




🚺 ABOUT HOBART



i ABOUT DARWIN

Australia's tropical capital, Darwin, is an outdoor adventurer's dream destination. The ideal time to visit is during the dry season, which runs from April until October. Expect clear blue skies, warm days, with temperatures averaging between 22 and 30 degrees celsius. Average rainfall during the months of June and July can be as low as 10mm for the entire month!

Darwin's rivers, lakes and estuaries offer incredible fishing opportunities, with a number of tours and charters that give travellers a chance to head out and chase monster Barramundi (or 'Barra' to locals).

For nature lovers, Darwin has two stunning National Parks right on it's doorstep: Mary River National Park and Litchfield National Park. Alongside the world famous Kakadu National Park, they are home to an abundance of wildlife, with tours allowing visitors to spot the various bird species, saltwater crocodiles and of course, Barramundi.

When it comes to incredible landscapes, unique wildlife, friendly people and sunny days, it's hard to beat the Top End!
