We recently got a couple of messages from Society member Jim Mahaffey he wrote:

I have become very interested in knowing more about the MacPhie's participation at Culloden. I have read most of the reports on the internet plus several books on Culloden. I was fortunate to have visited the site twice, but at the time didn't know what to look for, etc. Basically what I have found to date is:

*Originally from Colonsay/Oronsay island.

After purchasing several books on Culloden, I did some research to find any trace of the MacPhee's present at that bloody battle in 1745. The book "No Quarter Given" roll of Prince Charlie's Army listed 3 MacPhee's (spelling alternated with McPhee). They were (1) Ewen McPhee (28) of Locharkaig, who was taken and transported (back to England I presume). (2) Murdoch McPhee (42) of Sandvegg, Eigg. A farmer, also taken and transported.

(3) Patrick McPhee of Invegarry, who surrendered 5-15-46. There were no listings under the spelling "MacFie". Has anyone else traced your linage back to one of these three? I would love to go back to Scotland and revisit Culloden.

Can anyone refer me to other sources with more about MacPhie's/MacFie role at Culloden?? Any info greatly appreciated.

From Bill McAfee:

I just read an article, "First Strike", in the May/June 2013 issue of *World War II* magazine that included a 1LT James McAfee. He was the co-pilot of a B-25 bomber under Col. John "Big Jim" Davies, commander of the 3rd Bombardment Group out of Melbourne, Australia. They participated with Royce's Raiders in April 1942 raids against Japanese forces in the Philippines just prior to Lt. Col. James Doolittle's more widely publicized attack on Tokyo. ("First Strike" is the way that article was list in the Table of Contents, but the author, John D. Lukacs, named it (page 30) was "Forgotten Valor".

Do you or any of your readers know anything else about this "cousin", like his lineage or what happened to him after April 1942?

At our Games, we had a very interesting visitor stop by. His name was Marc Pehkonen (a Finnish name). He is a piper from the Wasatch & District Pipe Band in Salt Lake City, Utah. He was excited to see a photo of Dreghorn Castle. He told us that his grandfather was born there. Before moving to the United States, Marc lived near Edinburgh and often passed the army base where the manor home use to be. It is off limits to civilians, but I had the impression that part of the estate is still open to the public. He hastily scribbled out a family genealogy which I can hardly read. His ancestor, R. A. MacFie, purchased Dreghorn Castle in 1862. His son John (which I think could have been Johnathan or Jonathan, which was popular at the time) William had a very large family, including a daughter named Janet. Apparently Janet had a son named Henry Paton. If Henry was born there, then Marc would be one of R.A. MacFie's great great grandsons. He told us that it was Janet's generation that sold off the family sugar business. The sons were all of an academic bent and no one wanted to run the business so the sugar refining was sold to the Tates who still operate MacFie's Golden Syrup. Scottish Heraldry

I know many have seen the people at some of the Games who wear badges and feathers on their caps and wondered why they wear these and who might be entitled to do so. Here is some history of Scottish Arms (Gleaned from the News letter of The McPhee Clan Society of New Zealand and the Internet)

Dr. Joseph J. Morrow, QC, is the Lord Lyon King of Arms of Scotland The office of Lyon King of Arms dates from the 14th century. The position may incorporate the much older Celtic office of royal Seanchaidh or of King's Poet with responsibility for keeping the royal genealogy and attending the inauguration (later coronation) of the King.

The Lord Lyon is the sole King of Arms in Scotland. He is Head of the Heraldic Executive and the Judge of the Court of the Lord Lyon which has jurisdiction over all heraldic business in Scotland.

The origin of the Coat of Arms was a jacket or tabard worn by a mediaeval Knight over his armour in order to identify himself. Nowadays the expression "Coat of Arms" is generally applied to what is officially called an "Achievement", which consists of various parts: a shield, helmet, mantling, wreath, crest, motto and sometimes supporters and decorations.

There is a widespread misconception that a family or a clan can have a family or clan Coat of Arms. Many heraldic and clan web sites and other media suggest that a person has the right to use the family or clan Arms. This is completely incorrect.

A Coat of Arms belongs only to one individual person and can only be used by that person and no one else. In order for a person to be able to use a Coat of Arms it is necessary for that individual person to apply for a personal Coat of Arms to be granted to him or her.



Chiefs of clans have the right to wear their Crests as badges either simpliciter, without the accompaniment of circlet, motto or feathers behind the badge. or, as is more usual, surrounded with a plain circlet inscribed with his Motto or Slogan, NOT a strap-and-buckle which is for clansmen; and, if they choose, with THREE eagle's feathers in silver behind the circlet.



Heads of large branches of a Clan, who have been Officially Recognized as Chiefs by the Lord Lyon King of Arms, may wear: either their own personal Crest within a plain circlet inscribed with the Motto, as for a Chief, but with two small eagles' feathers instead of the Chief's three. If the Chieftain is also a Peer, he may add the appropriate coronet of rank on top of the circlet, or they may wear their Chief's Crest badge without feather Two eagle feathers behind the like any other clansman



Armigers: A person who has registered his or her own coat of Arms and Crest, or inherited these according to the Laws of Arms in Scotland from an ancestor who had recorded them in the Lyon Register, may wear their own Crest as a badge: either on its Wreath, Crest Coronet or Chapeau, or, as is more usual, within a plain circlet inscribed with his Motto. An armiger may also choose to wear instead the Crest badge of his Chief if the armiger is a clansman. An armiger is entitled to one silver eagle's feather behind the plain circlet, and if he is also a Peer he may add his appropriate coronet of rank on top of the circlet.

Clansmen and clanswomen

These are the Chief's relatives, including his own immediate family and even his eldest son, and all members of the extended family called the "Clan", whether bearing the Clan surname or that of one of its septs; that is all those who profess allegiance to that Chief and wish to demonstrate their association with the Clan.

It is correct for these people to wear their Chiefs Crest encircled with a strap and buckle bearing their Chief's Motto or Slogan. The strap and buckle is the sign of the clansman, and he demonstrates his membership of his Chiefs Clan by wearing his Chief's Crest within it.

In 1850, A Farmer Found A Secret Door In The Sand. Sent by Cliff McDuffie

In a small bay in Scotland, a well-kept secret is hidden among the green hills. At first glance, it might not seem particularly impressive, but step inside and you'll be amazed at what you see.

Thousands of years ago, it was a bustling society. But time and weather buried it under the sand. For millennia, no one knew that this place ever existed, but when a terrible storm swept over the Orkney Islands in 1850, an incredible secret was revealed.

Nestled in the mossy, green hills on the Orkney Islands off Scotland is a secret older than the great pyramids of Egypt.



At first, it might not look like much, but the fact is, this is a unique and magical place. Because within this rolling hillside is a perfectly preserved prehistoric village called Skara Brae

The winter of 1850 hit Orkney hard. A severe storm caused great devastation and resulted in more than 200 deaths. But it also revealed something long forgotten. When the storm abated, villagers discovered a settlement under the sand.

The settlement consists of eight stone houses and was inhabited between roughly 3180 and 2500 B.C., making Skara Brae one of the oldest agriculture villages in the UK. Skara Brae has been called the Scottish Pompeii because the ancient monument is so well preserved. Since the surrounding sand and the buildings architecture were well protected against the cold, both the buildings and their contents have been remarkably preserved throughout the millennia.

Archaeologists estimate that 50-100 people lived in the village. When the settlement was built, the houses were 1,500 meters from the sea. Now, the sea has dug closer to the village and the view from the settlement has changed from pastures to the sea. The settlements seven or eight houses were connected to each other by tunnels. Each residence could be closed off with a stone door.

Skara Brae was a society which centered around families. The dwellings are all quite similar, which led archaeologists to conclude that this society was a fairly equal one, without any authoritative leadership. Some believe that the villagers were Picts, a people of unknown origin who settled in eastern and northern Scotland near the end of the British Iron Age. But archaeological findings have

shown that the people

who lived here could have lived much earlier than that. A number of mysterious discoveries have been made at the site, including this carved stone ball, though no one really knows what it was used for. And no one knows why the village was abandoned. But around 2500 B.C., the Orkney Islands became cooler and wetter. Many theories speculate about how the people of Skara Brae met their fate; the most popular ones involve a violent storm. Whats the future look like for Skara Brae? Although the settlement was built nearly two kilometers from the beach, in recent centuries, it has been increasingly threatened by the sea. Since 1926, the houses have been protected from the approaching sea and harsh autumn winds by a concrete wall.



There has been talk about building an artificial beach with boulders and breakwater to preserve Skara Brae and several other ancient monuments at risk of being destroyed. But nothing has happened yet. Until further notice, tourists continue to visit this fascinating place, but the question is for how long? I personally hope that the Scottish Government will do all they can to preserve this amazing place.

Robert Burns

Robert Burns was born on January 25,1759 and died July 21, 1796) he was a Scottish poet and lyricist. He is widely regarded as the National Poet of Scotland. Burns began life as a poor tenant farmer but was able to channel his intellectual energy into poetry and song to become one of the most famous characters of Scotland's cultural history. He is best known as a pioneer of the Romantic movement for his lyrical poetry and his rewriting of Scottish folk songs, many of which are still well known across the world today. Celebrations are held around the world on or near his Birthday, to commemorate Burn's life and poetry. A Dinner is served consisting of Haggis, neeps and tatties and other Scottish Fare. There is also a time of poetry reading and other activities to celebrate Scotland's most famous Bard.

AMERICAN STYLE HAGGIS

BY GINGER MCAFEE

1 pound ground lamb meat 1 pound ground pork ½ pound ground beef ½ pound liver (Cooked and ground) 1 medium onion chopped fine 1 stalk celery chopped fine 2 Cups steal cut Oats (or old fashioned oats)

1 cup water or beef stock

2 eggs

1 tsp. Salt, 1 tsp black pepper 1 t sugar 1 tsp Ginger ½ tsp cloves ½ tsp. Allspice ½ t nutmeg



Mix well and bake in greased pan at 350 for 1 hour. Or you can shape like a haggis and cook in a large baking bag.
