As we enter another Trinitytide, we continue to pray, work, and give for the spread of the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ through the Board of Foreign Missions. Thank you for your participation and support this past year, whether through the Advent Offering, Circles of Three, Sending Parishes, or hosting a Missions Sunday presentations. Every effort factors into the whole work of the Church!

How could you proceed this summer?

- <u>Continue</u> moving your parishes to sign up for monthly support of two or three individual missionaries and/or churches.
- <u>Consider</u> sending a short-term mission team to <u>New Wineskins Conference</u> and its <u>Reformed Episcopal Pre-Conference Day</u> this September (below).
- <u>Pray</u> for the mission trip to Malawi this summer to prepare the way for the Gressers' return to the Leonard Kamungu Theological College in Malawi next year.
- <u>Include</u> the *Cycle of Prayer* in the weekly intercessions of your parish.

While we will pray for many individual needs using the *Cycle of Prayer* this next season, please remember several special needs throughout Trinitytide in your parish's regular prayer life:

- leadership and new mission opportunities for REC Germany prior to the retirement of Bishop Gerhard Meyer;
- ministerial training and parish revitalization for The Free Church of England;
- regrouping and fresh leadership to assist Bishop Willians in REC Cuba after the loss of his wife, and regathering the Church in a land with many practical limitations and loss of clergy;
- development for the new missions in Croatia and surrounding countries; and
- the regathering of Free Church of England missions in Brazil.

Further Pre-Conference Description for Healthy Mission Mobilizers:

What if the West, in wise retreat, returned to a full embrace of the "nothingness" of Holy Baptism? Western Civilization, having lost its memory to understand those who have no personal desire for power or for insubstantial virtual reality, lives as if God was indeed dead. While the Church in history appears to suffer what Tolkien called "the long defeat," she is in fact all along conquering the gates of hell—by immersing others into true, life-giving, sacramental reality of God's Love.

This guided reflection builds upon Conor Sweeney's challenge for baptismal evangelism in Abiding the Long Defeat: How to Evangelize Like a Hobbit in a Disenchanted Age (Brooklyn, NY: Angelico Press, 2018), wherein he notes that it rarely occurs to the powers of evil that there are those "small ones" who are not compelled by the Power of the Ring but will instead destroy it through their little deeds done in love for their native land and its memories. This he names the "Baptismal Nothingness," which forms the basis for all Church Mission. Due to the beauty, love, and worship that has already shaped them in "the Shire" of home and parish, those in tune with their own baptism into Christ can see beyond the ephemeral allure of might and coercion, and advance the Kingdom to the ends of the earth. The "parish-shire" produces an unlikely band of knights and adventurers who perceive the distant prize of Jesus' victory—and venture forth to defeat the powers of Darkness.

The discussion continues beyond Sweeney's thesis for individuals and families to explore the Christian Mission in the context of the parish itself. One of the strengths of the Prayer Book Anglican parish is its organic marriage between the individual, the family, and the greater community. Its natural community provides a restful and fruitful oasis for human companionship while making immanent God's transcendent beauty, goodness, and truth. It is both apostolic voice and shepherd's calm to the world. Its members, rooted in their baptisms, bring their neighbors by hand to the font, while sending others farther afield.

This charism of Anglicanism provides thoughtful impetus to all its parishioners, and is able to organize the natural implementation of its planned mission strategy.
