lord, or come to Him; but the Holy Spirit has called me by the Gospel, enlightened me with His gifts, sanctified and kept me in the true faith. In the same way He calls, gathers, enlightens, and sanctifies the whole Christian church on earth, and keeps it with Jesus Christ in the one true faith. In this Christian church He daily and richly forgives all my sins and the sins of all believers. On the Last Day He will raise me and all the dead, and give eternal life to me and all believers in Christ."

Indeed, "a person cannot receive even one thing unless it is given him from heaven."

But how easy is this for us to forget? How easy is it for us to think that what we have in life is because we have earned it?

How easy is it for us to forget that all our skills – the abilities of our hands and minds, the ethic to work diligently, and the desire to improve – is given to us from heaven, just as John the Baptist said?

How easy is it for us to forget that it is Christ alone, and the work of the Holy Spirit, that reveals His salvation to us, delivers it to us, and that none of this is our doing?

Sure, we have responsibility for coming to church, for delving into God's Holy Word, and for praying without ceasing.

But even these responsibilities are given to us from heaven. These duties are not earned; they are given in response to what He has accomplished for us.

Everything we have, and everything we are – in both body and soul – are gifts from God in heaven. Let us then respond in thanksgiving and give back to Him as He asks – with a first-fruits, generous proportion offering of what He has given to us.
