Hook choice can be as simple o complicated as you want to make it. Factors such as size, shape and weight of the bait, size of the target fish's mouth, strength of your line and reel drag and rod dynamics will al influence what is the best hook choice for each style of fishing. To make the decision simpler, start with the most important attribute of a hook: its sharpness. A hook point must be able to penetrate the fish's mouth and must also have the strength to hold its shape under pressure. Finer gauge hooks achieve sharper points and are the most effective at securing a hook-up, but they're more susceptible to straightening under pressure and the hook point more easily damaged. Thick gauge hooks are more suitable for bigger species with hook-bending jaw strength, but when using these an angler must keep in mind that several firm rod strikes may be necessary to ensure the hookup is secure.

For fish that weigh less than five kilograms, choose the smallest hook which is still practical for the size of bait you're using-remember that you can catch a big fish on a small hook, but it's hard to catch a small fish on a big hook.
