Emily has been attending English class at the church for a little over a year. She is a high school girl, and can be a little flighty. But recently during an English chapel time something clicked. We were studying scripture in English and she was able to understand the gospel on a deeper level than ever before.

Her friends, who came with her, even noted that she seemed to act and think like a Christian.

Shawn is also a high school student. He loves philosophy. This is a little strange for a guy his age here, but through that interest he actually approached me (you would think it would be the other way around) about studying the Bible. We have been reading through the gospels and discussing them together at a local coffee shop.

Dr. Olympic is a researcher in Minamata. He has been attending English classes for almost 2 years. He has a daughter who attends a Christian preschool. When I asked him why he sends her there since he is Buddhist he said "I want my daughter to become more like the Christians I know." He has a growing interest in the scripture as well.

Finally, Paul is a college student friend of mine who attends a

university in a nearby city. Whenever he is home for the weekend, he attends church and English. He is also in the process of reading through the gospels. Recently, at a conference an invitation was given for people who wanted to follow Jesus. He raised his hand and prayed to receive Christ. We are praying for his baptism in the near future.

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Closing the Deal

Recently I have been struggling with a particular aspect of sharing the gospel. Almost all of my contacts know the gospel on a basic level. Many of them can even discuss fairly deep theological issues pertaining to the gospel without too much trouble. The issue is that I don't know how to close the deal. I don't know where the line is between pressure and encouragement.

WHAT'S MY PART?

Currently we are having a lot of success building relationships where we can freely talk about the gospel and spiritual things. These people are studying scripture both in English class and on their own. They are also coming to me and other church members when they have problems or need advice. They even say that they feel something during worship or prayer. They are emotionally, intellectually, and relationally interested in the gospel. But there is still a disconnect and people are not becoming Christians.

What, after all, is Apollos? And what is Paul? Only servants, though whom you came to believe-as the Lord has assigned to each his task. I planted the seed, Apollos watered it, but God made it grow. So neither he who plants nor he who waters is anything, but only God, who makes things grow.

1 Corinthians 3:5-7(NIV)

It's a good problem to have though, isn't it? This time a few years ago we were struggling to find people willing to talk to us. Now we are trying to figure out the salvation aspect of things. Hopefully in a year or two, the problem will be how to disciple all the new believers. But in the present, the problem is trying to figure out what my role is in that step of faith.

I understand the passage above to a degree. But I don't know what it means in a daily sense. When do I know if I cross over from loving encouragement into pressure? Is pressure always bad? I know there is a burning in my heart to see my friends come to know Jesus. I am confident that I have been called to this country to help see that happen. So I will continue to prayerfully, and through both success and failure, figure things out as I go.
