





From the Pastor's Pen

FAMILY, WHERE TRADITIONS BEGIN. "None of us gave ourselves life or singlehandedly learned how to live. All of us received from others both life itself and its basic truths, and we have been called to attain perfection in relationship and loving communion with others. The family, founded on indissoluble marriage between a man and a woman, is the expression of this relational and communal aspect of life. It is the setting where men and women are enabled to be born with dignity, and to grow and develop in an integral manner.

"Once children are born, through their relationship with their parents they begin to share in a family tradition. Together with the gift of life, they receive a whole patrimony of experience. Parents have the right and the inalienable duty to transmit this heritage to their children: to help them find their own identity, to initiate them to the life of society, to foster the responsible exercise of their moral freedom and their ability to love on the basis of their having been loved and,

above all, to enable them to encounter God." Pope Benedict, July 9, 2006, at the 5th World Meeting of Families.

One family tradition we honor this time of year is the Christmas tree. Many a family memory is created around harvesting and setting up this tree. Where did that come from?

The Romans celebrated the winter solstice with a feast in honor of Saturn, the god of agriculture. They decorated their houses with greens and lights and exchanged gifts.

In England, before the arrival of Christian missionaries, Druids used evergreens during winter solstice rituals, as well as holly and mistletoe. Just as the word *ever*-green implies, these plants were used to symbolize eternal life.

In the Middle Ages, Germans and Scandinavians began placing evergreen trees inside their homes. Our modern Christmas tree evolved from these early traditions, most likely arriving in the United States through German immigrants to Pennsylvania and Ohio.

The custom spread slowly. In 1851, Pastor Henry Schwan of Cleveland, OH appears to have been responsible for


decorating the first Christmas tree in an American church. His parishioners condemned the idea as a Pagan practice (misinterpreting Jeremiah 10:2-4). The Puritans banned Christmas festivities in New England. Schools in Boston stayed open on Christmas Day through 1870, sometimes expelling students who stayed home. Objections eventually dwindled.

Also in 1851 the Christmas tree market was born. Catskill farmer Mark Carr hauled two ox sleds of three dozen evergreens into NYC. He sold short trees for a nickel or a dime, and 8-10 footers for a quarter. Europeans liked small trees about four feet high, while Americans pre-ferred Christmas trees to reach from floor to ceiling.

By 1900, one in five American families had a Christmas tree, and 20 years later, the custom was nearly universal. Christmas tree farms sprang up during the depression. Since the nurseries couldn't sell evergreens for landscaping, they cut them for Christmas trees. By WWII, the tradition of the family Christmas tree was pretty well set for most Americans. In 2012, 46 million Christmas tree seedlings were planted by U.S. growers


