As we close in on the end of the year, I would like to continue on a theme that has been mentioned in many of the past "Peter's Perspectives," and that is the wonderful volunteers we have in this community. The Board of Directors had the privilege and opportunity to host 2017 Bay Crossing volunteers on October 15th at a stand up



cocktail party at the clubhouse. We had almost 100 in attendance. That means approximately 1 out of every 4 residents has in one way or another contributed to making this the great community that it is. On November 18, the Board will host an open community meeting to explain and better understand the 2018 budget. The Finance Committee had meetings with each Committee and then went through over five draft revisions of 2018 expenses to arrive at the final proposed budget, which was mailed to the entire community in early November. The Long Range Planning Committee has done a superb job in consolidating the results from their survey into an Executive Report to the Board. This survey has highlighted areas for the Board to concentrate on when considering projects for common areas and in re-writing our Covenants. The results of the survey are being made available to the community and will be posted on the Bay Crossing web site.

Our property management company has been acquired by HPS Property Management. This acquisition was announced to the Board in October. Initially there will be no changes in operating procedures. We will work with the new management as if there is no change except in name.

The Board wants to take this opportunity to wish everyone in the community a safe and happy Thanksgiving and Holiday Season.

Bay Crossing Residents Satisfied with our HOA Lifestyle by Phil Wescott



Bay Crossing residents have lots of opinions. Fortunately, most of us are willing to share our opinions when asked. The small group doing the asking is our ad hoc Long Range planning Committee [LRPC]. The asking paid off in August when 232 residents completed an online opinion survey about our lifestyle satisfaction.

Appointed by the Board early in 2017, the small LRPC group consists of Agnes Boxhill, Mary Cavey, Frank Storey, and Peter Strub, with BOD Planning Officer Phil Wescott offering guidance and BOD Treasurer Nancy McCloskey assisting with survey data analysis. The opinion survey results were presented to the BOD and open meeting attendees at the September 2017 monthly meeting.

Clearly, most Bay Crossing residents appreciate the many benefits of living in our HOA community. The survey asked about satisfaction levels related to our infrastructure and overall community attractiveness, to our Board and Committee and Property Manager performance and oversight of our HOA resources, to usage of our Bay Crossing amenities, to our sense of safety and security, and to broader community issues and concerns outside Bay Crossing.

The LRPC learned a lot from the residents' responses. They invested many hours tabulating and analyzing the survey data and then in preparing a Summary Report of findings and conclusions. The BOD is now studying the survey report as one important tool that will also become part of our 2018 to 2020 Bay Crossing Strategic Plan.

The Board will also place the Executive Summary report and the accompanying PowerPoint presentation from the September BOD monthly meeting on the Bay Crossing website that is now being managed for us by HPS Property Management.

Southern Frogmore Stew

Serves 10

5 quarts water

10 Tbs. Old Bay Seasoning or 2 Tbs. per quart of water

- 2 lbs. red potatoes
- 2 lbs. kielbasa sausage cut into 2 in. pieces
- 6-7 ears of corn cleaned and cut in half
- 2 lbs. extra large fresh shrimp
- 2 lbs. snow crab legs
- 1. Bring water and Old Bay to boil.
- 2. Add potatoes and cook 15-20 min. or until almost cooked. Add sausage and cook 5 min. more, add corn and cook another 5 min. Stir in shrimp and crab legs and cook until shrimp are pink, about 5 min.
- 3. Drain and serve with lemon wedges and cocktail sauce.

Crunchy Noodle Kugel à la Great-Aunt Martha

1 cup raisins

Sherry or orange juice

- 1 pound egg noodles
- 6 tablespoons unsalted butter, cut into pieces, more for pan
- 4 large eggs
- 3 cups cottage cheese
- 1 cup sour cream
- ⅓ cup sugar
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- Grated zest of 1 lemon
- Pinch of salt
- 1.Put raisins in a microwave-safe bowl or small saucepan and cover with sherry or orange juice. Heat on stove top or in microwave oven until liquid is steaming hot (about 1 1/2 minutes in microwave or 3 minutes on stove). Let cool while you prepare kugel mixture.
- 2.Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Butter an 11-by-17-inch jellyroll pan. Cook noodles according to package directions and drain well. Immediately return noodles to pot and add butter. Toss until butter melts.
- 3.In a large bowl, whisk together the eggs, cottage cheese, sour cream, sugar, cinnamon, lemon zest and salt. Drain raisins and add to bowl along with buttered noodles. Mix well.
- 4.Spread mixture in prepared pan and smooth top. Bake until top is crusty and golden, 25 to 35 minutes. Serve warm or at room temperature.

Architectural Review Committee by Reed Angster

Questions Homeowners Ask

1. When am I required to remove the holiday decorations on the exterior of my home?

There is nothing in the Covenants or Architectural Standards specifically dealing with a time limit related to taking down holiday decorations. We ask you to use common sense and remove your holiday decorations approximately two weeks after the end of the designated holiday.

2. If I want to apply to the ARC for permission to have an addition constructed to the outside of my home or to add additional landscaping to my property, what is the procedure?

First, you must submit an application to HPS Management Company. A copy of the Design Review Application can be found on the Bay Crossing website, at the back of the 2016 edition of the Architectural Standards Manual (Appendix II) or by contacting Reed Angster at 302-644-7613. In addition to completing the four-page application, you must also submit a copy of your original survey with the addition requested drawn to scale on the survey and a separate, larger drawing of the actual addition showing the dimensions of the addition. You must also provide a sprinkler plan on a separate page indicating where any sprinkler heads are that will have to be capped or moved. Please include any photos, catalog illustrations, etc., showing the nature, kind, shape, color, dimensions and materials for the project. A copy of your contractor's business license and certificate of insurance must be attached. There is a \$25 application fee. Your check is to be made payable to "HPS Management Co." Please call the chairperson, Reed Angster at 302-644-7613, if you need any help completing the ARC application. The completed application is to be mailed to:

3.. After I have mailed in or delivered my application to HPS, what is the process used to get my project approved?

HPS, our management company, records your application and then forwards it by e-mail to the chairperson of the Bay Crossing Architectural Review Committee. The chairperson then assigns one of the Architectural Review Committee members to review the application, meet with the homeowner(s), inspect the site where the project is to be constructed and discuss any problems he or she may have with the proposal. Assuming the proposed construction does not violate any of the Bay Crossing Covenants or guidelines in the Architectural Standards Manual, the ARC representative will share the application by email with the other ARC members and recommend approval. If none of the other members of the committee has any objections to the proposed project, the ARC member assigned to coordinate the approval process of the application will notify the chairperson of the ARC that the committee has approved the application. The ARC chairperson will then notify the homeowner that his/her application has been approved.

Please understand that the ARC does not wait until it has a monthly meeting to approve applications. As soon as the committee chairperson receives the application, it is immediately assigned to a committee member and the entire approval process may only take one week from the time the application is received from HPS.

The next meeting of the ARC will take place on Friday, December 1, 2017 at 9:00 a.m. in the craft room of the clubhouse if there is business to discuss. Meetings are not held every month if there is no reason to meet. All residents are welcome to attend if a meeting is scheduled. How Well Do You Know Delaware?

Gail and I have been Delaware residents since November 2006, but an article Jo Morgan (Jib Court) gave me shows how little I know about the details of our new (to many of us) home state. The article was from the Sunday, September 24, 2017 special section of the News Journal titled "First State Symbology." Here are some of the many cool facts about our small corner of the planet. See how many you already knew, but no cheating!

- 1. State butterfly the Tiger Swallowtail, suggested by schoolchildren, it won a statewide vote on June 10, 1999.
- 2. State beverage milk, named July 1, 1983 over 100 years after the debut of milk delivered in bottles on January 11, 1878.
- 3. State bug the ladybug, though it is actually a beetle, designated April 25, 1974.
- 4. State bird the blue hen, aggressive and prone to fighting, is also the mascot of the University of Delaware and became the state bird on April 14, 1939.
- 5. State dance the Maypole dance but only from July 2016 to July 29th this year.
- 6. State fish the weakfish or yellow fin trout. When chosen on July 7, 1981 their population was robust, but they have since migrated south.
- 7. State dog the Golden Retriever, another classroom designation effective August 3, 2016 but, again, only for a year.
- 8. State flag Within the flag's buff colored diamond is the state's great seal. The background is blue and the date, December 7, 1787, marks when Delaware was the first state to ratify the new U.S. Constitution. The flag was formalized by law on July 24, 1913.
- 9. State fossil (None of us, yet) is Belemnite, designated on July 2, 1996. The fossil, chosen again by students, is a squid-like creature that lived 80-85 million years ago.
- 10. State flower and dessert the peach blossom and the peach pie with the blossom becoming the official floral emblem on May 9, 1895 and earned the title state flower on June 13, 1955. The pie was named the state dessert on July 30, 2009 following a petition by, you guessed it, school kids!
- 11. State marine animal none other than the famous horseshoe crab, designated June 25, 2002 as requested by a 17-year-old student. The horseshoe crab is the only true blue-blooded Delawarean.
- 12. State nickname The First State (see #8 above) became the official nickname on May 23, 2002. We are also known as the Blue Hen State and the Diamond State.
- 13. State macroinvertebrate the stonefly. On May 4, 2005, Delaware became the first state to have this category.

- 14. State herb (no, not what you think!) goldenrod was named the state herb on June 24, 1996 and Delaware was again the first in this category.
- 15.State seal Though each Delaware county had its own seal in the mid-1700s, a new one was needed after Separation Day (June 15, 1776) when Delaware separated from Pennsylvania. A new seal was adopted January 17, 1777.
- 16. State mineral Sillimanite, named for a Yale professor, it was adopted March 24, 1977.
- 17. State shell the channeled whelk symbol was enacted May 6, 2014 after a middle school Girl Scout promoted having a state shell.
- 18. State soil Greenwich loam, adopted April 20, 2000, boosted by more middle school students. It is a very productive agricultural soil that probably does not exist in Bay Crossing!
- 19. State fruit the strawberry became the state fruit on May 13, 2000.
- 20. State song "Our Delaware" won a contest and became official on April 7, 1925 and might not be on Bill Lyons' playlist.
- 21. State star Delaware Diamond, named by a 12-year-old and declared on June 30, 2000.
- 22. State sport Bicycling was declared on June 14, 2014 at the urging of elementary school students. Delaware now ranks third nationally for bike-friendliness.
- 23. State tall ship The Kalmar Nyckel is one of the ships that brought the first permanent European settlers to Delaware in 1638. The re-creation of the ship was launched September 29, 1997 and the designation was made on September 9, 2016.
- 24. State tree The American holly. Milton was once the largest supplier of holly wreaths in the U.S. and its designation was made May 1, 1939.
- 25. State wildlife animal The grey fox, named a state symbol June 10, 2010 at the urging of a group of fourth-graders.

Got an idea for another state symbol? Time to lobby a state representative or talk to some school kids!
