By the grace of God, we have been allowed to see the end of another conference year. It has been a year that has been filled with both joy and sorrow, hopes realized and yet disappointments, success in reaching some goals and failures in our efforts to obtain others. However, we have not allowed the challenge of the work of missions to stop us. We have continued to move forward and to try new things!!

We were challenged by the theme for the 2017-2018 Conference year, "All Things New." These words served as a guide and a conceptual framework for the work of missions. Embracing our theme meant that we had to engage in some serious examination of our missionary societies. Doing "a new thing" was also evidenced at the district level. We changed the format of our district meetings. There was a reorganizing of the committees for the Learning Experiences and the daily schedule was changed and a much-needed Marketing and Networking committee was added. There was an intentional effort to involve more of our young adults in the planning and implementation of the Learning Experience. Because of their

presence, our technology went to another level.

Another "new thing" was The More Than Enough Stewardship Initiative. Through the generosity of our members we received over \$87,000 of which every dime was used to help persons. Funds were given to several overseas districts, we increased the amount given for scholarships, helped survivors of the many hurricanes that took place last summer, and gave money to fire victims who lost many of their possessions. Thus, we ended this conference year feeling good about our efforts to try something new. We will continue to seek God for what God wants us to do and we will be obedient.

It has been my blessing to work with the finest missionaries you can find

anywhere. My thanks go to our District President, Patricia Nira Smith for all her hard work. Susan Butler has worked untiringly with the YPDers and had a very successful Annual Meeting in Bermuda. I could not find a better group of Conference Presidents and YPD Directors. Our district officers have also been outstanding. I am blessed to have a very capable office staff that include my administrative assistant, Ms. Marian Sudler and our receptionist, Brenda Merrill.

As we end the 2017-2018 Conference year, I look forward with much anticipation to the 2018-2018 year.

NJCWMS Member at Large Leticia Ricks, hosted an open, real, and judgement free conversation about questions we have about God, the church and real issues young adults deal with as Christians living is this world.

Prior to the event over 100 people of faith were surveyed and got some very interesting results! For example, nearly 60% of identified



Christians between the ages of 18-35 feel people don't attend church because of feelings of judgement. Collecting

information like this allowed us to format our discussion around topics that were relevant to



our audience. A panel of young adult women and the audience

spoke to the panel of pastors about young adult struggles with topics ranging from the



presence of millennials in church, choosing to be abstinent or not, church structure and more. The panel of pastors included, Rev. Eric and Myra Billips, Rev. Erika Crawford, Rev. Malcolm Guyton, Rev. Marty Robinson, and Rev. W Golden Carmon Sr. Members of the audience and Pastors opened-up about their joys, various struggles that they face today and hopes they have for the church. The experiences exchanged left everyone feeling encouraged and enlightened.

The next steps are to connect with pastors and



youth ministry groups to create a space that allows for

judgement free, spiritual growth specifically for young adults by expanding this forum throughout the conference and district. The event was an all-inclusive stewardship and missionary initiative which also raised over 200 self-care products for the young adults of the Covenant House in Atlantic City, a home which supports homeless young adults.

continue to meet on our Prayer-Line every Tuesday morning from 6:30am-7am and evening from 8:30pm-9:00pm; attended our Advent Worship and Praise Service, hosted by the St. John Church Family, with an inspiring and challengng message from Bishop Ingram; continue to give on-going support to the Women's Opportunity Rehabilitation Center for our Project Possible: Women In Need Program by donating office supplies, water, copies of the Daily Bread Magazines and toiletry items, clothing, books and toys to the clients and their children; attended the WORC Christmas Celebration in December, gave gifts to everyone (clients and children) in our Family Adoption Program and donated \$500.00 to help with their monthly expenses; made and donated approximately 350 Christmas cards to the Cards For Kids Foundation; attended and participated in the 1st District WMS Ruth Henderson Hughes Learning Experience.

The Areas and Local Societies were actively engaged in their annual Thanksgiving Projects providing gift cards along with food baskets for persons in the community; donated clothing items to a Women's Shelter; reached out to the residents of domestic violence in the "Strengthen Our Sisters" temporary housing Facility, distributed food, gifts and shared testimonies and offered encouragement; sponsored a Night of Healing and Prayer Service and HIV/AIDS Awareness Event and distributed toys and coats to over 25 children; adopted the Providence House and collaborated with three organizations and sponsored a Holiday celebration for the 16 Mothers and 26 Children; donated toys to The Kings Inn Family Center in Queens in their Toys for Tots Drive and provided services to the Tilden Residence and gave gifts and gift cards to 240 children for the

Holiday; distributed scarves to 45 residents of a nearby Nursing home and 60 disabled Veterans; donated 150 coats (provided by a local business) to the Long Island Coalition for the Homeless; 75 coats and other clothing items were given to a nearby Women's Shelter for the residents and their children; donated 107 gifts for children in the Angle Tree Project; donated four U-Haul Boxes filled with toiletry items and warm clothing to the Conference Project Possible: WIN Program at WORC; partnered with the Seniors Ministry to provide transportation to the polls on Election Day; partnered with the Treat-Me-Right Organization against domestic violence and provided food and clothing for the community; donated 10 tickets to the YPD'ers on a team building event; gave a monetary gift to the Bowery Mission and donated coats to the New York Cares Coat Drive; visited the sick and shut ins at home, in the hospitals and nursing homes.

sexual or labor exploitation. Children have been trafficked for use in sex industries such as prostitution, pornography, sex tourism and forced marriage. The Children are also used


for domestic work, sweatshop work, migrant farming, begging and armed services.

Steven Cousins Jr. Their embrace, as they served a delicious breakfast with a side of smiles, made the frigid conditions all the more bearable. The board was joined by the conference directors and graced with the presence of our YPD Director Ms. Susan Butler, WMS president Ms. Patricia Nira Smith, and our District Supervisor Rev. Dr. Jessica Kendall Ingram. To kick off a progressive meeting, we opened by welcoming the presence of the Holy Spirit to invade our space through praise and worship, sprinkled with a word that was placed on the heart of our worship director Earl King Knight III.
