The survey

- 1201 Tunisian citizens sampled from different regions in Tunisia
- Sampling method: PPS, Kish Table (Probabilistic Sample).
- Duration of the survey: October 10 -November 30, 2012.
- Supported by the NSF, the Center for Maghrib Studies in Tunis/American Institute for Maghrib Studies, Portland State University, Yale University, Princeton University, and the Project on Middle East Political Science.

Objectives

- Determining the profil of Participants at the last elections and the profil of New/Old voters.
- 2. Profil of voters for each party: determining categories of Tunisian that have significantly voted different from the other.
- 3. Evaluation of the current situation (at November 2012) about
 - The feeling on the general situation in Tunisia.
 - ► The "performance" of the (*former*) Government and the Constituent Assembly.
- 4. Prediction of the results in the next elections.

Methodology

- Compute frequencies and cross tables: all the results presented in this presentation are significant at a level of significance equal to 5%.
- Decision trees using CHAID-algorithm (CHi-squared Automatic Interaction Detector).
- Multiple Correspondance Analysis: a factorial analysis on categorical variables.




Did you vote in the elections that took place in October 23rd?


New voters vs Old Voters : Eduction Level


New voters vs Old Voters : Eduction Level

- More than 60% of the old voters are illiterate or have a Primary education level and only 8% of them have a University education level.







- 2. not so attractive for women and Rural Tunisians.










Evaluation of the current situation

- The satisfaction about the about the current situation, the government and the Constituent Assembly decreases with
 - Age class
 - Education level
 - Religiosity
- New voters are less satisfied than Old voters
- Ennahdha voters are more satisfied than than other groups.
