In fact, it is a one of a kind program that introduces college life to almost 225 students and has them confront issues they will have to deal with in their lives.

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Project SEARCH
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Project SEARCH is designed to provide an on-campus, intellectually challenging experience for academically motivated high school students. The program has been in operation since 1983, recently completing its 29th year. The total program enrollment ranges from 200 - 225 students, with the population consisting of 86% seniors, 12% juniors, and 2% sophomores. School enrollment numbers range from 5-25 students, based on school size and individual school district budgets.

Participants travel to the University of New Hampshire-Durham campus for six afternoon seminars each semester. Each seminar consists of a one-hour presentation and a one-hour discussion group. During a typical presentation, participants hear informative, controversial, and often alternative perspectives on issues. During the discussion groups, students are encouraged to share their ideas and opinions with peers in their group. Students from the participating schools are deliberately assigned so that only one or two students from any one school will be present in each group. A graduate student from the UNH Teacher Education or Counseling programs facilitates the discussion group.

Additional SEARCH activities include a ropes course day at the beginning of the academic year and a spring semester field trip to Boston. The ropes course day is designed to develop cooperation, communication, and problem-solving skills, laying the foundation for the discussion group environment. During the field trip to Boston, students experience an afternoon at historic Faneuil Hall and a theatrical production. Participants are eligible to take courses at the UNH-Durham campus through the Challenging Academically Talented Students (CATS) program; upon successful completion of the course, the Program shall reimburse the cost of tuition.

Program Mission

Important Changes from the 2011-2012 Program

The severity of the economy made it critical the program make financial changes in order to keep the program at its present state. We opted away from the Brown Center at the University of New Hampshire to the ropes course at Dover High School. This particular move allowed the program to freeze its tuition to the school.

The economic reality for academic programs is difficult. During the past year many schools were worried about the possibility of having their budgets cut. To date we have lost numbers from Dover High School and possibly Prospect Mountain High School. The program has been able to keep up with all its programs because of the charitable donation of Ms. Dorothy M. Byrne of the Byrne Foundation.

Notes: The panel discussion is presented with the help of the **People Care Foundation** of Somersworth, NH. People Care is a new non-profit organization which has as one of its goals the reduction of prescription drug abuse in New Hampshire.

The past few years has seen an alarming increase in the diversion and abuse of prescription drugs in our communities. The People Care Foundation is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization established to reverse this trend by reducing the demand for illicit prescription drugs available on our streets.

Notes: Stacey Ann Ferguson is a Returned Peace Corps Volunteer who will share her experiences working in rural Morocco, focusing not only on some of the technical projects she completed, but of the experience (the challenges and successes) of living, growing, and experiencing a new culture, a new language, and a new way of life and how she was able to become a member of her community. Last, she will talk about the professional and personal “life lessons” that came from her service. Stacey has recently been promoted to leading the Peace Corp from Washington DC.

Emerald Anderson, originally from Atlanta, Georgia, has been serving with City Year New Hampshire for four years. Her service began as a corps member working on the Seacoast of New Hampshire one day a week in Portsmouth Middle School as a tutor, mentor, and role model on a seventh grade team. While the in-school work she was doing was a crucial part to her service year, the focus of her service was as part of a six-person team that planned and implemented a Saturday service-learning program that promoted social justice and equality, community service and involvement, as well as all around social awareness to middle school aged students.

The follow-up from our students was extraordinary after this session.

Notes: The poetry slam has become a staple for Project SEARCH. It is a favorite with the students because they are presented with award winning poetry and they are able to stand before their peers in order to recite their poetry. Simone is a national champion in her field.

Boston SlamMaster and world-class MC Simone Beaubien will return to SEARCH to host the annual poetry slam. The event always starts with an opportunity for students to read or perform their own poetry in a supportive, exciting environment.

Beaubien, a 2008 National Poetry Slam finalist, will draw four other national competitors from the New England scene to perform their own original work in the slam. Poetry Slam is a thirty-year movement conventionally defined as “the art of competitive performance poetry.” It’s a fast-paced competition where poets have a limited amount of time to impress judges randomly selected from the audience: storytelling, lyricism, and stand-up comedy all come together in what’s evolved to a modern oral tradition. Slam is not a passive performance; in addition to the judges, other audience members are strongly encouraged to participate by cheering, whistling, or mildly heckling the hosts or judges. Kids and adults alike learn the power of a single word, line, or figure of speech when spoken aloud.

Student comments:

Hearing them perform makes poetry a universal language like music.

This gave me the capacity to figure out which art is better than other art.

Notes: Following 9/11, the U.S. government adopted some controversial new tactics intended to prevent future terrorist attacks, including warrantless eavesdropping on Americans' phone calls, secret demands for records under the Patriot Act, and FBI sting operations against people thought to be potential terrorists. This film explores this urgent national debate by talking with leading critics and advocates of the new policies, and telling the stories of people whose lives have been directly affected.

If the war against terror is truly the long struggle our leaders say it will be, then so too will be the struggle to set the right balance between security and liberty."

William R. Woodward teaches psychology at UNH. He is active in local peace groups such as Seacoast Peace Response, NH Peace Action, and Seacoast 9/11 Questions. He also belongs to the Seacoast Antipollution League, which calls attention to the dangers of relicensing Seabrook. He hopes that the Seacoast will join Transition Towns, a worldwide grassroots environmental movement to prepare communities for the future.

The students were interested in the subject but uncomfortable with the professor. Most stated he was a bit too pushy with his arguments and did not address their questions.

Notes: How did life on earth attain such incredible complexity? From the amazing amount of data stored in each molecule of DNA to the intricacies of the immune system, life on earth displays a level of integration and detail that becomes more awe-inspiring with each new scientific discovery. Are the forces of random mutation and natural selection sufficient to explain the origin of what we see, or does the evidence compel us to search for a source of intelligence as the most logical explanation?

At February's Project SEARCH seminar, we will present both the Evolution and Intelligent Design sides of this debate on origins in what should be a very thought provoking seminar.

Thomas Davis is a professor of plant biology at UNH. His primary research is concerned with the genetic analysis and manipulation of economically important plants, with current emphasis on strawberry and mint. He uses a combination of conventional, molecular, and cytogenetic techniques to construct a strawberry genome map, to compare genome structures among strawberry (*Fragaria*) species, and to trace the evolutionary history of the strawberry.

Tim Hafner is a former F-16 and commercial airline pilot. He is currently teaching math and science at Veritas Academy High School in Wells, Maine. He has been a member of an Intelligent Design presentation team for the last 7 years, presenting throughout New Hampshire and Maine in both public and private institutions and schools. He earned his B.S. in Forestry from the University of New Hampshire and possesses a M.S. in Aviation Science from Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University.

The students followed the discussion with interest but were disappointed by the question and answer period because Mr. Hafner could not answer many of their questions.

Notes: The street protests sweeping across Egypt, Tunisia, Libya, Yemen, Bahrain, Syria, and other Arab countries have demonstrated once again the importance of "people power" in creating fundamental regime change. Focusing on Egypt, the most populous Arab state, this talk explains how activists from different sectors (students, workers, judges, human rights organizers, Islamic movements) organized against the regime of Hosni Mubarak.

The lecture will also discuss what we can expect to see in the future, as elections empower new political players while old political forces such as Egypt's military and security apparatus stubbornly cling to power.

Jeannie Sowers is an assistant professor of political science at the University of New Hampshire, where she teaches courses in Middle East politics, environmental politics, and international affairs. She is the author of the forthcoming book *Environmental Politics in Egypt: Activists, Experts and the State* (Routledge 2012); co-editor, with Chris Toensing, of *Journey to Tahrir: Politics, Protest, and Social Change in Egypt, 1999-2011* (Verso Books, forthcoming April 2012); and has published articles on environmental politics in Egypt and the Middle East in *Climatic Change, Development and Change*, and the *Journal of Environment and Development*. She serves on the editorial boards of *Middle East Report* and *Global Environmental Politics*. She earned her Ph.D. and M.A. from Princeton University and her B.A. from Harvard University.

Students were mesmerized by participating with an individual who was part of this dramatic part of the history of their world. Most students asked to have this dynamic professor return for future seminars at SEARCH.

"Shear Madness in Boston"

The 2011-2012 end-of-year outing takes SEARCH participants again to the Charles Playhouse in Boston where they will see "Shear Madness," a play which has been running since 1980.

This unique comedy-whodunit takes place today in the "Shear Madness" hairstyling salon and is chock full of up-to-the-minute spontaneous humor. During the course of the action, a murder is committed and the audience gets to spot the

clues, question the suspects, and solve the funniest mystery in the annals of crime. The outcome is never the same, which is why many audience members return again and again to the scene of the mayhem.

Voted "Best Comedy of the Year" seven times by the Boston Globe and recipient of the title "Best Play of the Year" by both the Chicago Sun-Times and the Philadelphia Enquirer, "Shear Madness" has also received the Raven Award from the Mystery Writers of America and has been inducted into the Comedy Hall of Fame, the first play ever to receive that accolade. "Shear Madness" is listed in the Guinness Book of World Records as the longest running play in the history of the USA.
