
ENCOURAGEMENT TO PRAY. St. Luke shows a keen appreciation of Jesus' prayer life. More than any other Gospel writer, he mentions Jesus at prayer and Our Lord's approach to prayer.

Today we hear the core of Jesus' teaching on prayer: he dictates the *Our Father*, he offers a parable on persistence, and he assures the disciples that God hears our prayers.

Luke's version of the *Lord's Prayer* is more direct than St. Matthew's. Having taught his disciples this simple, daily prayer, Jesus reassures them that God answers prayers. He tells a parable about a persistent neighbor who asks a friend for bread at midnight. The friend is already in bed and has no desire to disturb his family by opening the door. But because the neighbor is persistent, the sleeping man gets up and gives him all that he needs. If a neighbor is willing to help us if we are persistent enough, how could God not respond to our requests?

We find another example of prayer in the 1st Reading from Genesis.

Abraham is not just a great negotiator. He uses



this skill on behalf of others. He attempts to persuade God to spare "the whole place" for the sake of a few. Listening to Abraham, it is like over-hearing a son and his father. The father lets the son talk. All the while, the son is gradually letting his heart become as open and generous as his father's.

The lessons here are many. For one, God loves to extend his Divine Mercy through us. Abraham's pleading is an illustration of what Jesus is teaching his disciples. *Keep at it Persevere in asking for*

good things for others, even yourself. You are thereby being pulled into the very Goodness of God.

Jesus' reminds his disciples to be bold: *ask and you will receive.*

We can ask for anything. 'Never hurts to ask.' Asking always entails an education if we're willing to listen for responses. Sometimes, I've found, it takes years to receive the

Wisdom God is offering. If we don't know what to ask for, *ASK FOR THE HOLY SPIRIT!!* This is how Jesus concludes his teaching on prayer. Such a request is irrefusable! Sounds like our young people got a taste of the Holy Spirit last week...

That rocky start proved to be a blessing as our groups joined forces.

The Holy Spirit's presence was felt almost immediately upon our arrival at the Convention Center in Rochester. Many lives were changed and hearts were opened to the Lord during our trip. Notable events included:
