From the Pastor's Pen &



GETTING REAL. Hypocrisy is pretending to be what one isn't. Jesus has little time for it. He deplores hypocrisy.

Maybe Jesus is so vocal about it because he knows it is a sin that will follow his disciples into the Church he intends to found. It's open season on Catholics these days. Either certain leaders are called out as morally bankrupt or the flock is ridiculed for following such men. It is a very tough spot to be in.

Hypocrisy wounds witness. Hypocrites have no teeth. Religious people rightly claim some moral authority but their legs are cut out from beneath them when we don't back up words with action. Result, the appeal to a Higher Power looks ridiculous.

One big problem with hypocrisy, then, is that to avoid it, we might quit witnessing. But how is that the winning ticket? Fact is, we've all fallen from grace. If I think I haven't, would I welcome a few journalists to come snoop around and talk to my acquaintances?

If we are called to witness to Jesus and the Good News of his mercy, then we should hold dear two great opposites of hypocrisy.

The first is **REPENTANCE**. Repentance blames no one else. It makes no excuses. It takes full responsibility, exchanging God's mercy for a change in life. This is a process, and merciful people understand that—for themselves and for others.

The second opposite of hypocrisy is **INTEGRITY**. Integrity comes from a correspondence between the inside and the outside—one of Jesus' main points. Hypocrisy is where outward appearance contradicts inward thoughts, feelings, convictions.

A while back, I met a man who "used to be Catholic." In the course of our conversation, he was exalting the religion of John Wayne who claimed he could find God under the big blue sky, and didn't need a church.

I assured him, 'Sure, you can find God in the great outdoors.' I also reminded him that John Wayne converted to Catholicism on his death bed. Religion under the big blue sky was not his last word.

The gentleman replied in a kindly enough manner, "You priests always have a response."

My point here is that integrity works both ways. The outside has to match the inside and vice-versa.

Jesus comes down hard on the Pharisees because they like to look religious on the outside but are self-

serving on the inside. My John Wayne fan likes to think he's a friend of God on the inside but does little or nothing to show it on the outside—Holy Communion has become a distant childhood memory.

The only way to avoid hypocrisy is to repent and live a life of integrity: let our outside behavior reflect our inner graced convictions. Thing is, this is a process. We're never done once for all. It's a lifestyle.

I received my first b-day card this past week. It read, "It's not an aging process, it's a perfecting process." That's what I'm talking about.

It boils down to what we hear in our 2nd reading from St James, "Be doers of the word and not hearers only, deluding yourselves." It's an invitation to be honest. We're honest Christians when we put into practice what our heart of hearts (God's voice, conscience, *Catechism 1776*) says is right. It's only normal that it happens over time. Is this not what it means to *get real*?



Contact the Parish Office if interested. Planning begins in 2 weeks. We'd like to have the teams in place next week.





Getting More out of CONFESSION

As a child, did you ever say "Sorry" to a brother or sister because your mom or dad made you do it? Maybe you hit someone or refused to share with another child, and you got caught. In an effort to teach you right from wrong, a parent forced you to look your sibling in the eye and apologize for the action. Maybe you apologized out of fear for your actions.

Some people say they are sorry to God—and to others—strictly because they fear the consequences. We might regret the action due to the punishment it brings but not in and of itself. As we grow closer to God, however, we begin to see that sin is less about breaking rules and more about breaking the Father's heart.

That's because sin hurts or destroys relationships—with God and others. That relationship is easily restored through the Sacrament of Reconciliation.

Jesus is the Divine Physician. He respects our free will, so he

won't force us to come to him for forgiveness and mercy. But he is always waiting for us to come to him. He wants to heal us and make us whole again.

Perhaps you already love Confession, or possibly it's your least favorite thing to do. Whatever the case, if you want to become all that God intends you to be, this Sacrament is critical to your life. You need to be able to



acknowledge where you have fallen short and humbly seek to do something about it. Making Confession a regular part of your life is a simple way to move in the right direction. God takes what is broken in us and makes it new again. So what are we waiting for?
