











On October 28, 1954, the bid was accepted from Fisher-Hengenbach (of Hastings) for a 1955 Ford Interceptor Police Cruiser for the price of \$1730. The accessories were purchased from Peterson Motor sales for \$15.53. The car was paid for on January 13, 1955.
