"Pat and Mac" McFee

Remembering Patricia Sullivan McFee and Martin Joseph McFee Pat passed away on November 4, 2016 and Mac on October 17, 2004 by Vicki McFee

They were a remarkable couple. Patricia Sullivan and Martin (Mac) McFee were born and raised in St. Maries, Idaho (U.S. Pacific Northwest). They were friends from early childhood...going to the same school, swimming in the St. Joe River together, spending time with mutual friends. When World War II broke out they were in high school, and after graduation in 1943 Mac joined the Army. He was 18 and Pat was 15 and they were in love. In time of war, one doesn't put off major decisions so two weeks after her 16th birthday Pat boarded a bus in Spokane, Washington, with a permission note from her Mother and her wedding dress in a small suitcase. She crossed the continent en route to Ft. Bragg, North Carolina, where Mac was in Paratrooper training, and they were married. Thus began an adventure that

saw them through 60 years of marriage.

After the war, they settled in Spokane (in the Pacific Northwest of the United States), where their two daughters, Vicki and Linda, were born. But they were always open to a new adventure, so when the girls were grown and graduated from high school, they upped stakes and moved with all their belongings to San Jose, California. They enjoyed the California scene, the warm weather, and being so close (50 miles) to San Francisco with its variety of entertainment and beautiful sights. Mac joined Hewlett Packard where he had a successful engineering career and was honoured for developing and installing the first solar panels at a Silicon Valley site. He also installed solar panels at their home and had one of the earliest residential solar panel installations in California. He was honoured and received awards state-wide, and also spoke at the California Legislature on the importance of solar heating/cooling. Pat worked as a cosmetologist and went to college, proudly receiving her Associate Arts degree.

They enjoyed scuba diving, and this led to a scuba diving vacation with their daughters and sons-in-law where they stayed at a quaint resort on St. Croix in the U.S. Virgin Islands...Cottages by the Sea. They decided this was just the kind of place they had dreamed of...situated on a white sand beach with 6 modest cottages. They were told it wasn't for sale, but when you have a dream you don't let minor issues get in the way. They stayed in touch with the owners, found out the resort was for sale the following year, and within the year they had sold their home, furniture, cars and other belongings and were on to their next adventure.

Mac was just 55 years old. Over the next twenty years, while making life-long friendships, they bought more land, built a home, and tripled the number of cottages...all while weathering four major hurricanes! Mac was very proud of his Scots' heritage and always insisted we pronounce our last name "Mac"Fee, no "MucFee" for him! He wanted us to accentuate our Scottish heritage. While convalescing in England from injuries sustained in the Battle of the Bulge, he took a train to Scotland to see what he could learn about the McFees. All he found was a record of a Macfie who was hanged as a horse thief, and that's the tale he shared with his girls as they were growing up. Years later, in 2003, Linda found out about a Macfie Clan Gathering in Gatlinburg, Tennessee. Linda, her husband, Jim Gilcrest, and Vicki got together there, met the

Clan Commander, Sandy McPhie, who took them under his wing, and they were hooked.

Pat and Mac sold their resort and moved back to the Bay Area in 2000 to be close to family again. Mac passed away in 2004, and when Pat, plus the three who had gone to Gatlinburg, attended the Gathering in Scotland in 2005, Pat brought Mac's ashes. She was bringing him home, and the family left a part of him on Colonsay in Kiloran Bay. In a poignant moment, Vicki took a photo of Pat standing on a butte above the Bay with her arms akimbo and looking out to sea. When asked what she was thinking, Pat responded, "I was claiming the island for Ireland." She was as proud of her Irish heritage as Mac was of being a Scot.

Pat passed away this last November with her daughters, grand children,

and great grand children at her side, and when the threesome of Linda, Jim and Vicki return to Colonsay this coming September, they'll bring her ashes to join Mac's in Kiloran Bay. Pat and Mac will be proud and happy to see their family share in joy and gratitude for their loving, indomitable spirit.

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Billy Joe McAfee was born October, 1, 1928 in Byars, OK, the first of seven children to bless the lives of Violet Florence Rakestraw McAfee and Clarence Mayburn McAfee. LTC (Ret) Bill McAfee passed away on March 14, 2017 in Easton, KS.

He was a US Army veteran of World War II, Korea, atomic testing-Nevada and Viet Nam, receiving numerous medals; the first of his family to graduate from college-St. Benedict's, Atchison, KS; Loan Officer and Vice President, First National Bank-Leavenworth; Master of Fox Hounds-Ft. Leavenworth Hunt 1969-70 & 1973-74 and Lion's Club President 1981-82, Leavenworth, KS.

He was also Past Master, Hiram Masonic Lodge #68, Leavenworth, KS; Past Master, Hancock Lodge #311, Ft. Leavenworth, KS; Potentate of the Abdallah Shrine Temple-Overland Park KS 1989; Royal Order of Jesters, Court 93-Overland Park, KS; 33rd Degree Scottish Rite Mason; National Sojourners, Chapter 154, Ft. Leavenworth, Star, Buington Chapter 177, Leavenworth, KS

KS; Order of Eastern Star, Byington Chapter 177, Leavenworth, KS.

Bill is survived by his wife of 47 years Maryann Stucker McAfee; who he married on Valentine's Day 1970 after they both retired from military service. He is also survived by his children Patricia McAfee, Lee Loden (Mark) and Michael McAfee; brothers Glen McAfee (Charlotte), Jerry McAfee (Carolyn), Bobby McAfee (Laren); granddaughters Erin Behunin (Aaron), Nikki Burns (Chris), Ruby Loden; great-granddaughters Natalie, Shelby and Blake Raines and their father David; numerous nephews, nieces and cousins in a large and loving family. He was preceded in death by his parents, a brother Donald (Dobber) McAfee and sisters Virginia (Ginger) McAfee Burnham and Katherine (Sue) McAfee Reddick Robertson.

ed by more clans than ever before, and it was very




moving. By Sunday ternoon, everything was dwindling down, tents were being packed away, and slowly everyone was leaving, with well wishes til the next games.



Books and other Interesting tidbits

Author Susan McDuffie has a new book coming out "THE DEATH OF A FALCON", A Muirteach MacPhee Mystery, which takes him to the Edinburgh court of Robert II in the company of Prince Henry Sinclair. Other books in the series are "A Mass for the Dead, "The Faerie Hills" and "The Study of Murder" Susan McDuffie writes historical mystery novels set in medieval Scotland. Fascination with the past and her own Scottish clan history led Susan to create the Muirteach MacPhee medieval mysteries, set during the 14th century Lordship of the Isles.



I recently discovered a new book by Author Patrick MaHaffey, "The Last Clan Chief" is a historical fiction based on the traditions and myths of Clan Macfie and the life and times of its final clan chief, Malcolm Macfie. It is set in a turbulent time where history and Scottish folklore mingle. Throughout the tale, Malcolm struggles against internal and external elements to keep his clan together while fighting for their very survival. "The Last Clan Chief" embodies the raucous turmoil of the late 16th and early 17th centuries replete with religious upheaval, political intrigue and gripping mythology. Even though based in the old stories and myths I found this to be a great book, worthy of your time.


June 6th, 2017 was the 73rd anniversary of the commencement of Operation Overlord and the Nor-

mandy landings in Europe. As American's we remember the 125,847 casualties and the bravery at Omaha and Utah beaches.

However on Sword beach, another event of interest was occurring. Private Bill Millian was ordered by his commander to pipe their unit onto the beach. When Private Millin demurred, citing the regulations, he recalled later, Lord Lovat replied: "Ah, but that's the English War Office. You and I are both Scottish, and that doesn't apply." He played "Hielan' Laddie" and "The Road to the Isles" as his comrades fell around him on Sword Beach. Millin states that he later



talked to captured German snipers who claimed they did not shoot him because they thought he was crazy.



Robert McFie of Airds

The Heritage Hunters group was set up as part of the Rockfield Centre Project to gather, archive and preserve memories, photos, documents and artefacts of Oban. Eventually, these will be displayed in our new, userfriendly heritage centre within the restored building, giving a fascinating and comprehensive insight into the development of our town.

If you find yourself standing beside the sea wall in Oban, it only takes a little imagination to visualise it as it originally was. Built to coincide with the arrival of the railway in 1880, Sir Robert McFie of Airds demonstrated his vision, generosity and publicspiritedness by building this crenellated, sandstone 'briest' wall.

It ran originally along George Street when built in 1879 but was extended 10 years later round the new station concourse and along the front of Shore Street. McFie lengthened the newly-built Albany Street and continued his road up the contours of Druim Mor - what we now call Pulpit Hill. This road provided access for those wishing to build family homes and fine villas on the side of the hill overlooking the bay. He also donated £1,000 to the construction of the new municipal buildings in Albany Street.

Who was Robert McFie

and how did he come to be a generous benefactor to Oban? He first came to Argyll around 1850 when he acquired, among other properties, the Airds Estate at Port Appin, which he purchased for £26,000. A member of the third generation of the wealthy McFie sugar-refining dynasty, he not only inherited a vast wealth from his father. but also married into another prosperous family - the Fairries - who had also made their money in sugar.

Airds House had been a Campbell property, having been built a little before 1745. The estate extended to nearly 4,000 acres and had a grand factor's house, many farms and cottages and superb

seascapes on three sides.

Once established at Airds, he continued to invest in property and on November 9, 1861, is recorded as having bought 'the lands of Oban and Glenshellach with the houses and buildings in Oban thereonthe ferryhouse, miller's croft and loch (and salmon fishings), the Mill of Glenshellach or Oban with the croft, grass and pasturage belonging to the mill [the mill had been working as recently as 1851]. two portions of shore ground below high water mark (about 3 acres) situated at the back of Cawdor Place and Shore Street and about one third of an acre at the rear of Argyll Square'.

As well as that, he bought, also from Campbell of Sonachan, a large part of the lands of Glencruitten Estate and Ardconnel, stretching from Ardconnel Hill in Oban's north-east to Connel.

In the valuation roll of 1878-9. Robert had at least 158 tenants living in 'Glenmore, Glasdrum, Lochside, Drimvargie, South Pier, Cawdor Airds Place com-Place, Shore Street, Back Shore Street, Argyll Square, Back and Front High Street and Lochside Place'.

Robert McFie and his family were staunch adherents of the Free Church and he contributed to the building of the Free Church Hall in Stevenson Street. All the while he was selling leases in High Street- Argyll Square, Queen's Park Place, the Royal Hotel and Station Hotel were built on his land.

The railway arrived in 1880 and, later, the railway pier was built on reclaimed land that McFie had bought. The South Pier was acquired by the burgh from McFie and, 'indeed, his name was on almost every deed for houses on Pulpit Hill and Gallanach Road.' When the pier was constructed around 1890. part of his beautiful seawall had to be demolished but what remained is still an attractive feature in Station Square and George Street. His legacy to Oban is immense. Airds Crescent and memorate the man, the little McFie known bears Road McFie Gold nurses, presented to High School. carpenter wedding anni-

versary in 1898, there were great celebrations and tributes from tenants on the estate and from Oban Town Council.

'The rapid increase and prosperity of the burgh has been largely assisted by the innumerable concessions Mr McFie has made to the Corporation and also the liberal facilities he has afforded have provided outlets for enterprise and for the furtherance of the development and prosperity of the burgh." If the Stevenson brothers are

seen as the 'founding fathers of Oban', Robert McFie deserves to be remembered as the man who 'let Oban flourish'.
