Rider Education

This article was in the November, 2019, issue of Motorcycle Consumer News (MCN), page 11. It details a crash involving one motorcycle hitting another motorcycle head-on. It is an interesting and yet horrifying article.

Bad Decisions BY WALT FULTON



A recent news headline regarding a quadruple fatality motorcycle collision piqued my interest. It's not every day that two motorcyclists run into each other head-on. I have been involved in

crash investigation and reconstruction for 40 years, and evaluated hundreds of motorcycle crashes. Only one involved two motorcycles in a head-on crash, and both solo motorcyclists died.

One reason this crash is so interesting, is that most motorcyclists in the area are familiar with this road, and have probably ridden it more than once. It can be described as a wide, flowing, limited access country road that is well-maintained and well-marked. The corners are not complex and offer no visibility surprises, provided speed is kept in check.

Though I've ridden this road regularly for 50 years, I was compelled to ride the same section of road on two separate occasions after the incident, to see if I missed anything. Those two passes turned up nothing out of the ordinary.

According to reporters, the northbound rider pulled into the southbound lane attempting to overtake a car, and ran head-on into the second motorcycle, killing both motorcyclists and both passengers instantly.

It appears that a double yellow line was crossed to attempt the pass and that the passing rider will be at fault. The others unfortunately found themselves in the wrong place at the wrong time. The vehicle being passed was not involved in the collision.

As with all fatal crashes, police spend a lot of time photographing and taking measurements of all the artifacts at the scene from a "zero" reference point. They may measure the coefficient of friction available, and determine if sun glare could have been an issue to either rider. It's essential that they have an accurate representation of the conditions that existed at the time of a collision.

A scene drawing will be generated, so all artifacts previously measured can be represented on the drawing. Then the work really starts, including calculating paths of travel and estimated speed based on any locked-wheel skids and scrape marks that exist. They will also calculate energy of the collision and corresponding speeds of riders and passengers from the point of impact to the point of rest.

From a legal standpoint, it is important that officers perform due diligence in the investigation. Unfortunately, not all of factors can be determined by the scene. Variables like how many hours the riders had been awake before the crash, physical condition of the riders including alcohol and drugs in their blood, driving records, vehicle conditions and more will come into play. There's no currently available information indicating alcohol involvement in this crash. However, it's worth mentioning that the south end of this road terminates at a "biker bar." During occasional lunch or dinner stops, I've been amazed at the number of motorcyclists drinking alcoholic beverages at this establishment.

Motorcyclists account for a small percentage of road users, but a high percentage of fatalities. The 2017 Governor's Highway Safety Association publication contains some interesting facts: In 2016, 33% of motorcyclists in fatal crashes were speeding, and 25% of motorcyclists involved in fatal crashes were impaired. That is a record, handily beating automobiles, light and heavy

trucks. As far back as 1981, the "Hurt Report" found that motorcyclists are overrepresented in fatal crash data.

Evidence indicates that the passing rider is guilty of at least two causal factors, speeding and passing on a double yellow, even if he was not inebriated.

Critically review your own riding habits and if you find yourself speeding, ignoring road markings or mixing alcohol with riding, make some positive changes immediately. Jeff Nguyen, of KCAL television, said it best, "Four lives lost because of one bad decision."
