Day Trippin' with *Tim*

David Crocket State Park



I leave the house and find my way to South Mount Juliet Road that turns into Hobson Pike that turns into Old Hickory Blvd. that turns into Burkett Road before it dead ends into Nolensville Road, aka Hwy 31A/41A. I turn left and before long am stuck in construction traffic just before going through the historic town of Nolensville. Just past Kirkland, Hwy 41A makes a departure to the left away from Hwy 31A. I stay on 31A toward College Grove. Traffic stays heavier than I like until I get past Chapel Hill where it finally thins out and I am able to enjoy the ride and the scenery.

ally get to Pulaski. The town was founded in 1809. Several skirmishes were fought near it during the Civil War. In 1865 it was the site of the founding of the KKK. As I ride through town enjoying the old architecture, I get stuck behind a garbage truck. The smell, as you can imagine, doesn't remind me of a rose garden. I am glad when it finally turns off, but before I can get past him another truck pulls out in front of me. I thought the garbage truck smelled bad. This truck must be hauling waste from a chicken farm. It is dripping out the back of the bed. It is enough to gag a maggot!

picnic shelters and campgrounds are scattered along the way. Toward the back of the park is Crocket Falls, a covered bridge and a museum with several displays depicting the life of Davy Crocket. A boat dock is at the edge of beautiful Lake Lindsey. There are several miles of hiking trails throughout the park.

Dedicated in 1959, this 1400 acre park is a tribute to a great American icon. Davy moved to this area in 1817 and established a homestead. A couple of years later he developed several businesses including a gristmill, powder mill and distillery. These were built along the bank of Shoal Creek. In 1821 a flood washed all three business operations away. Mr. Crocket was active in local politics and later served in the state legislature. He died at the Alamo Mission in 1836 while fighting for the independence of Texas from Mexico.

Leaving the park I turn right on Hwy 242 that changes names to W. Gaines Street. Another right gets me on Hwy 64,



As I pass through Cornersville, I am struck by all the stately old homes lining the street. Some have been restored while others are in various stages of decay. The town was called Marathon before it was first incorporated in 1830. Cornersville was named for its location near the corner of Giles, Maury, Bedford, and Lincoln counties. However, the county boundaries have changed since then.

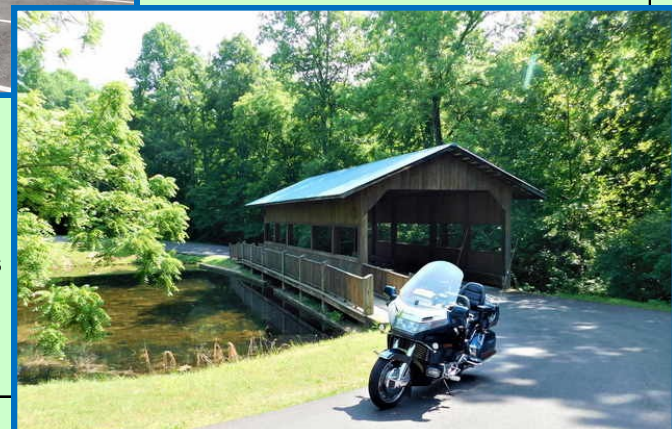
Continuing south on Hwy 31A, I eventu-

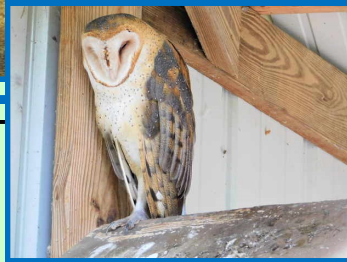
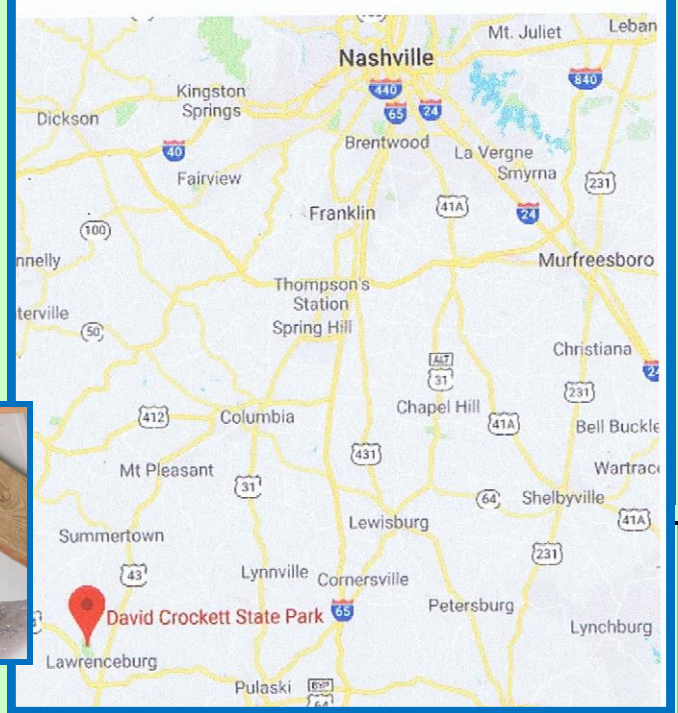
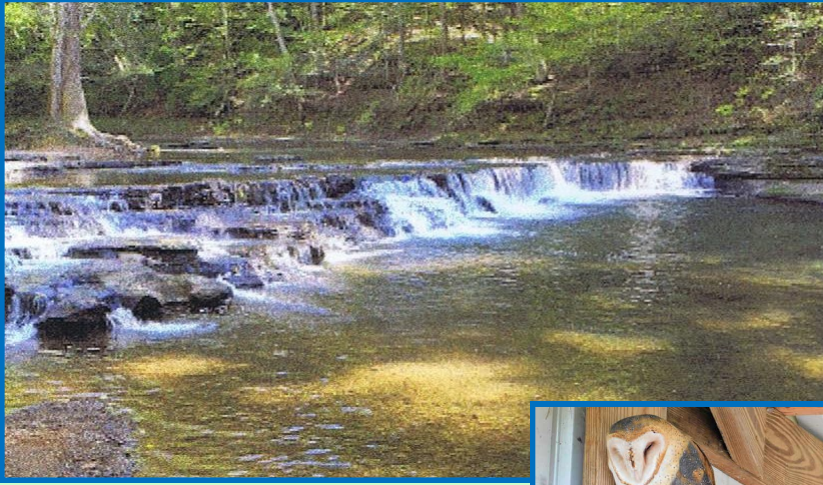
Just past the square in Pulaski I turn right onto Hwy 64 heading west. Shortly another right puts me on the Old Pulaski Highway that takes me through Lawrenceburg. The road changes to Hwy 242. After getting out of town it isn't long



before I reach my destination on the right, David Crocket State Park.

The drive into the park follows the original Trail of Tears. It's a beautiful road through a leafy, green canopy. Several





and before long I find my route toward home by way of the Natchez Trace Parkway, starting at mile post 370.

The Natchez Trace Parkway

has been designated as one of Americas National Scenic Byways by the Federal Highway Administration. The most scenic of these byways are also designated as All-American Roads. The Natchez Trace Parkway is one of only 31 All-American Roads. Development of the Parkway began back in the late 1930's and wasn't completed until 2005. It is a

Meriwether Lewis memorial at mile post 385.9. While serving as governor of the Louisiana Territory, Lewis was traveling the Trace back to Washington DC. He died of a gunshot wound while staying at Grinder's Stand in October of 1809. Many believe he committed suicide. His grave is a short distance away. In 1858, a Tennessee commission erected a monument at the site to honor him. Parts of the Old Trace are accessible from near the memorial.

444. The weather has been perfect, the roads smooth and curvy. I was able to see a lot of beautiful scenery and learn some history about the early days of this great land that we live in.

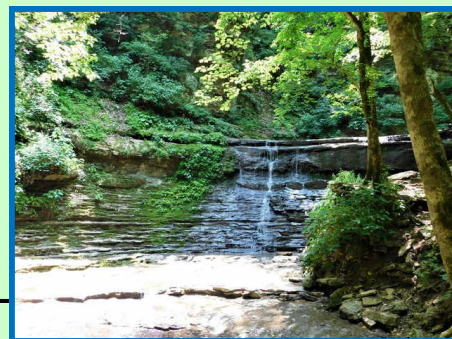
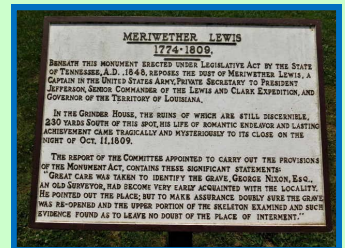


444 mile long road that generally follows the path of the Old Natchez Trail from Natchez, Mississippi to Nashville, Tennessee. The Old Natchez Trace dates back to the early 1700's, when sections of it were Indian footpaths and animal trails. In the late 1700's through the early 1820's traders from Middle Tennessee and Kentucky areas floated their goods down the Cumberland, Ohio and Mississippi Rivers to Natchez and then walked or rode horses up the Trace to return home. My first stop along the Trace is at the

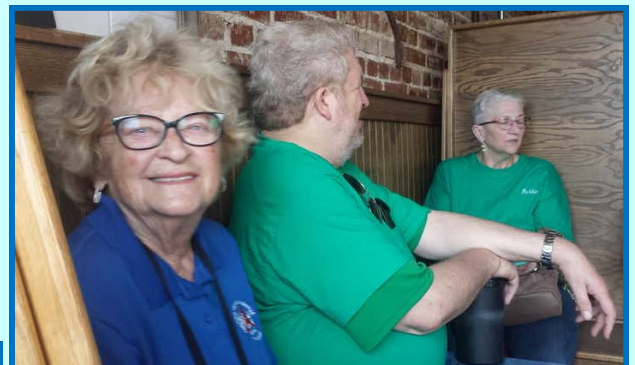


My next stop is Jackson Falls at mile post 404.7. There is a fairly steep 900 foot paved path to the base of the falls. It is a very pretty, peaceful area, but today there isn't a lot of water coming over the falls. It is a refreshing hike none the less.

Back on the Parkway I continue north to its terminus at mile post

ARC: Experience advanced techniques in turning, maximum braking, and swerving plus mental and situational strategies in GWRRA's own Advanced Rider Course. Co-Riders welcome. 8 hours (class and range)

ARC (Recertification): The GWRRA ARC for those who have PREVIOUSLY COMPLETED the ARC. Includes discussions at the beginning of the course and between exercises. 5 hours (range only)

SIDECAR: Experience advanced techniques of riding with a sidecar as well as situation strategies and accident avoidance tactics. 8 hours (3 classroom/5 range).

TRAILERING: Learn advanced trailering techniques and strategies for safe and enjoyable travel. Motorcycles only--no trikes or sidecars please. 8 hours (3 classroom/5 range)

TRIKE: This course teaches advanced riding skills for the trike rider such as maximum braking, swerving and turning. 8 hours (3 class/5 range)

TRIKE/TRAILER: This course combines the Trike Rider Course (TRC) with some guided practice in backing a trailer. 8 hours (3 class/5 range)

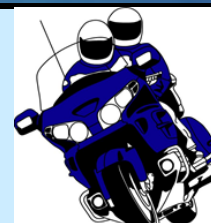
