POSSIBLE "CB245 RED RADIO" HANDHELD RADIO USED FOR RCIED TRIGGER - THAILAND

SUMMARY

- Date: January 28, 2019
- Location: Bannang Sata District, Yala, Thailand
- Summary
 - Thai authorities responded to an Improvised Explosive Device (IED) report to find a hoax IED filled with sand. The IED was at the entrance to a village. At some point during the investigation the security forces were ambushed and fled. A body of one of the responders was found 1 km from the hoax IED.
 - When additional security responded to the ambush, they found an RCIED in the entrance to the other side of the village. 20 kg of explosives were in a fire extinguisher.

KEY POINTS / UNKNOWNS

- Thailand has a unique radio band called the "Citizens Band 245". The band has 80 channels between 245 - 245.9875 MHz.
 - These radios by regulation must have a red case to uniquely identify them.
- This is the first time over the last 5+ years that a "CB245 Red Radio" has been seen or reportedly used in an RCIED trigger by the Thai southern Islamic separatists.
 - The vast majority of reported RCIED triggers over the past 5 years have been handheld radios and almost all reported models were TYT TH-F8 radios.

O Unknowns

- While the radio was almost definitely "sold" as a red radio it possibly operates over two or more frequency bands.
- If the radio operates over two or more bands, it is unknown what band was in use.
