Scholarship ♦ Visual Arts In 2016 a scholarhip was created for a visual arts student showing a high level of artistic skill.

Scholarship • Instrumental In 2019 a scholarhip was created to recognize the top performer in Instrumental.





Festival ends with a concert


The Highlites Concert at the Deloraine Winchester Theatre Sunday afteroon brought this year's Border Festival to its close.

Following that, they may have further announcements to make about plans to build, the need for more donors, the value of their services to the community at large and to the growing number of seniors who make up a sizeable part of the population.
