My name is James Fabiano and I am program director of a remarkable program that has been on the seacoast for the past 31 years. The name of the program is Project SEARCH. It is a collaborative effort by many schools on the seacoast of New Hampshire and Maine. In fact, it is a one of a kind program that introduces college life to almost 225 students and has them confront issues they will have to deal with in their lives.

Attached is a report of the 2013 – 2014 SEARCH program. I have been with the program since its inception and have had conversations with many past participants of SEARCH who tell me how the program not only helped them cope with the changes they experienced during their first year away from their high school but also make them think about important issues that confront us all.

The 2013 – 2014 SEARCH program was developed to become one of the most insightful and motivating programs we have had to date. I also want to take the time to thank Ms. Dorothy M. Byrne, President of The Byrne Foundation. Her generous contribution to Project SEARCH has helped hundreds of young men and women of New Hampshire and Maine. We all understand these are difficult economic times but with the help of people like Ms. Dorothy M. Byrne this important program is destined to continue. 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Project SEARCH
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Project SEARCH is designed to provide an on-campus, intellectually challenging experience for academically motivated high school students. The program has been in operation since 1983, recently completing its 29th year. The total program enrollment ranges from 200 - 225 students, with the population consisting of 84% seniors, 14% juniors, and 2% sophomores. School enrollment numbers range from 5-25 students, based on school size and individual school district budgets.

Participants travel to the University of New Hampshire-Durham campus for six afternoon seminars each semester. Each seminar consists of a one-hour presentation and a one-hour discussion group. During a typical presentation, participants hear informative, controversial, and often alternative perspectives on issues. During the discussion groups, students are encouraged to share their ideas and opinions with peers in their group. Students from the participating schools are deliberately assigned so that only one or two students from any one school will be present in each group. A graduate student from the UNH Teacher Education or Counseling programs facilitates the discussion group.

Additional SEARCH activities include a ropes course day at the beginning of the academic year and a spring semester field trip to Boston. The ropes course day is designed to develop cooperation, communication, and problem-solving skills, laying the foundation for the discussion group environment. During the field trip to Boston, students experience an afternoon at historic Faneuil Hall and a theatrical production. Participants are eligible to take courses at the UNH-Durham campus through the Challenging Academically Talented Students (CATS) program; upon successful completion of the course, the Program shall reimburse the cost of tuition.

Program Mission

To provide a forum on a college campus where high school students from southeastern New Hampshire and southern Maine can experience a series of presentations covering challenging interdisciplinary topics and interact with each other in discussion groups.

Important Changes from the 2013-2014 Program

The severity of the economy made it critical the program make financial changes in order to keep the program at its present state. We opted away from the Brown Center at the University of New Hampshire to the ropes course at Dover High School. This particular move allowed the program to freeze its tuition to the school.

The economic reality for academic programs is difficult. During the past year many schools were worried about the possibility of having their budgets cut. To date we have lost numbers from Dover High School. The program has been able to keep up with all its programs because of the charitable donation of Ms. Dorothy M. Byrne of the Byrne Foundation.

Project SEARCH is now an integral part of the Education Department at the University of New Hampshire. Our discussion group leaders will now have the opportunity of making their experience a part of their master's program.

These included Dr. Christine Schadler who is an expert biologist centered on the coyote, Dr. Jeanne Sowers who is an expert on the Middle East, Mime Robert Rivest, Tim Pifer of the New Hampshire Forensics Laboratory who was decisive in solving the Dartmouth Murders, Dr. Regina Shearer formerly of the Platters who is now an inspirational speaker and Dean of Admissions at Rivier University, and Boston’s Poetry Slam.

Notes: A favorite seminar of Project SEARCH students in the past, Tim Pifer of the New Hampshire State Forensics Lab brought the students through the process and eyes of forensic detectives. He gave them a step by step process of how the Dartmouth Murders were solved. He used his expertise and humor to enthrall his audience.

Notes: The poetry slam has become a staple for Project SEARCH. It is a favorite with the students because they are presented with award winning poetry and they are able to stand before their peers in order to recite their poetry. Simone is a national champion in her field.

Boston SlamMaster and world-class MC Simone Beaubien will return to SEARCH to host the annual poetry slam. The event always starts with an opportunity for students to read or perform their own poetry in a supportive, exciting environment. Beaubien, a 2008 National Poetry Slam finalist, will draw four other national competitors from the New England scene to perform their own original work in the slam. Poetry Slam is a thirty-year movement conventionally defined as “the art of competitive performance poetry.” It’s a fast-paced competition where poets have a limited amount of time to impress judges randomly selected from the audience: storytelling, lyricism, and stand-up comedy all come together in what’s evolved to a modern oral tradition. Slam is not a passive performance; in addition to the judges, other audience members are strongly encouraged to participate by cheering, whistling, or mildly heckling the hosts or judges. Kids and adults alike learn the power of a single word, line, or figure of speech when spoken aloud.

Student comments:

Hearing them perform makes poetry a universal language like music.

This gave me the capacity to figure out which art is better than other art.

Notes: Matt Simon who is a lobbyist in Concord for the legalization of marijuana debated State of New Hampshire Lobbyist Lauren Petraitis who is arguing to keep the present marijuana laws in New Hampshire. This debate, which was presented a day before a vote on the legalization of marijuana in Concord, both interested and intrigued the students. Most commented even though their opinions were entirely different they handled the debate in a civilized manner. Of course, there were times when it became a bit heated but was always under control. In fact, some students were hoping for a more heated debate.

This seminar clearly displayed how laws change in government through debate and careful discrimination of facts. This was the type of seminar the students talked about weeks later and brought back the discussion to their respective schools.

Notes: Professor Lawrence Reardon is a Professor of Political Science at the University of New Hampshire and an expert on the history and realization of North Korea. He speaks Korean fluently and is an expert on its past and modern history. Few of the SEARCH students knew of the history of the Korean Peninsula or why North Korea is so aggressive. Professor Reardon gave the SEARCH students insights into their present actions against anything foreign. This insight could have never been accomplished through today's multi-media or social networking.

Professor Reardon used a lecture technique that some students found tiresome. But, they also understood that their post-academic studies will have professors who use this type of teaching technique. Professor Reardon was not only enlightening to my students but was also respectful of this age group.

Notes: In all my decades associated with Project SEARCH I've never seen my students more involved and affected by a seminar speaker. Mr. Shawn Armbrust was incarcerated for almost two decades for a crime he never committed. He sought out Project Innocence to help him win his freedom. Born out of the OJ Simpson trial, Project Innocence spent a massive amount of time winning his freedom.

This being a remarkable story by itself the one concept the SEARCH students received from this remarkable speaker was he held no contempt or hate for the system. He emotionally expressed his feelings by stating that any held in hate or regret would only lead to his downfall. He now is a successful businessman with a family. He speaks across the country to describe how unfair our judicial system can be. He also speaks against the massive numbers of incarcerated people in our nation. To editorialize a bit, I've never been more affected by a seminar speaker at Project SEARCH.

April 2, 2014:

"Shear Madness in Boston"

The 2013-2014 end-of-year outing takes SEARCH participants again to the Charles Playhouse in Boston where they will see "Shear Madness," a play which has been running since 1980.

This unique comedy-whodunit takes place today in the "Shear Madness" hairstyling salon and is chock full of up-to-the-minute spontaneous humor. During the course of the action, a murder is committed and the audience gets to spot the clues, question the suspects, and solve the funniest mystery in the annals of crime. The outcome is never the same, which is why many audience members return again and again to the scene of the mayhem.

Voted "Best Comedy of the Year" seven times by the Boston Globe and recipient of the title "Best Play of the Year" by both the Chicago Sun-Times and the Philadelphia Enquirer, "Shear Madness" has also received the Raven Award from the Mystery Writers of America and has been inducted into the Comedy Hall of Fame, the first play ever to receive that accolade. "Shear Madness" is listed in the Guinness Book of World Records as the longest running play in the history of the USA.

Project SEARCH also took part in “Body World” at Quincy Marketplace. This unique exhibit demonstrates human anatomy from real human cadavers.

Please note that the February 5, 2014, scheduled seminar was cancelled due to extreme weather. The subsequent rescheduled event was also cancelled because of a difficult winter. The 2014 – 2015 SEARCH season will have an additional seminar that will include the crisis in Syria.
