

Revelation is a vision, and biblical visions are always figurative in nature. Revelation also contains 82 verbal figurative signposts as follows: "Like - Like unto - As" and "I was in the spirit."

These signposts support that the book is primarily figurative.

As established in a prior study, the Two Witnesses are the Gentile Church and the Jewish people of the Christian Era (study on the Two Witnesses can be repeated for those who missed it).

The 1260 day-years of the Witnesses span from the establishment of the new nation of Israel (1948AD) back to the construction of the "Abomination that maketh Desolate," the Islamic structure on God's temple mount, the Dome of the Rock (688AD).

1948AD - 1260 = 688AD !!!

No rocket science there. A first grader can do that math.

But following the verses identifying the Two Witnesses are several verses impossible to understand unless viewed figuratively.

I am quoting relevant excerpts, but the full text can be found in your Bible:

REV 11:8-15

"And their dead bodies"

[the empty churches. The Greek word translated bodies here is "ptoma," a ruin, i.e. lifeless body. Church buildings without any believers in then believers are exactly that, dead bodies.]

"will lie in the street of the great city"

[Jerusalem]

"which mystically is called Sodom and Egypt, where also their Lord was crucified. And those from the peoples and tribes and tongues and nations"

[the Moslems in the surrounding lands]

"will look at their dead bodies"

[the empty churches]

"for three and a half days"

[Years of day-years span from 688AD to 1967AD. The Greek word translated "day" in this verse is "hemera," variously translated: time - hour - moment - day - and year. Context suggests year. Applying a day for a year (Eze 4:5-6), 3.5 years are 1278.34 days.]

Jerusalem was freed of Gentile control in 1967AD - 1278.34 = 688.66, and the construction of the Islamic Dome of the Rock!

This gives us the time-frame for when these verses were fulfilled. Between 688AD and 1967AD.

"and will not permit their dead bodies"

[the empty churches]

“to be laid in a tomb”

[to be torn down].

“And those who dwell on the earth will rejoice over them and make merry; and they will send gifts to one another,”

[The Two Witnesses = Christians and the Jews. Islam thought it had won, that the God of Israel had lost the “footstool of His feet,” forever, and they reveled in their victory]

“because these two prophets tormented those who dwell on the earth”

[it is torment for the lost when the gospel is preached and they do not repent].

“And after the three and a half days”

[after Jerusalem was freed.]

“the breath of life from God came into them, and they stood on their feet;”

[After 1967, God's people returned to Jerusalem's churches and synagogues in staggering numbers, a phenomenon that continues to this day]

“and great fear fell upon those who were beholding them.”

[the Palestinians and surrounding Moslems]

“And they heard a loud voice from heaven saying to them,

“Come up here.’ ”

[Saints, both Jew and Gentile are taken up. This is the so-called “rapture” folks.

At this verse the Church is taken to be with the Lord. It is a repeat declaration of Rev 4:1 and another indication that Revelation is repetitive in nature.]

“And they went up into heaven in the cloud, and their enemies beheld them...and the rest were terrified and gave glory to the God of heaven.”

“And the seventh angel sounded;”

[This is the Last Trumpet in the Bible and we are taken to be with the Lord at the Last Trumpet, 1 Cor 15:52]

“and there arose loud voices in heaven, saying, ‘The kingdom of the world has become the kingdom of our Lord, and of His Christ; and He will reign forever and ever.’ ”

Note "forever and ever"

At this Last Trumpet, there is NO tribulation following and NO Millennium following. We are taken immediately into the Eternal Kingdom of God. Rev 10:6 defines the event:

Rev 10:6-7 . . . “there should be time no longer:”

[i.e., time as a natural phenomenon will cease to exist.]

“But in the days of the voice of the seventh angel, when he shall begin to sound,”

[“begins,” at the very first note that comes out of this trumpet this verse will be fulfilled. Sound is “salpezo,” i.e., the sound of a trumpet]

“the mystery of God should be finished,”

[The Greek word “mysterion” appears 27 times in the New Testament. Most refer to the Gospel itself or the mystery of Jesus' relationship with the believers.]

[Finished is “teleo,” defined as a total and complete end.]

“as he hath declared to his servants the prophets.”

Note that NO prophets are left out, so that includes John and the book of Revelation. According to these verses, all of Revelation (with the exception of those verses foretelling the eternal Kingdom of God) will be fulfilled at the Seventh Trumpet!

Since it's all over at the Seventh and Last trumpet and that trumpet blows in Rev 11:15, what do we do with the rest of Revelation, i.e., chapters 12 through 20? The Bible clearly tells us:

Rev 10:11 And he said unto me, Thou must PROPHECY AGAIN before many peoples, and nations, and tongues, and kings.

“Thou must prophesy again!” We are at the end of the trumpets. The Last Trumpet is about to blow. Jesus hands Revelation (the little book) to John and commands him to “prophesy again.”

Ergo: Revelation 12-20 is a repeat of chapters 2-11. Those chapters are In different words with a different emphasis, but they cover events that take place on earth during the same TIME, i.e., the Christian Era.
