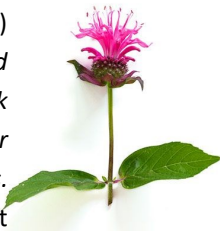


Some of the plants in the Fragrance Garden

Catnip (*Nepeta cataria*)
Bees love the flowers. Cats like the leaves.
Flowers: July-August



Beebalm (*Mornada*)
Indians brewed beebalm tea to drink for pleasure and for medicinal purposes.
Flowers: July/August



Lambs Ear (*Stachys*)
Featured as a bedding herb, It makes a splendid contrast to tall herbs.
Flowers: June



Lavender (*Lavandula*)
Traditionally exploited in sachets to protect linens from moths and to freshen sick rooms.
Flowers: June/July



Lemon Balm (*Melissa*)
A lemony and minty scent that has endeared people for a least 2000 years.
Flowers: July - September



Sage (*Salvia*)
Has the reminiscent of Thanksgiving.
Flowers: June



Catmint (*Nepeta mussini*)
Purple spiked flowers.
Flowers: Summer



Tansy (*Tanacetum*)
A common strewing herb-tossed on floors to release its scent.
Flowers: July - September

Wormwood (*Artemesia*)
Once used as a strewing herb.
Flowers: July/August



Thyme (*Thymus*)
Burned to chase stinging insects from the house.
Flowers: June/July



Scented Geranium (*pelargonium inquinans*)
Single pink flowers
Flowers: Spring



Feverfew (*Tanacetum parthenium*)
Dainty daisy like flowers.
Flowers: Summer/Fall

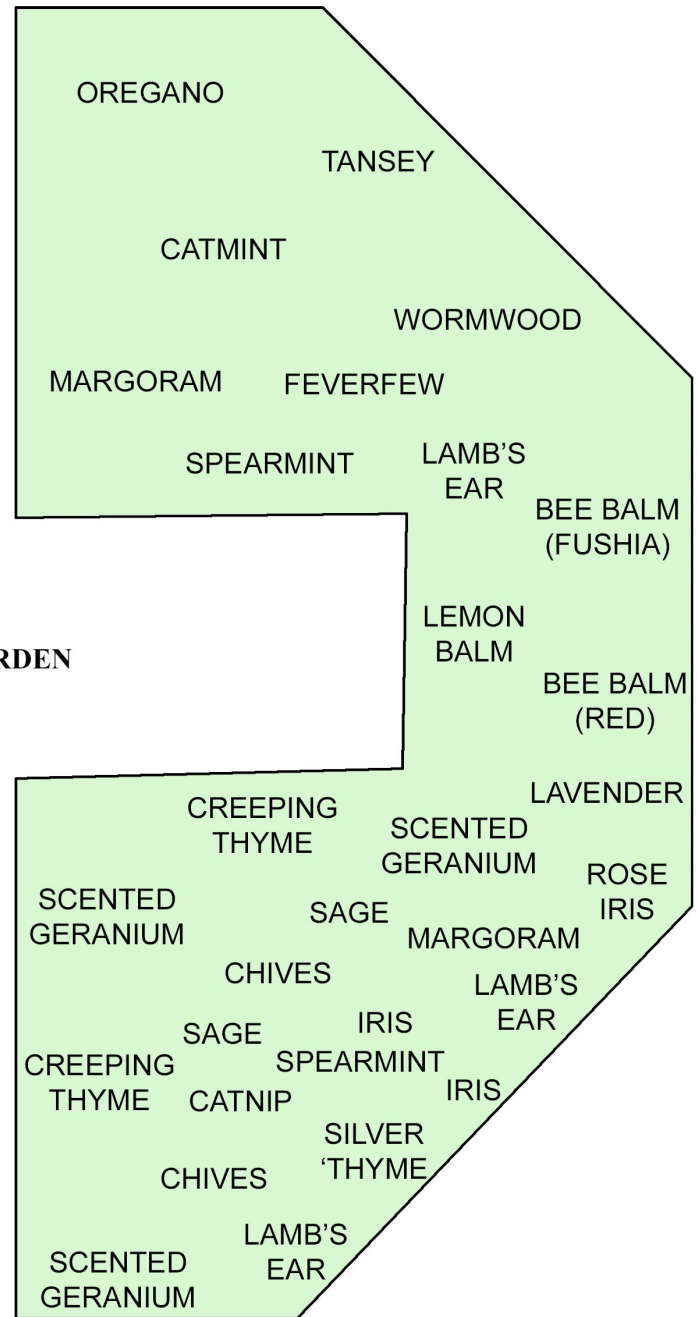
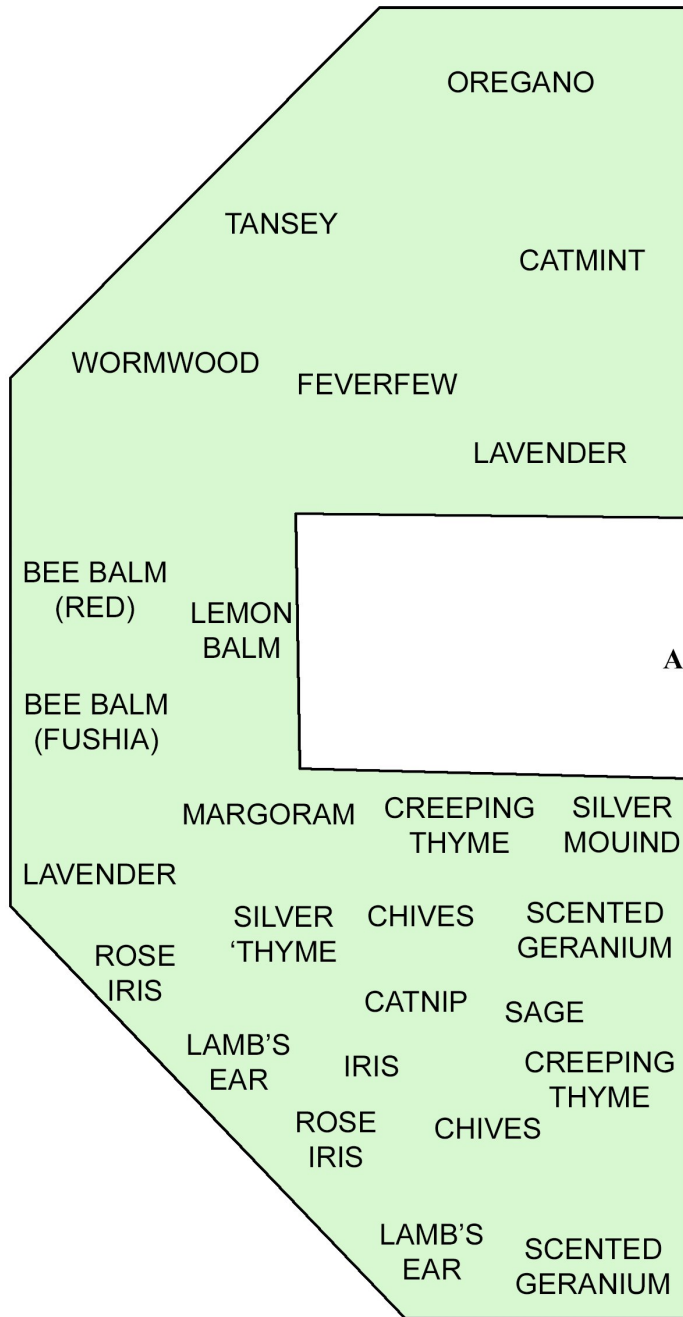


A Fragrance Garden at the Fisher-Richardson House Mansfield, Massachusetts
