ARCHAEOLOGICAL DIGS ON COLONSAY From the Corncrake, Newsletter of Colonsay

The island of Colonsay is undergoing excavations Marianne O'Connor and Colin Breen (an Archaeologist) at the University of Ulster in Coleraine, Northern Ireland, have been awarded funding from the Arts and Humanities Research Council to work on an archaeology project on Colonsay. This will involve investigation examining the cultural landscape history of Colonsay during the 2nd Millennium and will include targeted excavations at a number of sites selected through discussions with the Colonsay Community. The first of a series of archaeology investigations took place over the Easter period with excavations at Dun Cholla with two archaeologists, Colin Breen (University of Ulster) and John Raven (Historic Scotland). The next period of excavations will take place at the end of May at other locations around the Island.

Clan Parliament Gathering September 4-7 2013



All clans folk are invited to visit and join with others at **the Clan Macfie Parliament and Gathering**. A full programme of events, excursions and entertainment has been put together for your enjoyment, along with the opportunity to explore the delights of the area and beyond.

The Gathering will be based in one of Dumfries' premier hotels, the Cairndale Hotel, which is situated close to the town centre and railway station.


Dumfries is situated in the South West of Scotland and is the county town in the beautiful area of Dumfries and

Galloway. Dumfries has train, coach and road links to Scotland and Northern England. The area is steeped in history with some significant historic events having taken place in the area. Discover historic castles, forest parks, 200 miles of coastline and plenty of perfect habitat where an abundance of fascinating wildlife flourishes. You will have the chance to learn

more during your stay at the gathering. Why not extend your vis- *North* it to explore the delights of the Dumfries area?

Accommodation – A special rate for the Gathering of £64.50 per person per night has been secured at the Cairndale Hotel, located in English Street, Dumfries, for those sharing a double or twin room. Single rooms are £89.50 per night. This price includes dinner (4 course), bed and breakfast and includes the Clan Dinner on the evening of Saturday 6th September. Dinner, including the Clan Dinner, is available each evening at a cost of £25 to non-residents.

The hotel offers double, twin, single and family rooms. It has a fitness centre and spa with swimming pool available free to resi-



dents and has lifts (elevators) to all floors. All the sessions of Clan Parliament, evening entertainment and the Clan Dinner will take place at the hotel. All excursions will also begin from the hotel.

Travel - Dumfries is easily accessible for those travelling to the UK with rail links from Glasgow and Carlisle. The station is only a few minutes walk from the Cairndale Hotel. There are also coach links from London, Manchester, Carlisle, Edinburgh and Glasgow and Dumfries' main trunk road, the A75, is connected to the M74 and M6 motorways. Car hire is available in the town and most entry ports to the UK. Directions and advice on travel options to Dumfries and the Cairndale Hotel will be made available to those who register for the Gathering, or who email **gather-ing2013@clanmacfie.co.uk**.

Registration and Clan Entertainment

There is a registration fee for all those attending the Parliament and Gathering. This has been set at £25 per person, but is free to children under 16 years. This fee will be used to cover costs for administration and paperwork plus each registered attendee will receive an extensive welcome pack and three nights of entertainment laid on at the hotel after dinner for residents and non-residents.

The Entertainment will include a Scottish music night with opportunities for Clan members to get up and perform. A Robert Burns presentation, but nothing stuffy, more a fun and amusing walk through the life and loves of the poet/farmer/fencible/ excise man. On the final night, following the Clan Dinner, there will be a ceilidh with a live band. Listen to Scottish tunes and jigs plus a chance to join in with the Scottish dancing. We hope that this will be a great finale to your stay in Dumfries.

The Clan Parliament sits every four years in Scotland. Led by the Clan Commander and it deals with Clan business. There will be two sessions of parliament on Thursday and Saturday mornings during theGathering. **All Clan Macfie members are summoned by the Clan Commander to be in attendance.**

Excursions - Four excursions have been organized for attendees to the Gathering. These have been planned so that you can experience and explore local attractions and beauty spots and to give you great value for money. Children under 16 are most welcome and will be charged half price.




Excursion 1 Thursday afternoon. This will consist of a visit to the famous Steamboat Inn at Carsethorn a seaside village that was once an important setting off point for Scottish immigrants to around the world. Also a visit to John Paul Jones' Cottage (pictured) at Arbigland, the birth place of the 'Grandfather of the U.S. Navy' and the trip will also take in the village of New Abbey where Sweetheart Abbey is located. The village was voted the best small village in Scotland in 2012.

Excursion 2 Friday. This is a full day excursion where we will travel by coach over the border to Cumbria to visit the Lake District National Park. This is an area of outstanding natural beauty with magnificent views of the lakes, hills and mountains. Our trip will include a boat trip on Lake Windermere, a ride on a Steam Train and a visit to the Beatrix Potter Centre. On the way back, time permitting, there will be short stop to view Hadrian's wall. Then on our return to Scotland we will call in at the Old Blacksmiths Shop at Gretna Green, the famous wedding venue, and you will have an opportunity to shop for Scottish food, drink, clothing and other goods. Excursion 3 Saturday. The third trip will be to Ellisland, the farm worked by Robert Burns. Here you can learn more about the Scottish Bard's home life. We then return to Dumfries and visit the famous Globe Inn, where Burns stayed and that he frequented. At his house (or haunt) his favorite seat stills survives, and some of his poetry may





mond on a bedroom window. Here you can have a dram or two. (Ellisland)


Excursion 4 Saturday. The last excursion on offer is an alternative to trip 3. This will be an afternoon on the range at Crocketford where Scottish firearms along with firearms, swords and other weaponry from the era of the '45 will be demonstrated. With a chance to handle and use them.

Colonsay

It is hoped that visitors to the Gathering will extend their stay and visit the many other attractions in the area and across Scotland. Some Clan members will be traveling onto the Isle of Colonsay on Sunday 8th September. If you would like to visit Colonsay as well, then we advise that you book your accommodation and ferry to the island as soon as possible. The Colonsay music festival takes place during this time and the island will be busy with visitors. Flights to Colonsay are available from Hebridean Air flying from Oban Airport, North Connel, but these are infrequent, serviced by light Britten-Norman Islander Aircraft with a capacity of only nine passengers and

Coach transport from Dumfries to Oban for the ferry crossing has been arranged at a cost of £30 per person, but this is dependant on numbers wishing to use this service. Please indicate on the registration form if you wish to reserve a place for this one way journey.

Kilts and Sporrans

Buying your kilt is a big step. It is expensive, so get it right the first time. There is the initial problem of deciding which of your Clan's tartans you wish to wear -- that is, if your Clan has more than one tartan. I recognize three tartans as Macfie. All have the same thread and color count. What makes them different is the shading of the colors. We have the Ancient, the Modern and the Muted/ Weathered. Which one you choose to wear is your preference. There are also two others that are semi-recognized as Macfie – the Funeral black and white, and the black and white with the yellow over-stripe. Both these tartans have the Macfie name attached to them, but neither matches the thread or color count.

The kilt is a very smart form of dress if worn correctly, and it is suitable for all occasions. Your kilt should be set around your waist, and if wearing a belt, it should act as the equator between the kilt and your shirt. In other words, the top of your belt should be in line with the top of your kilt. The straps of your Sporran (a pouch made of leather or fir that performs as a pocket or wallet in the pocketless kilt) should be hidden between kilt and belt. Seen from the back, only your belt appears. In other words, you put your sporran on first and the belt overlays it at the back. If you wish to appear neat, the length of the kilt is also important. The bottom hem should never be lower than mid-knee, but is thought nowadays to be set between an inch and two inches above mid-knee

May 27th is International Macfie Day.
