THANKSGIVING THOUGHTS

Thanksgiving has come and gone! Here are some thoughts for next year, when we celebrate the 400th anniversary, or quadricentennial, of the first Thanksgiving.

"Being thus arrived in a good harbor, and brought safe to land, they fell upon their knees and blessed the God of Heaven who had brought them over the vast and furious ocean, and delivered them from all the perils and miseries thereof, again to set their feet on the firm and stable earth, their proper element." - William Bradford

"We have come to this Rock, to record here our homage for our Pilgrim Fathers; our sympathy in their sufferings; our gratitude for their labors; our admiration of their virtues; our veneration for their piety; and our attachment to those principles of civil and religious liberty, which they encountered the dangers of the ocean, the storms of heaven, the violence of savages, disease, exile, and famine, to enjoy and to establish. And we would leave here, also, for the generations which are rising up rapidly to fill our places, some proof that we have endeavored to transmit the great inheritance unimpaired; that in our estimate of public principles and private virtue, in our veneration of religion and piety, in our devotion to civil and religions liberty, in our regard for whatever advances human knowledge or improves human happiness, we are not altogether unworthy of our origin." ~Daniel Webster, oration at Plymouth Rock, December 22, 1820 (The Pilgrim Bicentennial)

Partisans of multiculturalism may contend that the American pilgrimage began with the establishment of St. Augustine in 1565, but that picturesque, historic town was simply a Spanish military outpost, and Florida was not one of the thirteen original colonies that joined together and declared independence on July 4, 1776.

Partisans of our British heritage can make a stronger case that the American pilgrimage began with the establishment of Jamestown in 1607 since this was the first permanent English settlement, the first representative assembly met here in 1619, and Virginia produced more than its share of distinguished Founding Fathers.

Thanksgiving Thoughts, continued

But Jamestown was founded simply as an extension of the English status quo, and the first settlers were less than Britain's best. It was merely nominally religious, class-conscious Britain transported to a New World wilderness, and it struggled long with a series of frightening massacres and terrible insurrections before it began to resemble an orderly community or a prototype of American civilization.

On the other hand, an impartial observer can make a much more convincing case that the American Pilgrimage - and the unique American identity - began in the experience of the Pilgrim Fathers and settlement of Plymouth in 1620.

The Pilgrims were the very embodiment of "American exceptionalism" - their lives demonstrated an exceptionally clear understanding of and deep commitment to the principles of liberty with order, tangibly expressed in spiritual, religious, political, and economic self-government under a written constitution: a prototype of "one nation under God, with liberty and justice for all." - Dr. Charles Wolfe, a founder of the Plymouth Rock Foundation, 350th Anniversary, 1970.

"Thus out of small beginnings greater things have been produced by His hand that made all things of nothing, and gives being to all things that are; and, as one small candle may light a thousand, so the light here kindled hath shone unto many, yea in some sort to our whole nation; let the glorious name of Jehovah have all the praise!" ~William Bradford, Of Plymouth Plantation

2020 FITNESS GAMES

For more than 18 years SLCCV has been the proud setting for annual event now called the "Fitness Games". WHAT TO DO WITH PASTA WATER

OK, so draining your pasta over the sink isn't going to do any damage to your pipes — but it's a pretty major cooking crime you should be aware of. Also called "liquid gold" by many in-the-know chefs, the water you've used to boil your pasta is filled with tons of starch that can (and should!) be used to thicken the sauce you're serving with your pasta. The starchy water acts like an emulsifier, binding together the water and oil in sauce. If you incorporate just a few tablespoons of the liquid gold into your sauce, you'll end up with a silky, restaurant-worthy sauce that won't leave a watery puddle on the outside of your plate. It'll also stick to your pasta much better, creating a much more enjoyable — and tasty — dining experience for everyone. And once you've made your sauce, don't think you can pour the rest of the water down the drain, either. Save it in an ice cube tray and use it as a thickening agent for soups, stews, gravy and future sauces. You won't be sorry!

LEARN HOW TO STOP ROBO CALLS

For a number of years, junk calls were not a hassle for people. The National Do Not Call Registry worked well for a while. Legitimate companies were generally very compliant and the violations that did occur were rare. Those that did violate the law were subject to heavy fines.

Then suddenly, in the last couple of years, the number of junk calls started climbing. By some accounts, **nearly 31 billion robocalls** were placed in 2017.

Why the sudden spike in robocalls and junk calls? It's because the technology exists that allows criminals to make unlimited calls — virtually for free — to every single number established in North America, including the U.S., Canada and many parts of the Caribbean.

From there, it's a numbers game for the crooks. They only need a small fraction of the number of people they call to believe the pitch and send them their hard-earned money.

So what can you do? You have to fight technology with technology.

Some wireless carriers offer free robocall blocking, too

T-Mobile, in cooperation with Hiya, has <u>made great strides</u> in blocking robocalls.

AT&T, meanwhile, was an early mover in this space. Back in 2016, AT&T released its Call Protect app — a free mobile app that automatically vets incoming calls to make sure they're not associated with robocall scams.

Pay services from Verizon, RoboKiller

Verizon has similar capabilities, but unfortunately charges its customers \$2.99 a month for them.

Also on the pay front, <u>RoboKiller</u> uses artificial intelligence to tie up the junk phone callers trying to rip you off.

This service, which costs \$2.99 a month, analyzes the first few seconds of your incoming calls to make sure noise patterns indicative of humans (not machines) are detected. Their system also uses whitelist and blacklist filtering, much like your e-mail at work, so you can whitelist a number like your child's school that may send out robocalls with closing-related info.

There is a low-tech solution

Ultimately, the best solution may be the low-tech one. If you don't recognize the number, don't answer - period!

If it is somebody whose call you should have taken, you'll usually get a voicemail within seconds. Then, you can listen and call them back.

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CHRISTMAS TRADITIONS

Christmas Trees:



The first American Christmas tree can be credited to a Hessian soldier by the name of Henrick Roddmore, who was captured at the Battle of Bennington in 1776. He then went to work on the farm of Samuel Denslow in Windsor Locks, Connecticut, where for the next 14 years he put up and decorated

Christmas trees in the Denslow family home.

The first president to set up a Christmas tree in the White House was Franklin Pierce, and the first president to establish the National Christmas Tree Lighting Ceremony on the White House lawn was Calvin Coolidge.

In 1882, the first tree lights were sold in New York City.

Christmas Cards: The first American to print and sell Christmas cards was Louis Prang of Roxbury,



Massachusetts, who began publishing cards in 1875. President Dwight Eisenhower is given credit for sending the first "official" Christmas card from the White

House. An art print also became the standard Christmas gift for the president's staff, a practice continued to this day.

Here Comes Santa Claus: The first department



Santa was James Edgar, who, during Christmas seasons beginning in 1890, would wonder about his store (the Boston Store) in Brockton, Massachusetts, dressed as Santa Claus, talking to the children of customers.
