Tax Forms: Monday, April 15th is Tax Day. As of the writing of this newsletter in February, we do have Federal tax forms. We only have IRS Form 1040, because the government eliminated Forms 1040A & 1040EZ this year. You can download NYS forms at <http://www.tax.ny.gov/> and Federal forms at <https://www.irs.gov/Forms-&-Pubs> and see the instruction books online, or stop in and see our library staff members for help. (We can print out unusual forms or schedules at the library for 15¢ per page.)

Game Night at Creekside Inn: Join your library friends for a fun evening of cards and board games **at Creekside on Monday, April 1st with drink & food specials starting at 6:00 PM.** Stay active and social, and make new friends. Please register in advance online, or by calling the library, so we know how many to expect.



Drop-In Story Time: **Thursdays, April 4th, 11th and 18th from 11:30 AM-Noon.** Children ages 2-5 (accompanied by a caregiver) will listen to stories with a different theme each week, chosen especially for this age group. No prior registration is necessary. This is a nice opportunity to meet with other parents and caregivers in your area.



Pollinators in Your Garden: **Saturday, April 6th at 11:00 AM** in the library. Pollinators play an important role in native ecosystems, home gardens, and global food production. Learn what gardeners can do to make your yard more attractive to these important pollinators. Presented by John Nelson, Master Gardener, with the Cornell Cooperative Extension. Children will become familiar with ideas in geometry through play; they'll learn about design and architecture, patterns and visualization, teamwork, spatial skills and more! 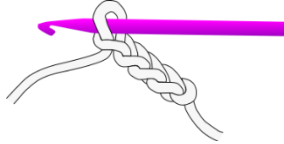

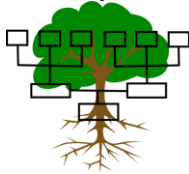

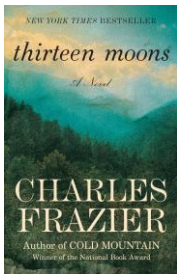
