



Dear Union Chapel:

### Saddle up and let's mov'em out!!

I remember attending a meeting with other pastors way up in what is called "the northern tier" of Pennsylvania. I cannot recall the name of the church where we gathered, but I recall some of the history related to that church. It was built somewhere in the mid 1800's. It was a unique design for a church of that time. Very nice. One of the things we learned that day is that the church was only occupied for about seven years and then the congregation moved and built a new church, closer to Mansfield, PA, roughly 12 miles away. As it was told and explained to us that day, the reason they occupied this location for only seven years and then built a new church was because they understood the population had shifted, folks were not going to travel the 12 miles, and they understood their purpose to be grounded in mission and ministry with people, not grounded in a building.

So here we are, about 175 years later, and you know what I find? Sometimes about 12 miles can still make a huge difference. Recently Mark Smith was back for a visit and he shared the difficulty he and Debra have had in finding a new church in Alabama. In Mark's words, "*Mike I just don't think we are going to find another Union Chapel.*" What a great affirmation of Union Chapel's church family, mission, ministry, and more. We are not perfect, but words like that remind us that God is indeed doing some great work among us! So let me raise a few questions at this point. Why then does the population center closest to us, Berkeley Springs, WV, not find its way to Union Chapel? How far would someone be willing to drive to come to our church building and connect with us? (Notice I didn't say, connect with God, because many would answer, "I don't need a church building to connect to God, I can do that from anywhere"). Again, 175 years later, 12 miles seems to make a huge difference, still.

I believe over the next months, after Easter, we should begin praying and discussing and dreaming about what it would look like if we were to find creative ways to take Union Chapel into Berkeley Springs. I don't know the details of it just yet, I am praying and asking the Spirit to move and guide and speak to us about possibilities. I do know that in Jesus' earthly life, 80% of his ministry was done around the Sea of Galilee, not inside a synagogue, or church building. And after he resurrected from the dead he kept going where the people were, the scriptures say he appeared to more than 5,000. Well, to do that in that ancient world, you certainly are not staying put! I am currently working with Rev. Bill Brown, Director of New Faith Expressions, within our conference. In April I will attend a three-day seminar about the same, "new faith expressions." On March 14<sup>th</sup>, Bill will be in Hagerstown at Leadership Days, teaching about the same. If you would like to go, please let me know, we will register you for his class and pay your way! (Here is the information link, but let me know soon!)

Reflections for Lent, inspired and written by Glenna Hovermale and Pastor Mike, these six devotions, for six weeks, will tug at our hearts and our phones and more than anything, our relationship with Christ.

Individual reflections will be emailed weekly, posted on Union Chapel Facebook, and hard copies are also available).

The season of Lent is the 40-day period of time (not counting Sundays) prior to Easter. It starts on Ash Wednesday and ends on Easter Eve. For Christians, Lent has always been a time to prepare ourselves for Easter and focus on our relationship with God. Jesus spent 40 days in the desert being tempted by Satan. During those 40 days he *fasted*. *The Christian fast is denying our bodies (the flesh) of those things we daily depend upon; food, drink, (and these days, screen time), in order to focus on our spiritual wellbeing and relationship with God*. Traditionally, Christians fast from things such as bread, alcohol, or chocolate.

What if we approach the season of Lent a little differently?

In today's world we seldom have the luxury of stillness. Instead we are making the most of e very waking moment by multi-tasking like a super hero. We are often over-extended with tasks to complete,

overwhelmed with responsibilities, and over-stimulated by a constant barrage of noise, notifications, and accessibility. Our cell phones are always just inches away from our reach, providing yet another opportunity for busyness and noise.

But, what if we do things differently during Lent this year?

What if instead of giving up pizza and French fries or chocolate, we consider giving up some of our busyness? What if we lay aside screen time and be still? What if we turn the volume down on our daily noise, so that we can hear what God has to say to us? What if take the time to listen, to feel, to reflect, and to be fully present?

What if we, like Jesus, intentionally set aside some time when we log off of our devices and let God in?

In 1 Kings 19: 11-14, Elijah is expecting to encounter the Lord in a powerful wind that tore apart mountains and rocks, in an earthquake, and in a fire. Instead, he found the Lord in a gentle whisper. During this season of Lent, will you commit to logging off of devices and listening for the Lord's gentle whisper?

## Taxpayers should know the telltale signs of a scam

Taxpayers are filing their taxes and may be waiting for a response from the IRS. It tends to be a period when thieves increase their scam attempts. They try to get people to disclose personal information like Social Security numbers, account information and passwords. To avoid becoming a victim, taxpayers should remember these telltale signs of a scam: The IRS and its authorized private collection agencies will never:

- Call to demand immediate payment using a specific method such as a prepaid debit card, gift card or wire transfer. Generally, the IRS will first mail a bill to any taxpayer who owes taxes. All tax payments should only be made payable to the U.S. Treasury. Taxpayers should never make checks out to third parties.
- Threaten to immediately bring in local police or other law-enforcement groups to have the taxpayer arrested for not paying.
- Demand that taxes be paid without giving the taxpayer the opportunity to question or appeal the amount owed.
- Ask for credit or debit card numbers over the phone.
- Use email, text messages or social media to discuss personal tax issues, such as those involving bills or refunds.

The beginning of a new year is a good time to be thinking about having financial items in order. Consider the following:

- 1. Have you updated your estate documents recently? Changes in life circumstances may cause you to want to change your executor, beneficiaries, or other important terms to your will or other documents. If you do not have a will or other documents, it would be wise to complete this task and have your thoughts and choices put in writing
- 2. Beneficiary designations in addition to your will, it is important to review life insurance policies, investment and retirement accounts, and any other plans and policies to make sure these are current.
- 3. Did you know there are many circumstances when it's best to have a specific beneficiary or beneficiaries instead of simply naming your Estate?
- 4. Did you know it may be useful to have someone else listed as a present or future owner of your bank and investment accounts?
- 5. A power of attorney and living will are important documents. Do you have these and are they current?

- In the late 1990s, pharmaceutical companies reassured the medical community that patients would not become addicted to opioid pain relievers and healthcare providers began to prescribe them at greater rates.
- Increased prescription of opioid medications led to widespread misuse of both prescription and non-prescription opioids before it became clear that these medications could indeed be highly addictive.

In 2017 HHS declared a <u>public health emergency</u> and announced a <u>5-Point Strategy To</u> <u>Combat the Opioid Crisis</u>

### **Opioid Crisis**

Devastating consequences of the opioid epidemic include increases in opioid misuse and related overdoses, as well as the rising incidence of newborns experiencing withdrawal syndrome due to opioid use and misuse during pregnancy.

Understanding the Scope of the Epidemic

### **Opioid Overdose**

Opioid overdoses accounted for more than 42,000 deaths in 2016, more than any previous year on record. An estimated 40% of opioid overdose deaths involved a prescription opioid. Why do Adults Misuse Prescription Drugs?

Policymakers can use this information from the National Survey on Drug Use and Health to help inform substance abuse prevention and treatment needs in their communities.

### Mission Monthly Backpack Program

General Description

The Starting Points Backpack Program provides food for the weekend or during school breaks to students in Morgan County who otherwise may not have food to eat. Teachers discreetly place bags in students' backpacks to take home.

Participants Role

The first person standing in line picks up a double bag, hands it to the next person who adds either a canned/packaged food item, and sends it down the assembly line. The last person ties the bag and it is placed in a carrier bag to go to a specific school. Bags are packed separately for those kids with food allergies or special dietary requirements.

Frequency

Every Thursday during the school year; at the Board of Education building at 247 Harrison Avenue, Berkeley Springs. Hours are from 9:30am until done. Usually 1 ½ hours. Union Chapel UMCs designated day is the 2nd Thursday of each month, but you would be welcome any Thursday.
