### September is National Head Lice Prevention Month!



Each year, the National Pediculosis Association (NPA) sponsors the All Out Comb Out-- NPA's National Head Lice Prevention Campaign for back-to-school.

What is the NPA's message? CombFirst! Learn what to look for, and screen the children for head lice and nits regularly. Early detection with a quality combing tool and thorough manual removal of lice and nits is the best approach given that there is no totally safe and effective chemical treatment available.

Be prepared!

## Flu shots/ Prevention

It is that time of year when we need to take precautions to protect against the seasonal flu. Everyone 6 months of age and older should receive the flu vaccine. It is important for family members and care givers to receive the flu vaccine to protect infants less than 6 months who cannot receive the vaccine. The flu vaccine is the first and most important step to take for prevention, according to the Center for Disease Control.



Try to avoid contact with individuals who are sick. Frequent hand washing with soap and water or use of alcohol-based hand sanitizers can help decreases the risk of spreading or getting the flu. Cover mouth and nose when you sneeze or cough with a tissue. Try to avoid touching your mouth, nose and/or eyes, because this is a way to spread germs.

If you are sick with the flu, it is important to: Stay at home for 24 hours after fever is gone without using medication to relieve the fever. The exception is to seek medical attention. Limit contact with others to limit the possibility of infecting others and follow all of your doctor's recommendations.
