

From the Pastor's Pen &



Vitnesses of the Miracle of the Sun kneel on the dry earth at Fatima 101 years ago (CNS)



The Miracle of the Sun, or the Miracle of Fatima, took place on October 13 1917. It was perhaps the most stupendous event of the 20th century. And yet it is hardly known outside the Church, and not well enough known within it.

The people who braved the terrible rainstorm which struck Fatima that day had gone there because Our Lady, back in July, had promised the three children of Fatima—Francisco, Jacinta, and Lucia—that she'd perform a miracle. Exactly what sort of miracle they didn't know, but they came from all over Portugal, despite horrible weather. Many sceptics and unbelievers also went expecting to see a fiasco that would turn the Church into a laughing stock.

A crowd of 70,000 or so, including newspaper reporters and photographers, gathered at the Cova, place of the apparitions. The downpour of rain had finally ceased and a thin layer of clouds shielded the silver disc of the sun such that it could be looked upon without hurting one's eyes.

At noon, Our Lady appeared to the children. The oldest of the visionaries, Lúcia, described seeing the Lady as "brighter than the Sun, shedding rays of light clearer and stronger than a crystal ball filled with the most sparkling water and pierced by the burning rays of the Sun." Lúcia called out to the crowd to look at the Sun. Sometime while Lucia was pointing towards the Sun and seeing various religious figures in the sky, the Sun appeared to change colors and rotate, like a fire wheel.

Many eye witnesses wrote about the event.

Portugal's most influential newspaper, pro-government and anti-church, O Século, reported "Before the astonished eyes of the crowd, whose aspect was biblical as they stood bare-headed, eagerly searching the sky, the sun trembled, made sudden incredible movements outside all cosmic laws—the Sun 'danced' according to the typical expression of the people."

An eye doctor Domingos Coelho, writing for the newspaper Ordem reported "The Sun, at one moment surrounded with scarlet flame, at another aureoled in yellow and deep purple, seemed to be in an exceeding fast and whirling movement, at times appearing to be loosened from the sky and to be approaching the earth, strongly radiating heat."

A reporter for the October 17, 1917 edition of the Lisbon daily newspaper, wrote, "...the silver Sun, enveloped in the same gauzy grey light, was seen to whirl and turn in the circle of broken clouds...The light turned a beautiful blue, as if it had come through the stained-glass windows of a cathedral, and spread itself over the people who knelt with outstretched hands...people wept and prayed with uncovered heads, in the presence of a miracle they had awaited. The seconds seemed like hours, they were so vivid."

25 miles away, a schoolteacher and her students reported the solar phenomena as visible, undercutting the idea that it was simply a collective hallucination. Further evidence verifying the extraordinary event is that the people at the Cova felt the Sun's heat. Their clothes and the ground, soaked by the torrential rains, were dry by the end of the miracle.

The point of this spectacle in the sky was to put an exclamation point on the fundamental Fatima Message. In Lúcia's account, the Lady exhorted the children to do penance and to make sacrifices to save sinners, adding, "Do not offend the Lord our God anymore,

because He is already so much offended." Most important, Lúcia said that the Lady asked them to say the Rosary every day. She promised the war (WWI) would end soon and reiterated many times that the Rosary held the key to peace in the world and in people's hearts.

I have been hearing about the Fatima Message since I was a little boy. At different times in my life it hits me differently and takes me deeper into what is the most basic truth of the Gospel of Jesus Christ: turn away from sin and toward God.

Just weeks ago, I visited with someone recently returned from Fatima. The candlelight Rosary procession around the Cova was a life-changing moment for her. It was a sign to me that the Message and the Miracle lives on.

In this Sunday's Gospel, Jesus gives us one of his most beautiful gems of wisdom: "All things are possible for God" (Mk 10:27). Whether it is not being possessed by our own possessions (Jesus' point) or shouldering the Divine Movement toward what the Angels declared in Bethlehem, "Peace on Earth", to be Christian, a loyal follower of the Risen One, is to specialize in the impossible.


