

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A HISTORY OF ALBURY LAPIDARY & ALLIED CRAFTS-INC. 1964 TO 2019

The inaugural meeting of the Albury and District Lapidary Club was held at Albury High School on 23rd October 1964 and 70 people attended the meeting. The search began for a place to call a home and one was found at Jindera in the old store in March, 1965. When the owner of this building died and the building was sold to the Jindera Museum, the members eventually found a home in a cellar in Wilson Street, apparently next door to where Harvey Norman was, this was on 29th September, 1965. During this time members brought their own chairs to meeting and necessities like cups, mop and bucket etc. were all donated. On the expiry of the lease for the cellar a new home had to be found, this was a brick cement building in the North East Dairy Company on the Lincoln Causeway in June 1969 for the princely sum of \$3 a week.

The Club sought a land grant from the Council and in November 1970 this was granted. As no money was forthcoming from the Council, although Mayor Cleaver Bunton spoke up for the club on many an occasion, a small group of people slaved making lucky dips and travelling around 8 local shows and holding stalls at every conceivable place for 4 years until they had saved enough money to start building. On 27th July, 1973 plans for the building were finished. To get enough money to build it besides what they had made themselves, it was decided to work on an overdraft. The only Bank willing to do this was the Rural Bank and members were asked to put money in the Rural bank on fixed deposit as collateral for the loan. This they did and eventually were able to retrieve their money when the building was paid for. Total cost of the club was about \$10,000 and a Council valuation soon after was \$100,000.

The club was officially opened by Mayor Cleaver Bunton on 14th August, 1976.

On 22nd September, 1987 the club became incorporated and the name was changed to Albury Lapidary and Allied Crafts Incorporated, this was to widen the scope of what could be done within the club. Negotiations with Albury City Council, Department of Lands and the RTA started in 1998 and continued on and off again until they became a serious issue in the early 2000's. This was a most difficult time for those who were dedicated to the club and had to look after its interests. A subcommittee was formed to look after these interests. At one stage it looked like the club would not have a clubhouse at all as the RTA tried to say that the club's lease was not valid. The club had lots of problems with Department of Lands, RTA, and the architect. The council backed us and we eventually got the new building, further negotiations brought about the safety fence and the old window guards were put on the new building. With the aid of the Council we got all new fixtures in the club. A few club members and a couple of council workers shifted everything from one building to the other. A few women then painted all the equipment. Silver smithing benches were built by our teacher of 8 years and the President, these were then varnished by the same women. An open day was held on 11th March 2007 to open the clubrooms and Mayor Amanda Strelec did the honours with Greg Aplin giving a few words of wisdom. A Brass plaque was donated by Albury City Council with Council logo on it. Since then we have celebrated the Club's 50th anniversary. New equipment has been obtained through grants and another shed was built with a grant to house all the saws. Silver smithing has its own room and juniors are still in full swing after 11 years.

My husband and I have been members of the Albury Lapidary and Allied Crafts Inc. for nealy 40 years, it was originally Albury and District Lapidary Club until it was incorporated. We have filled every position on the committee several times over. We have seen great progress over those years, including a new building and the introduction of juniors under the age of 12 years. Our son Timothy introduced us to gemstones at the age of three and we then joined the club for his benefit. It was a family tradition until Tim left for ANU to take up geology and paleontology. I co-ordinated the 2013 Gemkhana at Albury and even with a heatwave we ran a very successful show.

We welcome everyone, tailgaters, dealers, competitors, followers of Gemshows, volunteers and the public to come to Albury for this great event. Lavington Lions will be providing a huge range of food and we hope the weather will oblige.



ALBURY-WODONGA

ALBURY-Wodonga has long been popular for gatherings of all kinds, so it is a natural location for a GEMBOREE. A riverside reserve is called Mungabareena, a "place of plenty big talk." Here the Wiradjuri and other language groups gathered for corroborees, talking and trading. Human occupation in these parts began perhaps 35,000 to 40,000 years ago.

Today Albury-Wodonga's combined population is more than 90,000. It is the 20th largest urban centre in Australia (The two municipalities were officially designated "One Community – Two Citige" in 2017)

Cities" in 2017).

Among the residents are more than 2400 people with Aboriginal or Torres Straits Islander heritage. They come from language groups all over Australia who were resettled from the 1970s onwards. Albury is an English name, but Wodonga a native word meaning "bulrushes". Locality names like Bandiana, Baranduda, Ettamogah and Thurgoona are enduring legacies of the first people.

Europeans did not arrive until 1824. In that year, Wiradjuri warriors lost a war near Bathurst with British settlers and soldiers. Within weeks. Governor Thomas Brisbane commissioned an exploration of the unknown bush between the Southern Highlands and the Victorian coast. Hamilton Hume, William Hovell and six convicts found a route to the southern ocean, encouraging white settlers to move further from Sydney to establish sheep and cattle stations and, in doing so, to drive away the indigenous inhabitants. Hume and Hovell's route from Appin brought them to the Murray at Albury. They trekked on to Corio Bay. Over the next decade, a track linking Sydney with Melbourne was developed largely on the explorers' route.

Albury began as a permanent white settlement about 1835. Wodonga followed a few years later. Squatters established stations either side of the Murray, one called Mungabareena, another Wodonga. An Irishman, Robert Brown, built Albury's first store and later a hotel by the Hovell Tree, and started a punt ferry.

In 1838, there was a clash between Aborigines and settlers at the future site of Benalla. Several Europeans were speared and far more native people were shot in reprisals, the affair being known as the Faithful Massacre. An anxious government established Border Police posts at Albury and Benalla to protect travellers and squatters from Aborigines and bushrangers. Once Albury was declared a township in 1838, timber and brick dwellings appeared. A surveyor's map noted the native name was Bungambrawartha, but a Sydney official altered to "Albury".

Gold was found in Albury's Black Range in 1851 and in Beechworth, Bright and Buckland areas in 1852. Albury's gold was not deemed viable to mine on a grand scale, but thousands of European and Chinese men set up tent towns in North East Victoria's rich fields.

Albury boomed as a crossing place, a customs post and a supplier of goods and services. About 600 people were living here when the first paddlesteamer from South Australia arrived in 1855 and the first newspaper began in 1856. From 1859, Albury elected its own council and mayor. The Murray was bridged in 1861 and Albury soon gained a court house, a hospital and a jail. A quarry on the Howlong road produced granite ideal for buildings and foundations. (See the old Court House in Dean Street, St Matthew's and St Patrick's churches and Kia Ora in Townsend Street). Wodonga village had its own customs post and police station.

District farms produced mainly wool, wheat and wine. German and Chinese settlers grew vegetables and tobacco. The Victorian railway reached Wodonga in 1873. Ten years later the southern line reached Albury from Sydney. In 1885 the two systems were linked over the Murray, though with different gauges. The 1880s saw Albury gain its own water supply system and a gasworks. By Federation in 1901, Albury had 6000 citizens and was short-listed as a possible Australian capital.

After World War I, construction of the Hume Dam provided jobs for returned soldiers. Another 1920s major project creating jobs was the Amalgamated Textiles mill, and Albury consolidated its position as one of Australia's great wool-selling centres. The Regent Theatre is a superb art deco monument to the 1920s era, as is the Albury War Memorial.

World War II saw Albury and Wodonga become virtually garrison towns, with vast camps for training and logistic units. The military presence continued after the war at Bandiana and Bonegilla. The latter base became a migration centre in 1947 and was the first Australian migration centre to house about 320,000 migrants before it closed in 1972.

Wodonga grew in the 1950s and 1960s due to these camps, the busy livestock saleyards and

new factories. In 1967 Wodonga welcomed Uncle Ben's, now Mars Petcare, where at times the workforce has exceeded 900.


Prime Minister Gough Whitlam's decentralisation policies in 1973-74 saw Albury-Wodonga became Australia's first designated National Growth Centre. Its initial population target of 300,000 by 2000 was halved under the Fraser government and abandoned in 1989. Nevertheless, the Albury-Wodonga Development Corporation I asted 40 years. It created 6000 home sites on well-planned estates, industrial and public parks, planted millions of trees and sold land for universities and TAFE campuses. Thurgoona and Baranduda were planned as satellite cities. With Leneva, they remain the main growth areas today. In the 1970 and 1980s, Albury gained the Borg Warner gearbox factory and a newsprint mill, now Norske Skog, and diverse manufacturing industries. Until the 1980s, both Albury and Wodonga had large railway staffs. Since then, health and education services have grown

enormously. Both have TAFE institutes, while the Charles Sturt and La Trobe campuses began in Albury and Wodonga in 1989. There is also a medical campus of the University of NSW. The region has a single Albury-Wodonga Health Service with two large public hospitals, as well as a Regional Cancer Centre, the Mercy Hospital and Albury-Wodonga Private Hospital.

Dean Street, Albury, was long the chief shopping area, but today there are malls in central Albury, Lavington, central Wodonga, Thurgoona and White Box Rise.

World famous tennis champion Margaret Court is Albury-Wodonga's best-known daughter. Other former residents range from singer Lee Kernaghan and actor Richard Roxburgh to another world-class sportswoman, basketballer Lauren Jackson. Lauren won gold and silver galore and was, of course, an Opal!

3 ENTRY FORMS:

ENTRY FORMS for all Sections must be received by The Competition Committee by Friday 31st January, 2020 together with a flat entry fee of \$5 per competitor. A stamped, self-addressed envelope for return of receipt must be sent with the entry form. Entries on a late Entry Form will be for Display Only. Entries from overseas competitors will be free.

4 ACTUAL ENTRIES:

ENTRIES in Sections 1, 2, 3, 4, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 18, 19, 20, 21, 24, 25, 26A and 26B will be judged before the GEMBOREE. They must be mailed to reach the Competition Committee by Friday 31st January, 2020. It is recommended that all mail entries be sent by Registered or Express Post.

Late entries will not be eligible for competition: they will be for Display Only.

ENTRIES in Sections 5, 6, 16, 17, 26C, 27, 28, 29, 31, 32, 34, 37 and 99 will be judged at the GEMBOREE. Entries must be delivered to the Competition Committee at the Gem Show Hall between 2 pm and 5 pm on Thursday 9th April, 2020. Approximate dimensions (in cm) must be entered onto the Entry Form for these entries to be eligible.

5 RETURN OF ENTRIES:

The preferred method for the return of entries should be stated on the Entry Form and, if necessary, sufficient funds to cover this return must be included with the entry fee.

Registered or Express Post is recommended.

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HOW I GOT INTO LAPIDARY



In 1975 while on holidays in South Australia, I visited a beach of pebbles on Spencers Gulf. I was amazed at the colour and variety of stones. Some were extremely attractive and I managed to fill several ice-cream containers with the stones I collected at that time. There was one very nice piece

of carnelian agate that I have since lost! When we got back home to the farm near Longwood in Victoria, I stored the precious containers along the side wall of the garage and promptly forgot about them.

Several years went by without much more thought of the stones I had collected until late one winter's evening when we were sitting around the fire enjoying the warmth and each other's company. My late mum was reading the "Woman's Weekly". The two centre pages featured close-up pictures of tumbled stones. Mum called me over to have a look. I was stunned by an endless array of amazing patterns, stripes, spots and translucent pieces in every colour of the rainbow. It was a bit like opening a jar of boiled lollies and making the impossible choice as to which one you liked best. I said "Gee, I'd like to get into that"! There was an article on the following page about this elderly gentleman who had travelled extensively around Australia in his Volkswagen campervan, collecting interesting stones and rock specimens as he went. He then polished and tumbled the many assorted stones that he had collected on his travels.

Next birthday my present was a book called "Australian Gemstones" by Nance and Ron Perry. This book displayed an impressive series of pictures of rough, semi-precious stones; polished faces; worked stones and tumbled specimens set into pieces of jewellery. It revealed the full potential of lapidary and some of what could be done with seemingly unimpressive bits of rock. I went looking for my ice-cream containers from Spencers Gulf and it all snow-balled from there.

From there, we joined the local lapidary club and began collecting stones and working them into cabochons and other attractive display pieces. As members of the Euroa Camera Club, we were familiar with composition, spacing and placement of strong colours and interesting features in a photograph. This knowledge provided a strong 50 starting point in the creation of attractive cabochons and later, pieces of jewellery and displays of minerals.

As we become more involved in lapidary, we went on fossicking trips to the far-flung corners of Australia, enjoying the outback scenery and collecting fantastic specimens along the way. Trips to the Harts Range in Central Australia and to Agate Creek in Queensland come immediately to mind as great field trips we enjoyed to remote locations. I have been back to Agate Creek many times over the years and have gathered together a beautiful collection of cut and polished Australian agates. The variety of agates is almost endless and every one of them has a fascinating variety of colours and patterns that makes them truly unique.

I am lucky to still live in Longwood, a small settlement just off the Hume Highway and close to many areas that still produce fascinating lapidary material. Beautiful Corop jasper can be found in the ranges to the west and some of the smoky quartz crystals found in the Strathbogie Ranges to the east, are truly magnificent.

I opened "The Rockery" at Longwood as a small business selling lapidary related items and to help share my life-long interest in rocks and minerals. It provides me with the opportunity to display some of my extensive collection and to share my love for the geological wonders of Australia and the world with those who visit the "Rockery".

The International Faceting Challenge

At the Albury/Wodonga Gemboree 2020 you will have an opportunity that should not be missed to see the work of the very top facetors. Not just from Australia, but from around the world. This is because you will be able to see the stones these people have cut in a very special faceting competition, which has become second to none the world over. It is known as the 'International Faceting Challenge'. The International Faceting Challenge is a world class faceting competition which is run and sponsored by the Australian Facetors' Guild. The Guild is an organisation which began in Warwick, Queensland in 1981 and is Australia's largest single lapidary organisation. It has been responsible for promoting the art of faceting and related activities throughout Australia

and has achieved world-wide recognition. The Challenge Cup (photograph next page) is a perpetual trophy and is a silver cup mounted on a polished mahogany base. There are plates fixed to the wooden base, which have been engraved with the names of the facetors comprising each of the winning and the runner-up teams since the competition began. The very first International Faceting Challenge was held at Loxton in 1986. This year the results of the eighteenth Interna-

This year the results of the eighteenth International Faceting Challenge will be on display at the Gemboree at Albury/Wodonga. The International Faceting Challenge (IFC) had its beginning in September 1984 when three Australian Facetors' Guild members who at the time were on their way

to the annual Guild Seminar in Warwick, Queensland conceived the idea of challenging the facetors of the USA to a faceting competition. The first Challenge was launched the same year. Since the initial challenge was finalised at the Gemboree at

Loxton, South Australia at Easter 1986 (won by



the USA team), a new challenge has been conducted every two years, with the results being published and stones being displayed at the Gemboree on each occasion.

The five entrants from each country/region who obtain the highest points for their entries constitute the team for their country.

In addition to this, the competitor with the highest points is named the Individual Champion. The International Faceting Challenge has been very well received by overseas facetors, and is seen as the Olympics of faceting. Although the basics have not changed greatly over the period the challenge has been running, there have been small changes introduced along the way which have resulted in the refining and improvement of the competition. This year will see for the first time the addition of Concave Faceting into the challenge to highlight this new faceting style. The shield (photographed left) is the Champion Facetor shield and is engraved with the name of the facetor who tops the individual score for each competition.

As a point of interest 21 competitors have received the maximum 100 points for an entry from 1986 to 2014.




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




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
