

From the Pastor's Pen





WHAT'S GOD LIKE? A strong current runs through the Bible—reverence for God's majesty. God creates. God rules. God turns the twisted roads of history toward a Land of promise. Jesus embodies this awesome God. He is God in the flesh.

That is one definite 'side' of God. Yet the biblical authors also depict God in very human terms.

In the famous scene where God contemplates the destruction of Sodom and Gomorrah —cities that the Bible uses as prime examples of human depravity — Abraham barters with God. It's funny, Abraham negotiates like he's in a carlot for the biggest bargain he can get, and God rolls with him.

The point of the story is God's fondness for mercy and that willingness of a father to listen to his son. They are in conversation. God is an attentive listener.

Then there's Jesus, God incarnate, who, mysteriously, is praying. This Gospel passage presses together five

strong lessons about prayer:

Jesus' example as a man at prayer.

Jesus teaches those who want to pray what to say, the Our Father.

Jesus tells a story about persistence in prayer.

Jesus exhorts them not to be shy, but ask, seek, knock.

Jesus gives a father-son example to open our minds to God's generosity.

If Luke's version of the *Our Father* is shorter than Matthew's Gospel, it packs the same spirit. This classic of Christian spirituality blends a recognition of God's majesty with a childlike confidence in God's listening skills.

Jesus would have us be like Abraham, not just great negotiators, but those who use this skill on behalf of others. Notice how the *Our Father* is in the plural.

Like any father, God wants his children to love one another. He especially loves to extend his Mercy through us, like when we intercede for others.

Jesus' reminds us to be bold: ask and you will receive.

We can ask for anything. 'Never hurts to ask.' Asking also requires a willingness to listen for responses.

If we don't know what to ask for, ASK FOR THE HOLY SPIRIT!! This is how Jesus concludes his teaching on prayer. Such a request is irrefusable!

A missionary is someone who combats poverty in all of its forms. Madeline Carson, a Fargo native and graduate of Benedictine College, was called three years ago into the missionary life through The Fellowship of Catholic University Students (FOCUS) for the purpose of battling the spiritual poverty that has come to characterize the modern college campus.

After working directly with dozens of college students, she is certain of this: that God desires deep intimacy with every single soul, that He never ceases for a moment to draw near to us, and that He invites each of us - as baptized Christians - into His mission of evangelization to spread this Truth.

PEOPLE REQUEST MASSES to be said for several reasons: for birthdays or anniversaries, for someone's recovery, or for the repose of the soul of someone who has died.

The spiritual value of every Mass is infinite. We are representing Jesus' once for all time sacrifice on the Cross. When a priest offers Mass, he intends three basic things: to continue Jesus' gift of self, to do this in union with the whole Church for the salvation of the whole world, and finally, for any particular intention, as specified.

There is a custom to offer a Mass stipend for particular intentions, but this is not mandatory. It is a suggested contribution towards the good of the Church. People can certainly make Mass requests without the stipend.

To have our loved ones remembered at the Altar is a beautiful practice dating back to the Early Church. To have a Mass offered on the occasion of a birthday, anniversary or special need remains an ideal way to unite our earthly events to Jesus' greatest act of Love.
