Rummage Sale and the "Leftovers"

Each year in February we hold a Rummage Sale as a fundraiser for our scholarships to Camp Wekiva, the SEEK Conference, FFA, and the High College Scholarship.

When the sale has been completed we attempt to find community organizations which can utilize the items that were not sold. This year we were again able to find new homes for nearly all our "leftovers". Professional clothing (dresses, suits, shoes) was sent to the Student Clothes Closet at Daytona State College for students to wear at job interviews. Toys, books, and other small gifts went to Chisholm Elementary School for student incentives. The remainder of the clothing, sporting goods, toys, and other household goods were given to Save the Animals rescue organization for their re-sale store.



Community Garden

Nestled within the boundaries of New Smyrna Beach's "Westside Historic District," visitors will find our Community Gardens. These Community Gardens began with the diligence and hard work of Dee Chism, a Club member who worked for almost a year doing research







with the City of New Smyrna Beach and with donations from individuals, organizations and our own Club members. Eight free gardening classes have been offered to the public with an average of 25 men and women participants in attendance. After adding an additional 15 garden plots the next year, to the already existing 14 raised beds (including four

handicapped-accessible gardens), the count now stands at 29 garden plots. NSBGC's name will appear on each bed we sponsor and a few Garden Club members are leasing their plots and

sharing their know-how and experience with other community gardeners. Information relating to the gardens was handed out at the Black Heritage Festival. In addition, Club members have donated picnic tables, a Mason bee house and a Pollinator Friendly Garden sign. This spring after the city of New Smyrna Beach was named a Monarch City USA, our Club began a program to certify Monarch Butterfly Sanctuary Gardens. One of the garden plots in the Community Garden was planted the required host/larval and nectar plants and received its certification official sign.

At our October meeting our speaker was Jessy Wayles, the Conservation Science Coordinator for the Marine Discovery Center in New Smyrna. She spoke of the efforts of her organization to provide protection for our shoreline with shell mats and other living

materials rather than build artificial seawalls. She asked if our Club would help with centerpieces for their Gala in October. Fifteen of our members volunteered and

participated in a workshop to design and create 12 topiaries for their tables. The beautiful creations were then donated at no cost to the Marine Discovery Center.
