

The self-guided tour was extremely interesting, and many stated they could go and spend a day there reading and watching the many displays and videos that were available for learning. We were also able to walk through Ebenezer Baptist Church, where Martin's own mother was shot while playing the organ during a church service. There was so much history to dive into. We then continued on our way after a picnic lunch onto Augusta. That evening, we ate dinner at Big Daddy's and drove over to the Imperial Theater to see the Queen's Cartoonists, a band from New York that accompanies soundtracks to hilarious/famous historical cartoons. We all had a great time at this evening event!

The next morning, we awoke to another rainy Saturday, as we drove into Aiken, SC for a 2-hour cultural tour. We rode in a beautiful enclosed trolley car and were taken all around the city. We drove past famous local schools, through famous horse training centers, and past the famous Augusta golf course. We stopped along the way to tour a horse racing museum, which was very interesting, and provided several laughs from Paula Goddard and Jessica Porter riding the kiddy horses. That afternoon we stopped at George Walton's historic home for a tour. He was the youngest signer of the Declaration of Independence, Governor of Georgia in 1779, and his home is one of the oldest landmarks in Georgia. That evening we had planned to have a Broadway Boat Cruise, but unfortunately, the boat ride was rained out. We highly enjoyed the musical performance located in the Augusta Canal Museum after our self-guided tour of their museum.



We were able to attend an 18th century style Anglican worship service, then explore the grounds to view hornsmithing, pottery, a tomahawk throw, butter churning, weaving and spinning, quilting, candle making, scrimshaw, pewterer, musket firing demonstrations, calligraphy, gunsmithing, blacksmithing, woodworking, and meat smoking and curing. Some wished they could have stayed all day, but it was time to return home. Thanks to Mrs. Jessica Porter for driving our motely crew on this fabulous adventure.


