Nancy Moore's most recent role was that of Musical Director for the LVHS production of The Sound of Music. You may have also recognized her in one of many productions from Lago Vista Players, concerts by Hill Country Singers, or maybe you didn't recognize her as a hairy-chested pirate in LTMT's production of Peter Pan.

After completing a Bachelor of Music degree in Music Education, and a Master's degree in Vocal Performance, Nancy conducted choirs and taught private voice in the Midwest on the middle school, HS, College, and Community levels for over 20 years. During that time, she served as a choir clinician, Musical Director for such shows as Godspell, Snoopy, and Side by Side by Sondheim, while still staying active as a soloist and stage performer.

In 2001, Nancy's life took a turn. She completed her first Danskin Triathlon, which began what she calls her "second life." By 2006, she left teaching to become a full-time triathlete. Over the next 10 years, she would complete over 100 triathlons, including 10 Ironman Triathlons, 70.3 World Championships in Austria, was a member of the 2014 USA Triathlon Team at International Triathlon Union World Championships and earned the title of "All American" for five consecutive years.

Since moving to Lago Vista, Nancy has slowly been returning to her musical roots. She teaches Private Voice from her home studio, as well as at LVHS. All of the performers you will see today are members of Hill Country Singers, Nancy's private students, or in many cases - both! She is the Music Director at St. Peter's Episcopal Church, serves on the Board of Directors for Lago Vista Players, is a former president and current vice-president of Hill Country Singers. She still races part-time and will run the Austin Marathon this coming weekend. (February 16)

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# A Night at the Copacabana


A Recap of the LVWC 2020 Gala Event





I remember the good ol' days when I used to pick up the photo chat with a friend or to get the information I needed.

\*\*SIGH\*\* Mentioning such a thing now only dates me for my dinosaur ways. Today it is all about texting, Facebooking, snap chatting, tweeting, video conferencing, and heaven knows what else. I remember in times past, being delighted when the phone rang because I would likely get to spend at least fifteen minutes talking with whoever was on the other end.

TRUE STORY: One day, when my daughter, Sarah, was a teenager, she came into my room when I was involved in one such delightful phone conversations. She patiently waited while I wrapped up my call, and as I hung up, I turned to her to see an odd expression on her face.

"What's wrong?" I asked her. She hadn't seemed upset when she'd walked into the room.

"Mom, who were you just talking to?" She asked with her eyebrows raised.

"Well, that was a very nice lady from T-Mobile," I informed her. "Why?"

"Because when you hung up just now, you said, I love you too."
Of course, I didn't realize I'd just said that and wondered what
the woman on the phone had said in farewell to evoke that response from me in such a natural way that I didn't even realize
what I'd said in reply. I only had a warm, fuzzy feeling. Either way,
it does illustrate the point that a good many phone calls were delightful experiences.

Not so much anymore. Now when the phone rings, it is usually not someone I have on my contact list, and I am learning to ignore the calls. That means almost every single time it rings it goes to voice mail. Why? Because it usually isn't even an actual person calling but a machine calling about a credit card I don't even use or want. Also, because friends rarely call—they text. I have nothing against texting, except that it is not as personal. My smartphone has also been known to occasionally change what I say and turn me into a terrible person. Like when I texted a friend that "I was embarrassed to tell her that I was still in bed," only to realize two days later that my smartphone had changed that text to read, "I'm embarrassed to BE you…"

Smartphones aren't the only culprits trying to steal our focus away from genuine social interaction with others. No, there are many avenues technology takes to mediocre social involvement—even though in many ways, it is a good thing. I can't tell you how many times I hit like on a post I see in social media only to discover that social media is stingy with info on who liked a post. It will tell the poster the names of two friends and then say 50 others liked this. So, I doubt my liking other's posts about things in their lives even registers to them that I care about the events in their lives. But by liking the posts, I give myself a pat on the back and feel that my socializing has been done.

Another problem I have found with social media is others posing as me. No, I don't mean total strangers—that would be identity theft—something much worse! No, I am talking about fraping (a word I only learned yesterday.) My son, Luke, is notorious for this. If he gets ahold of my phone or computer when I don't see him, he posts all kinds of nonsense on my behalf. Once, about ten years ago, he did this from my phone while we were in Marble Falls. I had no idea he had my phone. I was driving. When I got home and finally got onto social media, I had over 200 likes and at least 50



comments on the exciting news I'd posted that I was pregnant and going on a trip to Alaska. Since I'd had a hysterectomy twenty years earlier and was nearly 50, I had to roll my eyes and inform everyone that the blessed news was really that my thenteenage son was still alive.

Lastly, I have been dismayed of late by the confrontational comments made by some citizens in our growing community on social media bulletin boards. For example, about a year ago, I was surprised to learn that not all areas of Lago Vista are covered by the POA and that while they are not subject to dues, they don't have access to the parks in the area. This I learned through posts made by members of the bulletin boards who seek to keep us informed—an admirable trait. By reading the comments following this post, I learned that there were some of these affected citizens have small children with nowhere to play because they weren't in LVPOA boundaries with access to the parks with playgrounds. So I made a comment that the city needed to have its own park so that need is met. (Something that our city is now making happen—YAY!)

Oh my goodness, I was unprepared for the backlash my little harmless comment invoked. I mean, it wasn't even close to Super Tuesday, but the replies I received had all the fervor of a political candidate seeking election against a highly favored incumbent. My words were dissected and thrown back at me like I was an idiot. Maybe this person is a highly capable lawyer or something. I don't know, but I have heard of many others who've received similar reactions.

For this and many other reasons, I sometimes now go days without looking at social media at all, trying to find that lost personal connection, once so simply found by calling someone or even visiting a friend, time permitting. Of course, this approach also has its downside. This past Sunday, our kids and their families were all coming over for birthday celebrations. When they began arriving, the first thing they asked John and me was if we were having fun boiling all of our water. We gave them blank looks.

"It's all over Facebook, Mom," They said, rolling their eyes. (We'd been so busy at work, we hadn't even turned the news on.) "There was a water main break a couple of days ago. You live on National and the post said National and west of National Drive."

"What water break?" was my stupid reply. \*\*\*SIGH\*\*\* So if you notice me glowing green, I hope you will understand that it is a consequence of my sometime-aversion to social media.

According to our bylaws we should have elected a nominating committee at the January meeting; this important step was overlooked. We WILL be electing three women from the general membership to fill this very important role. Our bylaws establish that the nominating committee will be comprised of five people, two from the Executive Board and three from the general membership. The president will appoint two from the Executive Board to join the three elected from general membership.

Serving on the Executive Committee is a very rewarding experience. Our club has grown to an astounding 337 members as of publication of this newsletter and the responsibility of guiding the future of the club, everything from menu selection for luncheons, program development, philanthropy decisions, scholarship awarding, table placement, SIG support, is shepherded by the fine women who donate a small portion of their time but provide a gigantic benefit to the management of the club

The positions that will be open for 2020-2021 are:

**1st Vice President-Programs**-Article VII-Section 2 of our bylaws states: The First Vice President shall be the Chairperson of the Program Committee. She shall have freedom of selection in the fields of art, music, literature, and other suitable sources while ensuring that all programs are of an non-commercial nature and are non-political. She shall consult with the President before finalizing programs for the year.

**4th Vice President-Publicity**-Article VII-Section 6 states-The 4th Vice President shall be responsible for publicity and articles for general membership, monthly meetings, and any other publicity requests of the Executive Committee.

Treasurer - Article VII Section 9- SECTION 9. The Treasurer shall receive and deposit all dues of members and other moneys of the Club, maintain a bank account for these moneys, and disburse them as directed by the Executive Committee. Two of these three officers shall sign all checks: Treasurer, President, First Vice President. The Treasurer shall keep a current account of all moneys received and disbursed by her, which account shall be available to any member at any regular meeting. She shall render an itemized written report at the general meeting in September and May and present a proposed budget to the membership in September suggesting adjustments as needed. She shall submit records to the Audit Committee by June 15 annually. She shall file a franchise tax report by May 15 annually. She shall file a report with the Texas Secretary of State by February 1 of every fourth year beginning in 2012. She shall ensure that all appropriate filings to the IRS are accomplished by the fifteenth of October annually. If these requirements change oor new ones are enacted, those assignments will be added to the Treasurer's duties.

**Historian**- Article VII-SECTION 10. The Historian shall keep all newspaper clippings, printed programs, and other notices pertaining to Club activities. She shall also prepare a narrative [and pictorial when feasible] account of the Club's activities during her term of office. This account becomes a permanent part of the Club's official history.

The clipboards on our luncheon tables will have a Nominations Form for your use.

Before submitting a nomination it is advisable to make sure the person you are nominating is willing to serve in that capacity.
