GFWC History Snapshot

Detailed March 12 Treasurer's Report attached.

The promotion and support of art and artists has been at the core of GFWC's values from the very beginning. At the Fourth Biennial Convention held in Denver in 1898, GFWC formally established its first Art Committee. Following the committee's formation, they began to publish pamphlets which discussed architecture, sculpture, and painting, which encouraged women to participate in traditional handicrafts.

The art program gained popularity so quickly that by February 1906, the Art Committee established its first "Traveling Gallery of Paintings and Etchings", ensuring they would bring art to clubwomen and their communities. Prevalent artists and art collectors loaned GFWC 80 items to feature in the exhibit. For the cost of postage, GFWC clubs could request the collection and host their own community exhibit for one week. By December 1906, Art Committee Chairman, Jean Sherwood, reported that "even with two complete collections we are unable to meet demand".

By 1908, the exhibits had toured 27 states and more than 200 towns. GFWC also urged local clubs to establish their own travelling collections to highlight regional artists. In the 1920's, GFWC began to develop its own permanent art collection for its headquarters. Like the local collections, many paintings collected by Headquarters featured regional artists and landscapes, which illustrated GFWC's geographic diversity.

GFWC - 125 Acts of Service

As GFWC Illinois begins its 125th anniversary by completing 125 Acts of Service or more, let's look at GFWC's first service project in April 1934. The first act was the Shawnee National Forest and since that time club members have donated money to plant millions of trees.



When heading to southern Illinois, be sure to stop by Shawnee National Forest and see what a dedicated group of women did and can do.

Shawnee National Forest's natural beauty is ideal for all types of outdoor recreation. Nestled between the Mississippi and Ohio Rivers the Forest's landscape features rolling hills, forests, open lands, lakes, creeks and rugged bluffs. The area's mild weather throughout the year makes a visit during any season enjoyable.

The Shawnee National Forest is famed for its awesome Garden of the Gods, and is home to the Rim Rock Recreational Trail (the forest has a system of 403 miles of equestrian/hiking trails). Hikers are greeted by magnificent jutting walls of rock covered with emerald-green moss, and paths that meander through canyons under the forest canopy. If you're into climbing than a must-see is Jackson Falls, located near the town of Ozark in the Hidden Springs Ranger District in Shawnee National Forest. The climb takes place on 60 feet of sandstone cliffs and boulders that include numerous freestanding towers.

Domestic Violence—at home, next door, at the office

More than likely, we ALL know someone who has been abused, physically or emotionally. Are you aware of the signs and behaviors of someone who is hiding this secret?

The following information has been taken from A SAFE PLACE, located in Lake County, Illinois. You may think this will never happen to you or someone that you know, but when you learn more, you will find that it is closer than you think and you do have options.

HELP IS AVAILABLE!

Domestic violence occurs across demographic and gender lines, leaving no one unscathed by this horrible trauma. If domestic violence were a disease, it would be considered an epidemic due to how many people are affected.

Statistics:

- One in 4 women will experience domestic violence at some point in their lifetimes.
- One in 7 men will experience domestic violence at some point in their lifetimes.
- Women are more likely to be killed by an intimate partner than men.
- Women ages 20 to 24 are at the greatest risk of becoming victims of domestic violence.
- Every day, 3 women are murdered at the hand of their intimate partner.
- Every year, more than 3 million children witness domestic violence in their homes.
- Children exposed to domestic violence are more likely to have health problems, including becoming sick more often, having frequent headaches and stomachaches and being more tired and lethargic.
- Every 9 seconds in the US a woman is assaulted or beaten, more often than not by her intimate partner.
- Domestic violence is the leading cause of injury to women more than car accidents, muggings and rapes combined.
- According to the US Department of Housing and Urban Development, domestic violence is the third leading cause of homelessness among families.
- Survivors of domestic violence face high rates of depression, sleep disturbances, anxiety, flashbacks and other emotional distress.
- Without help, boys who witness domestic violence are far more likely to become abusers of their partners and/or children as adults, continuing the cycle of violence into the next generation.
- Domestic violence costs more than \$37 billion a year in law enforcement involvement, legal work, medical and mental health treatment, and lost productivity at companies. Domestic violence happens when one partner attempts to gain power and control over the other using various forms of abuse. These unhealthy relationships can include physical, emotional/psychological, verbal, economic, and/or sexual abuse.
