
At the River





News from the Trail

September 2019

Good morning! It's a **GREAT** time for Scouting at Little River. In case you haven't heard, we made "a list". Yes I know—no good can ever come from you being on "a list" but let me try to change your mind. I share information from time to time with the lead Scouting Coordinator for the North Georgia conference and as of now, Little River UMC is tied for 4th place in the number of Scout units at a single church in the North Georgia conference. We're competing with some of the larger Methodist Churches and doing extremely well. Currently we support 8 units:

- 1 Cub Scout Pack
- 1 Boy Scouts of America Boy Troop
- 1 Boy Scouts of America Girl Troop
- 5 Girl Scouts of America Troops



You can be extremely proud of all the leaders, young men, and young women represented in our Scouting organization. Our new Scouting year has begun and although many Troops "have just started", they are already very active.



Pack 625:

- Completed fall recruiting, added more than 25 Scouts to the Pack.
- Held a Raingutter Regatta (a boat race in rain gutters). All hands returned to dry land although a pirate (or two) were spotted.
- Participated in a local event—Adventure Quest—where they had an opportunity to learn to shoot a BB Gun, Bow and Arrow, fish, arts and crafts, and visit with the Sheriff's Office and Cherokee County Fire.
- Completed building bird houses, with the kits being cut by the United Methodist Men, to donate to the Pediatric Brain Cancer group at the Aflac Children's Cancer Center of Atlanta. Children at the Cancer Center will paint and decorate the birdhouse before offering them for auction in the spring.

Troop 625:

- They have been teaching the requirements for the "Scouting Adventure" badge to the 5th grade Scouts so that the younger Scouts can earn their Arrow of Light (the highest award in Cub Scouting).
- Completed their annual fishing / fly fishing campout.
- Went white water rafting with Troop 1208 (our new Girls Troop).

Troop 1208:

- Worked on the Swimming Merit Badge with Judge Frank Mills and physical fitness requirements for their tenderfoot rank.
- Working on their first aid skills, CPR, and the First Aid Merit Badge.
- Learned to sharpen, care for, safety rules, and to use knives, saws, hatchets, and axes. They now have a "license" to use them at all Scouting events where appropriate.
- Completed a service project to help a church member move some furniture into storage.





Troop 14612:

- The girls participated in a Cadette / Senior MEdia journey hosted by the local service unit.
- Lori Bouche from Right and Home visited and helped them understand dementia and memory loss for the elderly. They are doing a toilet paper drive to give to the seniors as they learn that it is an essential that some seniors cannot afford. They are also making Veteran’s Day cards to give to Ms. Bouche to give to the seniors.
- Camped overnight at the Tellus Museum to participate in the Cadette Night Owl event.
- **6 girls have completed their Bronze Award** (the 3rd highest award in Girl Scouts). They will officially be recognized in October by the Girl Scouts of America.

Troop 20009:

- Our newest Daisy (K—1) troop began meeting with us in August.
- They have earned the Promise and Lupe petal badge and have learned about being honest, fair, considerate, and caring.
- They have built fairy houses among other activities.

Troop 14665:

- Camped at Lake Allatoona.
- Attended the service unit’s annual pool party and recruiting drive.
- Preparing for their reinvestiture ceremony in October.




Did you know?
