

Attendance Reminder:

Punctuality and regular daily attendance in school is the legal responsibility of parents/guardians in Connecticut schools. The Pomfret Community School Handbook states: Students who are not in their homeroom by 8:30 A.M. are considered to be tardy and must report directly to the main office. Students are allowed to be tardy three times per semester. Any student who is late more than three times will receive a detention for each tardy beyond three. A detention may be waived by an administrator if the cause of the tardiness is unavoidable.

Arriving late to school is disruptive to the classroom environment and your children are missing important information shared in the morning, work that may be required prior to the start of daily lessons, and/or direct teacher instruction and interventions.

Please remember that bus transportation is provided to all students and that no student that rides the bus will ever be considered to be late or tardy. If you choose not to have your student(s) transported by bus, students may be dropped off starting at 8:00 A.M. at the cafeteria entrance and that adult supervision is provided.

The MATHCOUNTS Competition Series is


a national program that provides students the opportunity to compete in live, in-person contests against and alongside their peers. Created in 1983, it is the longest-running MATHCOUNTS program and is open to all sixth-, seventh- and eighth-grade students.

How Does It Work?

The Competition Series has 4 levels of competition—school, chapter, state and national. Each level of competition is comprised of 4 rounds—Sprint, Target, Team and Countdown Round. Altogether the rounds are designed to take about 3 hours to complete.

- **Sprint Round:** focuses on speed and accuracy. Students have 40 minutes to complete 30 math problems without a calculator.
- **Target Round:** focuses on problemsolving and mathematical reasoning. Students receive 4 pairs of problems and have 6 minutes to complete each pair, assuming the use of a calculator.
- Team Round: focuses on problemsolving and collaboration. Students have 20 minutes to complete 10 math problems, assuming the use of a calculator. Only the 4 students on a school's team can take this round officially.
- **Countdown Round:** focuses on speed and accuracy. Students have a maximum of 45 seconds per problem without a calculator. This round is optional at the school, chapter and state level.



Fifth Disease



Fifth Disease (erythema infectiosum) is a viral illness caused by the human virus Parvovirus B19.

Fifth Disease is usually a mild illness that is spread by respiratory secretions. It is a viral illness that mostly occurs in children and is known for a typical rash that resembles "slapped-cheeks." The rash may spread to other parts of the body as well. Other coldlike symptoms may be observed before the rash breakout including low-grade fever, mild headache, joint pain, or fatigue. Once the rash appears the child is most likely no longer contagious.

Especially common in school age children this illness is associated with cold-like symptoms and a rash that appears a few days later. The red rash typically begins on the face. A person with parvovirus infection is most contagious before the rash appears - either during the incubation period (the time between infection and the onset of symptoms) or during the time when he or she has only mild respiratory symptoms.



<u>Flu symptoms</u> can be mild or severe, and can come on suddenly.

Symptoms of the flu include chills, fever, aches, and tiredness.



The common symptoms of the flu include:

- Fever (100°F or greater)
- Headache
- Muscle aches
- Chills

- Tiredness
- Cough
- **Runny nose** (more common in children than adults)

If you have one or more of these symptoms, it could be the flu.

Healthy Reminders

** Tooth Brushes should be changed every season. They should also be changed or cleaned after an illness.

Keep Your Inhaler Clean

This should be done regularly, when you are sick, or when you can see white buildup around outlet.



- Rinse the spacer and the inhaler jacket in warm water daily.
- Let them dry overnight on a paper towel.
- Disinfect them as necessary in a solution of vinegar and water.

A Slick Trick for Ticks When

you remove a tick with tweezers, sometimes the head breaks off and remains embedded in the skin. Here is a simple, painless method for removing ticks without leaving any parts behind: Moisten a cotton ball with a little water and rub it on a bar of soap. Cover the tick with the soapy cotton and gently rub

COUNTERCLOCKWISE. (For some reason, the tick

stays in the skin if you rub in the other direction.) After a few circles, you will find the tick intact on the cotton ball. This technique never fails, doesn't hurt, and can be done at home by the patient or parent. Finish by washing the site with more soap and water and applying an antiseptic.







New Car Seat Requirements Under PA 17-230

Issue

Provide a plain language summary of the car seat provisions enacted in PA 17-230 (§ 11).

Summary


The new car seat law increases the age and weight thresholds for car seats and generally requires that car seats be equipped with five-point harnesses. Under this law, there are four categories based on a child's age and weight, and each category provides one or more car seat options. If a child falls into either the age or weight range in a given category, he or she must be transported in one of the car seats allowed under that category. If a child's weight and age fall under two different categories, he or she must be transported in a car seat that is an option under both of the applicable categories. Therefore, in effect, the more restrictive car seat requirement applies.

Chart 1 illustrates the new law's requirements, effective October 1, 2017. As under prior law, car seats must meet Federal Motor Vehicle Safety Standards (Conn. Agencies Regs., § 14-100a-1).

Children Who Fall Under Two Categories

In some cases, a child's weight and age may fall under two different categories. In these cases, a child must be transported in a car seat that is an option under both of the applicable categories. Therefore, in effect, the more restrictive requirement applies. Put differently, a child must meet both the age and weight criteria under a category in order to use the less restrictive car seat option.

For example, a boy who is 18 months old and weighs 32 pounds falls under Category 1 (rear-facing seat with five-point harness) because he is under age two. He also falls under Category 2 (front-facing or rear-facing seat with five-point harness) because he is between 30 and 39 pounds. Although the boy has two car seat options based on his weight, he has only one based on his age. Therefore, the only way to comply with the law is to use the seat that is an option under both categories: a rear-facing seat. He may not use a front-facing car seat until he turns two.

Prior Law

Prior law required children under age one or weighing less than 20 pounds to be secured in a rearfacing child restraint. It required children age (1) six and younger or weighing less than 60 pounds to be secured in a child restraint (e.g., car seat or booster seat) that met federal motor vehicle safety standards and (2) seven or older and weighing at least 60 pounds to either use a restraint or wear a seat belt.

Penalties for Violations

Existing law, unchanged by the act, subjects individuals who violate the car seat requirements to penalties. A first violation is an infraction and a second violation is punishable by a fine of up to \$199. Each subsequent violation is a class A misdemeanor.

The Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) commissioner must require anyone who commits a first or second violation to attend a DMV-approved child car seat safety course. If a violator fails to attend or successfully complete the course, the commissioner, after providing notice and an opportunity for a hearing, may suspend his or her driver's license for up to two months (<u>CGS § 14-100a(d)</u>).


